On 2 Nov 88, I received in the mail a letter dated 27 Oct 88, from Sylvia Gale. The letter explained that MacRae may have severed his ties with the church, but this is as of yet unconfirmed. Also that the suspect is not certified to handle or provide services to DCYS involved youths. The information about the suspect having troubles in Florida prior to coming to New Hampshire was also written about. See attached.

On 2 Nov 88, I received a call from Sylvia Gale who had some additional information. [redacted] had told me that the suspect was very close to a [redacted] who had something to do with youths out of the DCYS office and JV court. She said she had confronted MacRae about this on one occasion and asked him if he had wedding plans. I was not familiar with who [redacted] was until MSGT Walker told me she works as a social worker at the Keene DCYS office. Gale then told me that Judy Henderson had spoke with [redacted] about her interest in the MacRae case. Henderson then developed that [redacted] was receiving calls from the suspect when the Spofford Hall disclosure took place. Hind sight on [redacted] part now makes her believe that he was pumping her for information. [redacted]

[redacted] Some of the children are now adults. One in particular [redacted] is in prison and who has information on the suspect. From what [redacted] learned about the suspect she started to ask her older kids questions about the suspect from her 23 year old son she learned that Gordon had propositioned him for sex when he was younger [redacted] is very concerned since her now 14 year old son [redacted] still sees Gordon and has a long established friendship with him. [redacted] would like to cooperate with this investigation. I told Gale I would contact her to set an interview date. Gale also told me that [redacted] told her that she confronted Gordon about his relationship with [redacted]. That it looked odd. Gordon then told her he was confronted about his marriage plans to her.

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The suspect used this actual incident to demonstrate to the mother that what people say and what things look like to those outside of the relationship, can be off the [REDACTED]

Both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] (twin brothers) of [REDACTED] were named as associates of the suspect. [REDACTED] especially was named as a very close friend of the suspect. I called [REDACTED] and was not able to reach him. His wife called back a short time later and I asked to speak with her about an investigation. She at first thought I was speaking about a professional call vs a family call. After this was straightened out she said she would be right down to the station. I then spoke with [REDACTED] in one of the offices. I told her that I was investigating a subject with regards to his relationships to teen age boys. I asked her if she knew who I was talking about, since most parents sometimes have these suspicions. She said she thought she did but wanted to hear the name. I then said Gordon MacRae and she started to cry. She then asked if I was familiar with her sons and I told her I wasn't. That this case I was working on was unfolding fast and I didn't take the time to read both her sons files other than the face sheets. She then described the trouble she has been going through with both her sons, but especially with [REDACTED]. The entire family has been in trouble with the behavior problems of both boys. Other people in the profession have expressed their opinion that their son [REDACTED] should be institutionalized because of his lack of mental health. [REDACTED] explained that [REDACTED] has been dealing with part of the problem and knows a lot about her son. She states that her son really doesn't trust or respect many people. The two adult males that he does get along with and likes are [REDACTED] and Gordon MacRae. [REDACTED] then took some time and briefed me on some of the family history so far as the twins behavior and our involvement as well. She also told me about the financial burden of \$44,000 for this year that the family has spent in an attempt to deal with her sons.

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I briefed [redacted] on what has been developed on the suspect. She would flash back to things that seemed odd to her about the suspect, but which she passed off at the time. She also stated her 30 plus year old mother who haunts here ~~xx~~ had told her that MacRae relationship with [redacted] was extremely suspect. [redacted] explained that her son first met the suspect back in 1983 when they first came to Keene. [redacted] and [redacted] were in the St Josephs school and met MacRae. About the time of puberty MacRae relationship with her son picked up. She states he never really interacted with either her or her husband. That the suspect did speak with ~~xxx~~ her a number of times on the phone but never interacted with her husband. She described one recent incident in which she needed to return her son to his private school in Wenchendon and her car was not working. It was very important that her son get back on time and Gordon was called. She wanted to go and offer him gas money but her son garbbed ahold of her arm and he didn,t want her to speak or go near Gordon. Simple things like this were easily explained off by Mrs [redacted] at the time due to her sons adolencense or by his frail mental stability. With my disclossure to her about the suspect, these small pieces were beginning to fit. She states her son [redacted] was never really involved with Gordon. That any time he was with Gordon [redacted] was always there. [redacted] also flashed back to an incident in which Gordon was operated on twice in the same year. She states he told her he fell out of a pick up truck which was travelling at 70 MPH. That as a result his hands and other parts of his body sustained injuries. He was schedule for an operation on one of his hands and the hospital wanted him to stay the night. [redacted] went to see him three houss after the operation and he had left the hospital and went home. It was then arranged for [redacted] to come and assit Gordon with his convalescence. She explained to me that Gordon needed help with a number of things including urination. She became very concerned and suspicious about this, but other arrangements were made and someone else assisted the suspect with his needs.



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[redacted] recalled that during the second operation she asked her son about Gordons plan and she was told that Gordon would be able to take care of himself and [redacted] wasn,t needed.

I asked [redacted] about [redacted] drug problem since he did have an overdose which was believed to be somewhat suicidal in nature. [redacted] states she really doesn,t think her son has an addiction problem. She qualified this by stating she is familar through her work both here and in Boston and doesn,t see any signs in her son. She states that Gordon does see these and has convinced [redacted] that he has a life long problem. When her son over dosed she called Gordon and turned to him for assistance since he had what appeared to be a good relationship with her son. Gordon refused to visit her son in the hospital and said [redacted] would have to call out to him for help first. She said she recognized this as a way to deal with adults but found it odd that he would treat a child in this manner.

I asked [redacted] about extra money that the boys may have had as a result of their relationship with Gordon. She stated she was very careful about this and never saw any extra cash around, or the signs of it.

I told [redacted] that a lot of what the suspect claims as experiences in his life are not panning out as the suspect advertises. She says she knows from listening to him that he has to many experiences to cram into to ~~xxx~~ few years. But she passed this off at the time, probably as just bull shit. I asked what she knew about the suspects background. She said from what she heard ~~xxxx~~ today she isn,t sure. But that he stated he had a sister living in Lynn Mass who her son and Gordon visited last halloween. The daughter of this woman is supposed to have some type of fatal illness. This was part of the reason for the overnight visit. She also states that he has a brother who is married and living in Marblehead Mass. She also recalls him as saying both his mother father were alcoholics and that he grew up in Lynn Mass.


