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INTRODUCTION

I.

Plaintiff and alleges in this action that he was sexually assaulted in
1982 and 1983 by Robert Van Handel, the Director of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir.
Plaintiff has sued Robert Van Handel. Plaintiff has also sued the Franciscan Friars of
California, Inc. (hereinafter the "Province"), the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Los Angeles
(hereinafter referred to as the "Archbishop"), and the Santa Barbara Boys Choir (hereinafter
the "Choir"). Against the Province and the Archbishop, plaintiff has alleged Seven Causes of
Action seeking compensatory damages.¹

Plaintiff alleges he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir and Robert
Van Handel was its Director. Although Robert Van Handel was a friar, a member of the
Province, and a member of the faculty of St. Anthony's Seminary, he was off-duty, engaged
in after school activities when he served as a Director of the Choir. The Santa Barbara Boys
Choir was not operated by the Province and had no relationship to the Province. Undisputed
facts show that the plaintiff never had any relationship with the Province, he did not rely on
any representations by the Province, and he was never in the care or custody of the Province.

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In this motion, the Province asks the court to summarily adjudicate six issues.
These six issues dispose of all causes of action against the Province and the Archbishop in
this case. Defendant asks, therefore, that summary judgment be granted in favor of the
Archbishop and the Province.²

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¹ Plaintiff has not included a claim of punitive damages against the Province or the Archbishop.

² When it originally filed this motion the Province asked only that the court grant summary adjudication in favor of the Province. Although the issues to be summarily adjudicated would have entitled the Province to summary judgment, the Province had chosen, for religious reasons, to <u>consent</u> to Entry of Judgment against the Province on the Sixth Cause of Action, without proof of the liability of the Province, if the jury were to find that plaintiff was sexually assaulted by Robert Van Handel and if the jury assessed compensatory damages in a trial in which evidence of the liability of the Province were not received. At plaintiff's request, and over the objection of the Province, this Consent to Entry of Judgment was (continued...)

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STATEMENT OF FACTS

Plaintiff alleges that in 1982, when he was approximately nine years old, he 3 4 joined the Santa Barbara Boys Choir. [Third Amended Complaint ("TAC") 8:6-7] Plaintiff 5 alleges that while he was a member of the Boys Choir he was sexually assaulted twice by its Director, Robert Van Handel. [TAC 11:27-12:4] Plaintiff claims that one assault occurred 6 while he and other members of the Choir were watching a video tape in a room at St. 7 Anthony's Seminary. [Plaintiff's deposition 39:7-24 (Exh. A)] Plaintiff claims that the 8 second sexual assault occurred when he was at a summer camp near San Simeon, California 9 10 with other members of the choir. [Plaintiff's deposition 46:5-18 (Exh. B)]

Robert Van Handel was ordained as a priest in 1975. [Declaration of Robert 11 Van Handel ("Dec. RVH") [2] He was a member of the Province of St. Barbara. [Dec. 12 RVH [2] He was assigned by his Provincial Minister to teach at St. Anthony's Seminary in 13 Santa Barbara. [Dec. RVH ¶3] Soon after Robert Van Handel arrived in Santa Barbara, he 14 15 founded the Santa Barbara Boys Choir with the assistance and cooperation of the parents of 16 some boys who wished to participate in the choir. [Dec. RVH 94] The Santa Barbara Boys Choir was a private, non-denominational choir. [Dec. RVH [4] It was not created by the 17 Province or operated by the Province. [Dec. RVH §5; Declaration of Mel Jurisich ("Dec. MJ") 18 **[[**3-5] While serving as the Director of the Choir, Robert Van Handel was not in the course 19 and scope of his duties as a faculty member of St. Anthony's or as a member of the Province. 20 [Dec. RVH ¶7; Dec. MJ ¶¶4 and 5] Robert Van Handel's activities for the Santa Barbara 21 22 Boys Choir were conducted in his off-duty time. [Dec. RVH ¶7; Dec. MJ ¶4]

The Santa Barbara Boys Choir was incorporated as a nonprofit, public benefit corporation in 1980. [Dec. RVH ¶4] Parents of boys in the Choir served on the Board of Directors of the Corporation. [Dec. RVH ¶4] The Boys Choir maintained its own bank accounts and raised its own operating funds. [Dec. RVH ¶5] The Boys Choir received no

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stricken from the Province's answer.