[REDACTED] then told me about [REDACTED] and how her son [REDACTED] also has a \$785 friendship with the suspect. She recalled an odd incident in which she was called by the suspect and asked whether she was getting a divorce from her husband. Gordon told her he had learned this information from [REDACTED] who had learned it from the [REDACTED] twins. She confronted her kids about this and they denied making any such statement. The reason for this isn't know but is an example of the head games played by the suspect, according to [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] cried off and on during this interview. She is very quilt ridden because she feels that at times she has actually assisted the suspect by pushing him towards the suspect since she though he was a positive thing in her sons life. She recalls that her son wouldn,t call Gordon when he had been drinking because he didn,t want to threaten Gordon's sobriety. She would then push him into calling and being with Gordon hoping her son would stay sober as well.

[REDACTED] states her son still has a relationship with the suspect and she has actually authorized him to take her son off campus, at the school in Massachusetts. That Gordon visits once a week. She statted she needed time to speak with her husband about a plan to handle this. She doesn,t know how her son will react from questioning if it becomes necessary. At the same time she knows that when he is arrested the news will get back and destroy him that way as well. We agreed the situation could be placed on hold until monday 7 Nov 88. We agreed to get back in touch.

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As arranged with [REDACTED] I went to the DCYS office for the purpose of an interview. [REDACTED] is employed by [REDACTED] as a social worker [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] We went to a private room for the interview.

[REDACTED] stated that the very first time that she ever heard anything even vaguely suggestive that Gordon might be involved with children is when she had a conversation with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] explained that her mother had sustained life threatening injuries as a result of a house fire. After a number of weeks in a hospital she succumbed. She was then burried in the St Jodephs cemetary.

[REDACTED] was with [REDACTED] at the time of this conversation [REDACTED] works for the parish and part of his duties involves maintenance of the cemetary. [REDACTED] asked if I knew LaFond. I stated I had met him. She then stated that he is hard to follow in a conversation at times and this was one such instance. Fred started to speak about his concerns about [REDACTED] children being with Gordon. He stated he though her kids were on the ball and wouldn,t let anything happen. [REDACTED] did not pursue the conversation at the time, but recalled the conversation because of recent information learned by about the suspect.


[REDACTED] then told me about how she had spoke with Gordon about his relationship with [REDACTED]. She explained to Gordon that it didn,t look normal to outsiders, and that people were begining to talk. She explained that Gordon and [REDACTED] have been together since [REDACTED] was 13 years old. Gordon as a result became very defensive. He then told her about being confronted about his wedding plans to her and how people always talk.

[REDACTED] also stated that Gordon is a pathological liar. That his lies became a constant form of entertainment for the family. Jokes were made about his lie telling. [REDACTED] explained that she has caught Gordon on some many lies that she stopped trying after a while. When ever a family member said Gordon said..., everyone would roll their eyes.

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
[redacted] went on to explain that Gordon always paints himself as the best or the first, or his novel for this reason or another. She also stated that she doesn,t believe that he is a recovering alcoholic. She has known the man for ten years and never saw a single sign of any addiction. Then all of a sudden he stated he was a recovering alcoholic and cured himself without any teatment other then going to AA meetings.

I asked [redacted] about Gordon's family. [redacted] states he claimes to have a sister who has a child, who suffers from some type of lung disorder. He also claims to have an older brother [redacted] who is an accountant. He also says he has a younger brother named [redacted] who has red hair. Nothing further of this subject.

I asked [redacted] to start from the beginning. She first met the suspect through her children. She was living in Marlboro at the time and the kids would go and sit on the wall in front of the catholic church. They met the suspect and he eventually came to the home and met [redacted]. The [redacted] family was also active in the church. The suspect at the time was a seminary student and in Marlboro and assigned to the church for the summer. I asked [redacted] about whether the suspect interacted well with her husband who was still with the family unit at that time. She stated he didn,t and that her husband was also suspect of Gordon. [redacted] explained that she always thought that Gordon was very ungary and was found to be an untruthful person.

The first child that Gordon became fond of was [redacted]. He was about 13 years old at the time according to [redacted]. [redacted] was taken places by Gordon, such as on visits to other priests, to places for dinner, and to Logan Airport to see the planes.

At the time the [redacted] explained that she had eight children in her home at the time and finacially things were tight. Gordon would come over to the home with pizza and other treats for the kids. During this time he spent many if not all of his evenings at the [redacted] residence. After the children would retire for the night Gordon would n spend time speaking with [redacted] or playing cards with her. She felt as if he though of her as his serogate mother.

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When the summer was over Gordon went ~~to~~ back to the seminary in Baltimore. But he continued to keep in contact by letter and phone.

As far as [REDACTED] knows she has always though that Gordon was in the Manchester diocese. She recalls going to his ordination and first mass with the kids. His first placement as a priest was in Hampton, NH.. Father Scuton was then considered a friend of Gordon, s. When Scuton later was arrested for obscene behavior at a rest area while assigned here in Keene, Gordon was assigned to be his counselor. Scuton had also been arrested in Hudson, NH for the same type of crime before coming to Keene,.

[REDACTED] also ~~xxx~~ stated that she can recall Gordon having a foster child named [REDACTED] who came from the Berlin area. She said Gordon didn,t treat the child right and he told her the child had to be placed in foster placement because of his Keene assignment in 1983. During this time Gordon continued his relationship with the kids, but was espicially spending time with her son [REDACTED] who was now 13 years old.

When Gordon was assigned to Keene in 1983 he first came over to the house a lot and then after making a lot of contacts he did less so. [REDACTED] also explained that her son [REDACTED] had fallen into the back yard pool and had drowned. She was attempting to bring him back and wasn,t having any luck. Gordon showed up by chance and took over and brought [REDACTED] back to life. This incident has always been very special between Gordon and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was questioned by his mother about Gordon. She said he told her he has always known that Gordon is gay but that Gordon has never even asked him to do anything sexual. [REDACTED] states that [REDACTED] and Gordon have probably only been together twice alone. He might have taken him to dinner once and also spoke with him once about the effects of alcohol. He did so because had the time [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were having a hard time with alcohol and the effects were being seen in the home by the younger brother.

[REDACTED] told his mother that he suspects a strange relationship between Gordon and [REDACTED]. He said he figured Gordon all out by himself and that he has never been asked to do anything by him.