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financial assistance from the Province. [Dec. RVH ¶5; Dec. MJ ¶5] The Choir rented a 1 rehearsal room from St. Anthony's Seminary and paid \$100 per month rent for this room. 2 [Dec. RVH ¶5; Dec. MJ ¶5] From time to time the Choir also conducted other activities on 3 the property at St. Anthony's, such as rummage sales or patrons' dinners. When this 4 occurred, the Choir paid rent to St. Anthony's for the use of the property. [Dec. RVH ¶6] 5

Robert Van Handel's participation in the Santa Barbara Boys Choir was not 6 encouraged by the Province. [Dec. RVH ¶8; Dec. MJ ¶4] In fact, the Rector of St. 7 Anthony's Seminary, Father Mel Jurisich, felt that Robert Van Handel's participation in the 8 Santa Barbara Boys Choir detracted from Van Handel's commitment to St. Anthony's 9 Seminary, in particular to the Seminary choir consisting of students at St. Anthony's. [Dec. 10 RVH ¶8; Dec. MJ ¶4] These sentiments were communicated to Robert Van Handel. [Dec. 11 RVH [8; Dec. MJ [4] Despite this discouragement by the Rector of St. Anthony's, Robert 12 Van Handel was free to use his own time to pursue his activities with the Santa Barbara Boys 13 Choir and he did so. [Dec. RVH ¶8; Dec. MJ ¶4] 14

Plaintiff and his family are not and never were Catholic. [Depo. of plaintiff 15 ("Depo. SLA") 80:1-2 (Exh. I); Deposition 29:3-8 (Exh. E; Declaration of 16 "Depo. JCA") 37:6-7 (Exh. L). Before Plaintiff joined the Santa of 17 Barbara Boys Choir, plaintiff and his family knew no Franciscans. [Depo. SLA 100:19-18 102:21 (Exh. J); Depo. JCA 58:1-4 (Exh. P)] They spoke to no Franciscans concerning the 19 Santa Barbara Boys Choir. In fact, before plaintiff joined the Santa Barbara Boys Choir 20 21 neither he nor his family had any communications with any person, either written or oral concerning the Santa Barbara Boys Choir except plaintiff's mother had spoken with her 22 friend, a lay person (not a Franciscan) about the fact that 23 was 24 in the choir and the choir rehearsed at St. Anthony's and plaintiff's father had spoken with his a lay person (not a Franciscan) about the fact that 25 friend, was in the choir. [Depo. of plaintiff 116:9-14 (Exh. H); Depo. SLA 50:1-51:21 (Exh. K); 26 Depo. JCA 10:16-11;15 (Exh. N)] Other than these conversations with RT. 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· . 1	entity concerning the Santa Barbara Boys Choir before plaintiff joined the choir. [Depo. of
2	plaintiff 116:9-14 (Exh. H); Depo. SLA 50:25-51:15 (Exh. K); Depo. JCA 11:10-15 (Exh. N)]
3	Neither plaintiff nor his parents had any understanding that the Choir was operated by the
4	Franciscans or by the Archbishop. [Depo. of plaintiff 41:26-42:9 (Exh. C); Depo. SLA
5	100;11-101:12 (Exh. J); Depo. JCA 15:4-23 (Exh. M)] Certainly the plaintiff and his parents
6	did not have any understanding, based on anything that had been said or represented by the
7	Province, that plaintiff would be in the care and protection of the Province while he
8	participated in the Santa Barbara Boys Choir. [Depo. of plaintiff 41:26-42:9 (Exh. C); Depo.
9	SLA 100;11-101:12 (Exh. J); Depo. JCA 15:4-23 (Exh. M), 42:12-14 (Exh. Q)]
10	Plaintiff has never been in the care or custody of the Province or the
11	Archbishop. Plaintiff has never been a member of or a participant in any activity in which
12	the Province or the Archbishop was responsible for his care.
13	III.
14	SUMMARY OF ARGUMENT
15	The relationship, or more precisely the lack of any relationship, between the
16	plaintiff and the Province and the Archbishop, or between Robert Van Handel and the
. 17	Province or the Archbishop while Robert Van Handel acted as the Director of the Santa
18	Barbara Boys Choir is a sufficient basis to summarily adjudicate each of the causes of action
19	against the Province and the Archbishop in this case. Although there was clearly a
20	relationship between Robert Van Handel and the Province in Van Handel's capacity as a
21	member of the faculty of St. Anthony's Seminary, Van Handel's status as a member of the
22	faculty of St. Anthony's Seminary has no casual relationship with plaintiff joining the Choir
23	or with plaintiff's claims that he was molested while a member of the Choir.
24	The propriety of summary adjudication of each of the causes of action that has
25	been plead against the Province and the Archbishop is separately addressed in Section V,
26	below. But before turning to the Causes of Action that have been plead, defendant will show

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have not been alleged as the basis for any cause of action and can not be so alleged.