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[REDACTED] also spoke about her son [REDACTED]. When he was first adopted he was about six years old. It was then discovered that he was sexually (Oral) assaulted by a 15 year old boy. He also was friendly and still is with Gordon. [REDACTED] also spend a few nights with Gordon in the rectory. [REDACTED] is presently in the NH state Prison serving time (1 to 3) for violation of probation.

In April of 1987 [REDACTED] started to work at [REDACTED] on a part time basis. Before she took the job she found Gordon trying to talk her out of taking the position. She feels now that Gordon might have been attempting to stop her in fear of her being privy to his past incident in Hampton.

Just prior to the July Spofford Hall incident, [REDACTED] had had no real contact with the suspect. However in July after the disclosure he called [REDACTED] each night. He never asked her a direct question about what she knew. But [REDACTED] feels that he wanted to milk her for information and she was on to him.

[REDACTED] feels very betrayed about Gordon relationship with her family. She feels if she didn,t have six sons then Gordon wouldn,t have even bothered. She recalled an incident a few years ago in which she received a large color TV which was sent from Montgomery Wards. [REDACTED] then found out that Gordon was the one who sent it.

[REDACTED] states that Gordon travels to Manchester every wensday for therapy. She then recalled an incident in which her son [REDACTED] was in a rough neighborhood in Manchester probably looking for a drug deal. While there he told his mother he found Gordon's car and didn,t know why he would be in that area. He left a note on Gordon's car, whether Gordon said anything back to [REDACTED] or not isn,t known. [REDACTED] is presently in California.

I asked [REDACTED] to make notes on any points that she remembers. I explained to her that others I spoke with about Gordon, had recalled facts about him that flooded [REDACTED] after some thought. She stated she would do so. She also agreed to speak with her son [REDACTED] about speaking with me about this case.

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On 4 Nov 88, I went to the New Hampshire State Prison to interview [REDACTED]. I spoke with [REDACTED] for about an hour and nothing not already noted, was developed. [REDACTED] denied any sexual involvement with Gordon, nor any solicitation. He even started to tell me about how he dislikes homosexuals and that where he is at, there are many to deal with. He then went into his appreciation of the female body and offered proof of his masculinity by saying he was a father and had a little girl. The interview for the most part was unproductive.

On 4 Nov 88, I met with Sylvia Gale and we discussed this case. Sgt Brown also attended and we discussed options in the case and other avenues that needed to be covered. She also suggested that I contact Carolyn DeBell about other information on the suspect.

On 4 Nov 88, I called DeBell and she stated she worked the Berlin area between 1976-83. While there she had met MacRae once. Another social worker was out sick and she took his place in the Groveton Court. MacRae was given custody of a [REDACTED]. The hearing centered around the suspect being unable to take care of the child any longer. He was then taken out of MacRae's care and placed in the Dover Child care facility. Just prior to this incident a Jenet Gunion had called DeBell back then and had made an inquiry into MacRae. DeBell believes she was conducting an investigation at the time. Gunion presently works for the Adult and Elderly services.

On 4 Nov -8, I called there and spoke with Gunion. I asked her if she recalled the suspect. She stated she did vaguely and that he was a priest. She could not recall the case but would attempt to think on it and see what she could come up with. 271-4386.

On 8 Nov 88, I received a list of the subjects the suspect has had contact with. This list was prepared by the County Jail at my request, (see attached).

On 8 Nov 88, I was called by [redacted] about this case. He told me and he spoke with his wife about this situation. He said he has also spoken to a staff member at the Whenedon School. They have decided to keep this information from [redacted] until he starts hockey. They feel that he is emotionally stronger when he is involved in this sport. He wanted to know if anything was going to appear in the paper in the mean time. I told him that nothing was planned but that these things are not predictable. I did tell him that if something was going to break that I would contact him so that he could speak with his son before reading it in the papers. The teacher at the private school was briefed so he might be able to assist if an interview will be needed.

I asked [redacted] for his impressions about the suspect and his son. He said he can't think that any sexual involvement was taking place at this time. But that mentally his son and Gordon have a hold of each other. I mentioned the possibility that the suspect and his son might have experimented sexually years ago and they have continued the relationship regardless of the past transgression. He thinks this might have merit.

On 8 Nov 88, [redacted] came to my office and stated she has been having a hard time with her son [redacted]. This culminated with her speaking to her son and his telling her that he is having a hard time dealing with the situation with the suspect. The boy feels very betrayed about what the suspect has done to him. [redacted] asked that I be available to speak with her son. The boy had requested that it be arranged.

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I called the Monadnock High School and confirmed that [REDACTED] of [REDACTED], was a student there. I then arranged to speak with him at the school.

[REDACTED] explained to me that he has known the suspect, for about two years. [REDACTED] met the suspect through an introduction made by [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] can't recall where this first meeting took place. He did recall that he and others would wait at the Jiffy Mart before school and that the suspect would come there and speak with [REDACTED] and other local boys. He also recalls seeing the suspect at the YMca and mentioned racket ball as a sport the suspect participates in.

I asked the subject about whether the suspect ever made him feel uncomfortable. He then said he thought the suspect might be gay and that he had this conversation with [REDACTED]. He surmised the suspects sexuality by the way he spent time with boys, the money he freely gave to them, and the odd stares and smiles he received from him. [REDACTED] explained that at first he kept his distance from the suspect because he wanted to speak about family troubles.

[REDACTED] also explained that [REDACTED] told him he never wanted to be alone with the suspect and that he felt the same way. The first time he went to the suspects home was with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said they went to the apartment door and knocked but no one answered. They had seen the suspects car in the lot so they went to the Paks West store and called. The suspect answered and they then went back to the apartment. No explanation for not answering the door was explained. No one else was seen in the apartment. The suspect had the boys wash his car and move some furniture around and then gave each a ten do-lar bill.

I asked [REDACTED] about receiving any offers from the suspect. He stated the suspect told him he could call him any time for rides or to go out socially. [REDACTED] had learned from [REDACTED] that he had gone to Concord with the suspect a few times and had a good time. [REDACTED] states he never called the suspect. He did recall the suspect getting his home number

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[redacted] was also aware that both [redacted] and [redacted] knew the suspect. [redacted] also explained that [redacted] had received some money from the suspect to pay off some fines he had pending. [redacted] was also aware of [redacted] and felt the suspect and he were very close. On one occasion he saw both the suspect and [redacted] together in a parking lot. He jokingly asked what they were doing and [redacted] became very defensive. Others told [redacted] that [redacted] is very defensive about Gordon.

[redacted] also recalls [redacted] going to McDonalds with the suspect but that [redacted] was there at the time. The suspect paid for everyones meal. The news that Gordon is good for easy money is all around according to [redacted]

Other subjects who know Gordon include the following:

[redacted] believed to have known the suspect before [redacted]

[redacted] 9th grader lives on [redacted] This subject has been sexually abused in the past. [redacted] to [redacted] last name who also lives in the [redacted] area and who is in the [redacted] 8th grade.

[redacted] 8th grader lives near [redacted] Is supposed to be in need of money and knows the suspect and has been seen alone with him in the suspects car.

I gave [redacted] my card and asked him to call me with any additional information that he can recall. He was very nervous about others finding out that he spoke with me about their possibly being involved with Gordon. I assured him I wouldn,t say anything to them if they were interviewed.

These names were reviewed by Sgt Brown and he was familar with most of them.

I went to the [redacted] residence and arranged to have [redacted] stop by the station at the end of his school day. [redacted] told me that [redacted] had seen the suspect walking in the hallways of the High school earlier in the day. The suspect did not see [redacted] and no conversation took place between them.

On 8 Nov 88, I went to [redacted] and spoke with [redacted]. I asked about his son and he stated he was presently a Keene State College student and was working part time at Medical hall. I asked him if his son had troubles with Gordon MacRae and that was the reason I wanted to speak with him. [redacted] did not know the name. Nor were any further questions about this case revealed or asked by the father. I came back to the station and called [redacted] at his work place. I arranged for him to come to the station for a purpose of an interview on 9 Nov 88, at 1000 HRS. Ironically the [redacted] family lives across from the [redacted] residence. Neither family interacts.

On 8 Nov 88, I found that [redacted] was registered as a student at the Keene Junior High school. I called there and asked that they give him a note requesting him to stop at the station at the end of the schhol day.

On 8 Nov 88, Hampton Police Department sent a copy of what they had on file concerning the suspects 1983 sexual contact with a minor. The report is one of the worst. It simply looks like notes. From these notes bits and pieces of the incident can be put together. References to sitting in the suspects lap, kissing and hugging, and fondling can be learned from some of the writings. A letter from a DCYS worker (letter dated 29APR86) to the Hampton Police Detective was included. The incident was described as founded and that a protective investigation ensued. It then tells that a [redacted] tment program was formulated with the Attourney Generals office approval. The letter also states tha Cheshire County Attourneys office was also notified.

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The Keene Junior High School called back and told me [REDACTED] is a part time student and they will give him the message the 9 Nov 88.

On 8 Nov 88, I made a copy of [REDACTED] criminal history card. He was sent by the court to the Monadnock Substance abuse center. He came back because he was upset when he found out he had topay for the service. He also had the card of the subject he spoke with which was Gordon J MacRae. The subject [REDACTED] is 5'6" tall, 150 lbs, with brown hair. According to Capt McClellan he looks young for his age. This subjects phone number is [REDACTED], I called and left a message.

On 8 Nov 88, any information from [REDACTED] will not be worthcoming. [REDACTED] is being ~~HEK~~ counseled by [REDACTED] and does not want to have any further contact with MacRae. It was also learned that [REDACTED] mentioned [REDACTED] as another subject that MacRae has had in his vehicle.

On 8 Nov 88, [REDACTED] came to the station as I had requested. He said he was having a hard time dealing with this issue. We discussed what his feelings were at length about the suspect. The boys concerns were that he has shared a number of personal issues about his relationship with his family and was concerned about those issues being told to others by the suspect. I discusts with [REDACTED] about trust and its violation by the suspect. After speaking with me aboyt his feelings, I believe he felt better as a result. I then asked him about additional information on the suspect that he may have thought of since we last spoke. He then gave the following:

[REDACTED] recalls the victim has having about 30 video tapes. Most of these are movies but [REDACTED] admits they are not marked and may be anything. No camera is known as owned by the suspect. He also said Gordon is a member of Keene Video and also applied for a card for [REDACTED] telling the cleark he was his son. [REDACTED] states he never used the card and left it in the suspects car and never recovered it.

The Police reports from Hampton Police Department made mention of the suspect telling dirty jokes about other church members and other racial jokes. I asked [REDACTED] out this and he said that the suspect did do this. He recalled the suspect telling a joke about a couple of numms who were riding a two seated bike, and who were smiling.

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the mother superior was described as turning to the smiling nuns and telling them if they continued to do so that she would re-attached the seats. [redacted] said the suspect used to tell these jokes to make himself acceptable to others.

[redacted] also recalled that the suspect took him to lunch one day and told him about about an incident in his childhood. The suspect stated he was shoveling snow and the man living in the house invited him in for hot chocolate. While in the home the man was to have shown naked pictures of men to MacRae. Nothing further was described to [redacted] about how this incident if it did occur. The suspect told [redacted] that what ever is said between them should stay between them. I asked [redacted] if he was sworn to ~~xxxx~~ to keep secrets by the suspect. [redacted] said he couldn't recall being told to do so ~~by~~, other than this one time.

[redacted] then told me [redacted] also knows the suspect. That they have gone fishing in the past and have done so on at least three times. [redacted] as far as [redacted] knows doesn't see Gordon any longer. Underwood is 14 or 15 years old and lives on [redacted].

A check of records reveals the following on subjects named as possible sources of information on the suspect:

I received a call back from [REDACTED] about his contact with the suspect. With revealing our interest in this case, I asked [REDACTED] about his contact with the suspect. Nothing was learned. [REDACTED] was referred by the suspect to one of the female counselors.

On 9 Nov 88, I went to the Cheshire County Attorney's office and asked them to locate any paperwork on their contact with either the DCYS office or the Attorney General's office regarding the 1983 Hampton incident. No paperwork was found.

I called the Lynn Police Department for any past contacts with the suspect. A check with the Vice squad revealed a possible case. They will check their records in an attempt to locate this. The case if found would be dated before 1980.

The suspect also listed Milton, Mass as a location that he spent some time. I checked with the Milton Police and they have no record of contact.

As arranged [REDACTED] came to the station for an interview. When I mentioned the suspects name all I got was a blank stare. He states he has never met the suspect and although he did receive counseling at the Monadnock Family office, he never met with the suspect. This was lead was developed out of the High school. I called the source and asked if this was possible. I was told that she knows [REDACTED] was seeing Gordon because he made mention of it to her and she saw them together. She also believes that his parents weren't aware of their relationship.

As arranged I went to Marlboro and met with [REDACTED] about this case. [REDACTED] explained he decided to speak with his mother about the suspect, because of a recent [REDACTED] ent. [REDACTED] had experienced with the suspect. [REDACTED] entered the military in 1983 and returned to the Keene area and needed a place to stay.



Gordon was contacted by [redacted] and the suspect told him he could stay for as long as he needed. This was during the month of May of this year. While in the apartment [redacted] noticed a number of things that struck him as odd. The first being an intercom system connecting the suspects bedroom and the other end being with [redacted]. The other being the large number of phone calls from men/boys that the suspect received. [redacted] also suspected a number of gays were calling the suspect from the Hudson, NH area.

I asked [redacted] about the apartment itself. He states it is a 2 bedroom apartment that rents for \$550.00 a month. He has a number of expensive items in the apartment which include, a TV, video, telescope, and tropical fish that the suspect claims are valued at between 200.00 and 300.00 apiece. Also, an Apple 2 computer.

[redacted] states that the relationship between Gordon and [redacted] is extremely suspect. The first time he met [redacted] he had two black eyes. [redacted] suspects [redacted] is dealing in drugs. He wears a pager, speaks in whispers with kids at the YMCA where he works, and other suspicious activity. I asked [redacted] if he suspects Gordon could be involved with [redacted] so far as drugs. He states he thinks their relationship is probably more into the prostitution aspect than drugs. He did add that he has known the suspect for some time and doesn't feel that he has ever been an alcoholic and never even notice him drink anything other than an occasional beer.

The incident in which [redacted] was prompted to report to his mother was an offer from the suspect. The suspect knew that [redacted] wasn't working at the time. He asked him if he was interested in making some quick and easy money. The suspect told [redacted] he knew someone who did this type of work who was 18 or 19 years old and that he was making money. The suspect also told [redacted] he knew a customer who was 18 who would pay [redacted] to do him, that he wouldn't have to do anything to this subject in return. [redacted] told the suspect he wasn't like that and refused the offer. Even though Gordon told [redacted] he could stay for long as needed, he changed his mind after this refusal and made an excuse for [redacted] to seek shelter at his fathers home.

asked [Redacted] to explain about his relationship with the suspect. He states the suspect has been a friend of the family for close to ten years. That when he became 13 or 14 years old the suspect started to show him considerable more attention then when he was younger. He would take [Redacted] to lunch many times, to movies, and on many trips. Some of these trips included visits to other priest who lives in Manchester and Nashua. He also went with the suspect when he visited his parents in Lynn, Massachusetts. He recalls the parents of the suspect as being seperated and from [Redacted] a poor background. He also recalled visiting St Anselm College with the suspect. [Redacted] states he was the shy type and the suspect always attempted to make him happy. He did this by always giving him gifts and cash. He recalled an incident in which his car battery dies and Gordon automactically bought him another. [Redacted] states even at his young age of 13 or 14 he knew something was odd or wrong with the suspect.

[Redacted] recalled that when he was 15 or 16 years old he was at the Keene rectory. The suspect talked him into a massage. He had [Redacted] strip down, but he did keep his underwear on. He then would have him lie on a bed and would rub his backside. This included his upper legs and buttocks. The suspect after doing this would then attempt to have [Redacted] turn over so that he could do his chest. [Redacted] states he always stopped at this point and wouldn,t allow the suspect to do so. He recalls having similar massages from the suspect in the church on numerous occassions. He also recalled being woken up at about 0800 oae morning. The suspect was standing on the edge of the bed and woke him up by rubbing his chest and worked his hand down towards the victims crotch. [Redacted] states just before he reached his genitals he jumped up from bed.

[Redacted] also recalled talking to the suspect about problems he was having with his girlfriends. He can recall the suspect always telling him he didn,t need girls anyways.

I asked for other males seen around the suspect. [Redacted] states he doesn,t recall the name, but he had [Redacted] hair and operated a [Redacted] honda civic.

Before leaving I asked [redacted] if their was anything else that I should know about the suspect. He then refered back to the recent solicitation by the suspect and said he was real nervous when he made the offer.

On 9 Nov 88, Manchester, NH Police reported back that they have no record of contact with the suspect.

On 10 Nov 88, I spoke with Hellen Smith who had called me. She works as a counselor the Keene High School. She then told me she spoke with [redacted]. That during this conversation he spoke about the suspect and said he was going roller skating with him tonight. She had further conversation with him about the suspect and [redacted] states that [redacted] is very dependant on this relationship and it sounds extremely suspect. She knew I was investigating this suspect and wanted me to know about her contact with [redacted]. This information lets us know that the suspect is aware of this investigation. She explained to [redacted] that since this burglary investigation started to center on her son [redacted] and [redacted] that Gordon MacRae has made several calls to her son both at home and at work. She feels uncomfortable with the contacts. I told [redacted] to tell [redacted] that she should seek out answers when this subject calls, so far as his relationship with her son.

I spoke with [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] and did not find any additional information out on the suspect.

I called the Keene High School and identified another subject further as someone we should interview: [REDACTED]

On 10 Nov 88, at 1630 HRS, [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] came to the station to be interviewed. [REDACTED] states he met with the suspect on two occasions. He was initially referred by the court to the Monadnock Substance abuse center. He made a call to the center after receiving a call from them. He spoke with Gordon who arranged to meet [REDACTED] after school. He met him out front and had described the car he was in. Also in the car when [REDACTED] was picked up [REDACTED] was [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was dropped off first and the suspect and [REDACTED] continued to the colony mill, where the alcohol screening for [REDACTED] was to take place. Once at the Colony Mill Gordon met with [REDACTED] in the food mart area. He sat with the suspect in this area. Other people were also in the area and [REDACTED] was surprised by the non formal way in which the screening was taking place. [redacted] states most of the conversation had little to do with what he thought he was there for. He states the suspect was more interested in getting him to go to the YMCA to play racketball than anything else. The suspect also kept offering to buy [redacted] some refreshments. [redacted] recalls possibly accepting a coke but received no cash from the suspect. This meeting was concluded with the suspect telling [redacted] that he didn't need any further counseling from him, but told him to call him sometime so they could go and play racketball.

[redacted] states that the suspect made him feel a little uncomfortable because he was to friendly. [redacted] compared him to another subject who he had met some time ago. This subject was investigated for being a pedophile and was later convicted for having oral sex with a 15 year old boy. [redacted] states both the suspect and this subject are very much alike.

On 11 Nov 88, I called the Baltimore County Police Department and spoke with 8753 Det Stephen Fox about this case. Fox has received a copy of this report and was handling follow up leads in the Baltimore area. He states that the suspect came to their department through an x-major who met the suspect through her association with a catholic church. The suspect was associated with the youth department for a period of between a year and 18 months. During this time he only had two occassions where he worked with males, and was not supervised. One of these youths committed suicide. The other is now 18 or 19 years old and Fox is attempting to locate him for the purpose of an interview. Fox states the suspect had developed a relationship with both of these family(s) where the boys came from. I informed Fox that the boy that the suspect dealt with in Hampton attempted suicide, and two of those he dealt with in Keene also attempted suicide.

I also asked about this Baltimore County Police Department meritourious award the suspect claims to have received. Fox never heard of any such award but would check into

I asked about the suspects drinking. Fox states he spoke with a few officers who recall the suspect as an alcoholic and one who was always juiced. This is the first documentation suggesting a drinking problem for the suspect.

Fox states he will keep us informed as he goes along.

MacRae concerning his relationship with teenage males. I cautioned her that the suspect has had a number of relationships with teenage boys which have been looked into and which appear proper. But that other relationships appear extremely suspect. [REDACTED] stated that just last month she was speaking with Father Ray at St Bernards church about a pending annulment she is seeking. She at that time asked about Father Gordon since she planned to list him as a priest and wanted to make sure he was still on the roll. Father Ray told her he was still considered a priest.

[REDACTED] also stated her son [REDACTED] was very friendly and spent a lot of time with the suspect. She states her home is within walking distance to the church and they are members. She told me [REDACTED] became in trouble with the Police recently this summer and she contacted Gordon because of his counseling position with the Monadnock Substance Abuse center.

I asked [REDACTED] how long her sons have know the suspect and she said since he first came to Keene, which was 1983. She described his relationship with [REDACTED] as having gone fishing, to movies, and out to lunch with the suspect on numerous occasions. Her son was at the youth center which is located at the St Josephs school. I attempted to call the center but the phone which is in another room went unanswered. I called back [REDACTED] and tol-d her this and asked her to accompany her son to the station for the interview when he returned home which she suspected would be in a half hour.

On 11 Nov 88, I met with Sgt Brown and [REDACTED] who is ~~the~~ a member of the Board of Directors of the Monadnock Substance abuse center. The purpose of this meeting was to brief a member of the board so that when the suspect is arrested, that they will have knowledge of the case and be able to respond if necessary. The briefing took about our and half. The items discussed were typed out on an outline. This outline is apart of the case file.

[redacted] called and said she had located her son and was on the way to the station with him for the purpose of an interview [redacted] wasn,t told the reason for the interview.

I met with [redacted] who is 14 years old. He is tall and slender and having light colored hair. [redacted] states he met the suspect about two years ago but has had little actual contact with him. He states the suspect has planed a number of fishing trips and other activities but always cancels them. He has received no gifts or cash from the suspect. He states on one occassion he went to the rectory and watched a movie which the suspect rented for him. While he watched the movie father gordon was hearing confessions. When he returned he took [redacted] home without incident. [redacted] states he never heard any talk from the suspect which made him feel umcomfortable. [redacted] also told me that Ftaherr Gordon told him he was a cop, and that he had a problem with alcohol and smoking. [redacted] added that [redacted] also knows the suspect but hasn,t said anything bad about him in the apst. [redacted] said his brother [redacted] who is now 20 used to see a lot of the suspect, but never told him anything bad about those visits.

I then spoke with [redacted] and she stated she had lunch with the suspect about a month ago and is shocked about his possibly being involved with teenagers in this manner. 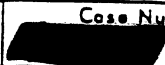

On 14 Nov 88, at 1600 HRS, I received a call from Gordon MacRae. He asked for me by name. MacRae then said he had received a couple of disturbing calls and asked to speak with me in person. I asked what type of calls and he said he received one from [redacted]. It explained her sons had been interview and the Spofford incident had been mentioned. He then said [redacted] had called him as well about his being interviewed as well. I agreed to a meeting with MacRae and asked him to stop by.

I spoke with Sgt Brown about the suspects call and also that he was on his way to the station. Brown agreed to be present for the interview. We then prepared an office.

At about 1620 HRS, MacRae came in with Sgt Brown and we sat down. MacRae then went on to explain further about his two disturbing phone calls. I did not speak with him at this point and just sat back as he spoke. The bottom line of what he had to say, was whether he was being investigated at this time. He had said he felt the investigation at Spofford Hall was closed and was determined to be unfounded.

I then told Macrae that he was presently under investigation and thus would require the reading of his rights. I reminded him about his Police background and he probably already knows this. I also told him the interview would be recorded to safeguard both him and the Police from misunderstandings about what was exactly stated. The tape was then started and qualified.

The suspect was then read his rights has he read along on a seperate sheet. Each right was fully read. I asked MacRae if he was familar with his rights and he said he was. I asked him if he was willing to speak with us now without an attourney. He stated his attourney was out of town. Regardless of this MacRae decided to speak with us. I then asked him to sign the form if he was willing to do so. He then signed the form. The time on the rights form was recorded as 1630 HRS. Both Sgt Brown and I signed the form as witness(s). Sgt Brown also noted in the remarks section of the form that the conversation regarding the rights was recorded on tape number KPD-C-31.

I started by asking the suspect what his official relationship was with the Church. He stated he was still a Father, but added that calling him by his first name was fine. MacRae was told the investigation involved a number of different incidents. I then asked about his role with the Baltimore County Police Department. He stated he was bever actually a Police officer and his role was as a counselor. I asked if he had ever told anyone he was a Police Officer and he said he had not. He stated he never intentionally mislead anyone that he was a Police officer. What he stated he would tell them was that he had worked with the Baltimore County Police for 3 and 1/2 years. He referred to this as a full time internship.

I then shifted to the 1983 Hampton incident and asked if he made the Board of Directors of the Monadnock Substance Abuse Council were aware of this. He stated they were not. He was then asked if he was aware that his name was on the DCYS sexual offenders list. He said he was. I then asked him about his handling some DCYS referrals. He stated he doesn,t. He then denied having any contact with [Redacted] other then over the telephone. He refered to him as [Redacted] and Sgt Brown stated it was the same subject.

The suspect was then told his life was going to grumble because of what has taken place and that he would be facing arrest.

I told the suspect are intent at this time was to keep the matter in the District Court. He was told are main concern during this investigation in the youthful victims that he has had contact with. He was told he has had some transgressions with a number of youths and we were ~~xxx~~ thoroughly convinced of his involvement. The suspect was further told not waste our time with any denials or justifications of his actions. I suggested to the suspect to resolve the matter with us.

The suspect then stated he wasn,t sue what these problems were. I told him it concerned his solicitation of males for sex, and that this was the charge he would face. He stated he had had conversations with a couple of kids in which he did ~~xxx~~ receive requests for large amounts of money. One of these youths he stated told him he would do anything for money. I asked who this was and he named ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~. He further added that ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ was with him in the car at one time and made a comment that he needed lot of money to buy a bike. The suspect stated he countered that money was very important . He states ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ responded that he would do anything for money. The suspect stated he told ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ that this attitude concerned him. The suspects stated he has heard this same attitude from 2 or possible 3 other kids. The suspect stated he told all of these boys that he knew someone who had given money for sex, but that this was the extent of the conversation. His purpose for this conversation was to solícite their reaction. I asked the suspect if he ever solícited anyone for money. He stated he never put it that way. He further added that he is concerned about his problem with teens because of what happened in 1983. He then stated he was under the influence of alcohol at the time. He then stated his attraction to teens is not an on going issue. He explained his desire for teenaged boys manifested itself while he was an alcoholic.

I tried to summarized the suspects statements by saying he was trying to clear up this investigation by suggesting he had such a concern for these boys and their use of ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ and what they would do ~~with\_\_\_\_\_~~ for money. MacRae then brough up ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ name again and said he was the one who said he would do anything for money.

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I asked the suspect if he though the ██████████ kid was coming onto to him. He stated he thought so initially and that as a result he became concerned. The suspect admitted to giving ██████████ small amounts of money in the past but that he did not have to do anything for the cash. The suspect added that on one occasion ██████████ helped him stain a desk. The suspect stated ██████████ wanted \$75.00 to \$80.00 but that he never overtly asked for it. The purpose for the money was for a bike according to the suspect. The suspect estimated the time of this incident as a year ago last summer.

The suspect was asked about who else he spoke with about the manner in which they could earn money. He states he became concerned with ██████████ and then with ██████████. He stated ██████████ had borrowed some money from him to pay a small fine. The suspect said he gave him the money on the condition that he attend some AA meetings. I changed the subject to exactly what the suspects job was. He stated he was the director and he didn't do much if any ~~xxxxx~~ counseling. He said he carries a beeper and handles the emergency calls.

The suspect was asked if since coming to Keene has he been sexually active with any male under the age of eighteen. He stated he hasn't. I asked the suspect to give me some ██████████ for doing my job, and told him he was not telling the truth. The suspect then clarified the question and asked, "Under 18?".

he suspect reconsidered the question and then he would be throwing away everything. I then told the suspect I had a statement from a male who received a full body masarge from him right in the Keene rectory. He denied this. I suggested that everyone I spoke to must be lying. The suspect then stated when a friend of his was arrested in Marlboro about two years ago he received a lot of criticism from parents. I told the suspect the incident I was referring to took place prior to 1986. He again denied the charge.

Sgt Brown then reminded the suspect that publicity was something that we were trying to avoid. He reminded the suspect that the agency has had good results and that we have been happy with their services. The suspect was reminded about the car accident he had and the way that the media handled it. The suspect returned back to the incident about the full body masarge. He stated he could not recall an incident involving a teenaged male who received a body masarge and a sexual assault, in the rectory.

I then told the suspect that two of the boys he was very close to in Blatimore would also concern us. One of which dies as a result of a suicide. He stated this boy had a number of suicidal incidents while he knew him and evidently afterwards.

I then told the suspect his statement so far as what happened at Spofford Hall wasn,t plausible. The suspect stated he could see no connestion between the Spofford Hall incident and what we were investigating. I suggested he was the connection

The suspect was then asked about the [REDACTED] incident. He was asked if he picked up a 19 year old male and kept him out after curfew and did not have him attend an AA meeting as required, and sexually solicited him. He denied the charge at first but then added that he spoke with him about sex for money in the same manner as he spoke wwith the other victims. I asked him if this was some type of interview process. He stated it wasn,t. He simply stated it was something that came up and he was concerned.

sked what would happen if he had accepted the offer and the suspect stated he would not have accepted.

The suspect was told that his answers were not satisfactory, that he looked very uncomfortable, and evasive. The suspect then reflected on the fact that he would differently loose his job. I told the suspect he was right when he stated he had to much to loose, but that he still made a number of wrong deceisions. I suggested to the suspect that he start to be sincere about what he had to say. He was given the opportunity to clear this up. The suspect stated he felt he was being very honest. I told the suspect that the universal agreement that was formed by everyone I spoke with during this investigation was that he was very dishonest and know as a liar.

Sgt Brown reminded the suspect that we didn,t call him to the station, that he called us. The reason was that this investigation had still undeveloped leads and that we were tied to leads out of our jurisdiction. [redacted] then discussed the 1983 case and other events in the suspects life.

The suspect was told we that we have investigated a number of these cases in the past and were convinced that his style of dealing with boys indicated a problem/ I told the suspect his problem needed to be addressed and it was up to him to do so. Brown reminded the suspect we were not done with the investigation. The suspect asked if the affidavit was on a specific charge. He was tld that it was. The suspect was reminded that he has made some major accomplishments at his work place. But that his Board of Directors have been notified and are in shock. Other problems at the suspects wrok place were also discussed.

Sgt Brown told the suspect that if the problem which came up in 1983 had resurfaced then lets get it controlled. The suspect was also told we were concerned about how this was going to effect the agency. Brown stated he wanted to have this situation taken care of as quickly and as quiet as possible.

The suspect then requested that we go off tape for a moment. We agreed to do so nd I logged off at 1458 HRS.

When we were off the tape the suspect did finally admitt that he had solicited [redacted] for sex. He also added however, that he is unsure what hw would have done if [redacted] was agreeable. He then also stated he opened the same door to [redacted] and to [redacted]. To a lesser extent he states he did the same to [redacted]. He is unsure whether [redacted] ever caught onto to what he had proposed.

I then went through the report and made mentoon of other names that had been developed. He stated he knew some and others he did not. I was concerned about [redacted] because his emotional state if fragile and we did not have any interview plans confirmed. I asked the suspect whether we needed to speak with this subject. He stated that he never made any offers to [redacted] or his brother [redacted].

The process of getting the suspect to admit what his true intentions were when he made these solicitations came in pieces. Towards the end he gave a more sincere and truthful recall to exactly what happened. I read to him the account given to me by [redacted]. I asked if this was actuarate. He made menttion that a word used by me was not used by [redacted]. I told him that I was reading from a report and these were my words. He then agreed that this was accurate. I asked him if [redacted] had lied to us about what took place. He stated that [redacted] did not lie and was truthful. I again asked if [redacted] was truthful when he decribed the 20 Oct 88 incident. The suspect said again stated that [redacted] was truthful.

The suspect also recanted on much of what he said about all of the boys he solicited, while speaking on tape. He admitted he was untruthful when he explained these situations to us. He also told us that when he spoke with [redacted] he was soliciting him as well. He also stated he was attempting to do the same thing to [redacted], and to [redacted] to a lesser extent.

The victim expressed his remorse at having done this to these victims. I mentioned at least one of the victims was very confused about why this had happened to him, by someone he trusted so much.

asked the suspect if he would consider paying for any counseling that was needed for [redacted]. He stated that he would like to do so .

A large amount of the conversation that took place after the tape was off was about [redacted]. The suspect states he never touched [redacted] sexually. I asked Sgt Brown to speak with the suspect about what [redacted] had stated as the reasons for the forgery(s) to his checks back in 1987. Sgt Brown then read the portion of the statement in which [redacted] stated he though the suspect was gay and was using their relationship to further the possiblity of them becoming involved. The purpose of the crime was stated as an act of retribution on the part of [redacted] agans,t the suspect. The suspect was asked to reflect back to that time and think over whether or not [redacted] had reason to believe this. He stated [redacted] might have misunderstood his antentions and that the results were that might have had bad thoughts about him.

The suspect denies having any sexual involvement with any children or young adults. [redacted] returned once again to the incident which I brought to his attention about giving a young male a full body masarge. He still was unable to recall this. He also again stated that what happened at Spofford Hall was not his fault. That the stated victim was to blame and he did nothing to promote his behavior.

The relationship between the suspect and [redacted] continued. The suspect stated that this would really hurt [redacted] to find out about the charge and the truth. He kept seaching for ways to either have no formal charge and to have no press involvement. I told him that a charge was going to be made and thex situation and the life he has lead to date demand that one be pressed. As to the press, Sgt Brown spoke with the suspect once again and told him we would not release any statement regarding the details of this investigation. That if the press made inquiries that a statement would be made about how his conduct in no way is to be attributed to the agency which he used to work

The suspect then voiced some plans of resigning from his position and taking a job that he has been seeking in Massachusetts, in the Danvers area.


We discussed with the suspect that any job he would consider would have to deal with adults and not with children. The suspect then said he has come to that conclusion himself and the job he was seeking did only deal with adults.

I also spoke with the suspect about his motor vehicle accident which took place this summer on Route #9 in Chesterfield, NH. I told him it was my opinion and that of the State Police who investigated the accident, that it was a suicide attempt. He then told me that this occurred when the Spofford Hall incident was brought to the attention of the Manchester Diocese and he was scheduled for a meeting in Manchester with the Church regarding the state investigation. He states he had a lot on his mind and then stated these thoughts of suicide were in his mind when the accident occurred and that since he has spoke with his counselor about this and feels as though he has it under control. During our conversation which lasted off tape from 1700 till 1925, I spoke with the suspect on four separate times, about his present mental condition and whether he was at this time thinking about suicide. He denied any suicidal thoughts and said he would be OK. We asked about calling someone from the Manchester office of the Church or either of the two Priests assigned to St Bernards. He stated this would be the last choice and that he wasn't close to the church or the Priests at St Bernards. I asked about his option of returning to the church and he said it would be impossible since he had the 1983 incident, followed by being suspended by the Church for the Spofford Hall incident, and in light of this present charge. He felt this option no longer existed.

I also offered to call the President of his Board, that being Monica Tucker. He again stated he didn't want anyone called. He said he had an 0800 meeting already set with Monica and would see her there and would make his intention of resigning known at that time.

The suspect during this time asked to use the phone. He called for his messages received two. One was from [REDACTED]. He called him at the YMCA and arranged to meet him in front of the YMCA at 1930 HRS.

The second message was from a board member named James Meehan. It was later learned that he went and spoke with this board member and stayed there until about 2330 HRS.

A statement was taken from the suspect. Sgt Brown entered the statement into the word processors. The suspect gave him the text to enter. The suspect received suggestions from both Brown and myself so far as the content. He then was given a written statement from the computer which he reviewed. He decided to remove the words, "a ~~xxxxxxx~~ roman catholic priests", from the statement. A second statement with this deletion was made. It was again reviewed by the suspect. He was then asked if the statement was true and he swore it was so. He signed the document. We then arranged with the suspect to call us on Thursday, so that we could formalize what will take place on ~~xxxx~~ Friday. The suspect already had told us that he wanted to plead guilty and have his disposition all in the same court appearance. The suspect then left with Sgt Brown who had further conversations with him in the hallway.

The tape with the suspect initial interview on it has been logged in with Sgt Brown.

On 15 Nov 88, [redacted] and [redacted] came to the station concerning the suspect. He did not show for his meeting with [redacted]. They spoke to us about what process would take place. When they heard that the suspect stated he would resign from his position, they were relieved. They then became concerned about the suspect and the possibility of suicide. They arranged to seek him out to assist him on a personal basis. I also told them I had received word that a number of his possessions were already taken from his office. I suggested he might be having a hard time getting up the nerve to face any of them. They both left and said they would try to locate him.

On 15 Nov 88, [redacted] was briefed on this investigation. She wanted to be warned about any arrest since her son is unaware of the investigation.