It is the responsibility of a defendant moving for summary judgment to negate 2 only the causes of action raised by the complaint. Joslin v. Marin Municipal Water Dist. (1967) 67 Cal.2d 132, 148; Hooks v. Southern Cal. Permanente Medical Group (1980) 107 Cal.App.3d 435, 442. A defendant is "not required to refute liability on some theoretical possibility not included in the pleadings." IT Corp. v. Superior Court (1978) 83 Cal.App.3d 443, 451.

IV.

CAUSES OF ACTION THAT HAVE NOT BEEN AND CANNOT BE PLEAD

The Third Amended Complaint alleges that Robert Van Handel was sexually 10 molested by a Franciscan Friar sometime between 1961 and 1965 and that this made it 11 12 probable that he would repeat this behavior as a perpetrator. [TAC 5:5-23] The Third 13 Amended Complaint also alleges that eleven other friars perpetrated sexual abuse on minor at 14 St. Anthony's seminary between 1964 and 1967 and that "the defendants did nothing to investigate, deter or prevent such conduct by the friars." [TAC 9:24-10:12] These 15 allegations, found in the general preamble to the complaint, are incorporated by reference in 16 17 all of the causes of action alleged, but are not specifically referred to as the basis for liability in any of those causes of action. And, in fact, these allegations are insufficient to state a 18 19 cause of action against the Province or the Archbishop as shown below.

20 A. Premises Liability:

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21 Plaintiff alleges that one of the two incidents of sexual assault upon him by 22 Robert Van Handel occurred at St. Anthony's seminary. [TAC 11:27-12:4] Plaintiff has not 23 asserted a cause of action for premises liability, nor could he. In Eric J. v. Betty M. (1999) 76 Cal.App.4th 715, the court held that there was no cause of action for premises liability 24 25 against the owner of premises where molestation occurred, even if the owner actually knows 26 that a person was a convicted child molester and that he had brought a child onto the premises. Unless the owner of the premises stands in some custodial relationship to the child RT. MORANZ or has a duty arising from some other source to control the conduct of the defendant than lero Center28 OFM VANH 1 - 5 -0218

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1 no liability based on the fact that molestation occurred on premises:

Under the circumstances of this case, premises liability is a make-weight because there was no relationship between the harm and any premises owned by family members on which the harm occurred.

<u>Eric J. v. Betty M.</u> (1999) 76 Cal.App.4th 715, 717. The court held that to state a cause of action for premises liability there must be some causal relationship between the premises and the harm and there was no such causal relationship in that case.

7 A similar result was reached in <u>Kramer v. State Farm Fire</u> and Cas. Co. (1999) 8 76 Cal.App.4th 332. In that case the issue was whether an insurance policy that covered 9 claims "arising from the ownership, maintenance, or use of the insured premises," covered 10 sexual molestation of a child on the premises. The court held that there must be a causal relationship between the use of the premises and the molestation in order for the harm to arise 11 out of the use of the premises. And because the molestation in that case (just as in this case) 12 had occurred at other locations in addition to premises owned by the defendants, it was clear 13 14 there was no causal relationship:

> The covered residences in this case were merely two of several locations at which the Kramers had custody and control of the children. The required causal relationship between use of those particular premises and the tortious activity causing the injury therefore was lacking.

18 Kramer, supra, 76 Cal.App.4th 341.

Thus, the mere allegation that plaintiff was sexually molested at premises owned by the Province is insufficient to state a cause of action. There are no allegations that some feature of the property was causally related to the harm in this case. Indeed, there could be no such allegation, where plaintiff also asserts that he was molested at a private campground, not owned by any defendant in this case.

24 B. <u>Second Generation Molestation</u>:

Plaintiff alleges that Robert Van Handel was himself molested by a Franciscan Friar sometime between 1961 and 1965. Plaintiff further alleges that it was therefore foreseeable that Robert Van Handel would repeat this behavior.

The allegation that Robert Van Handel was molested by a Franciscan 35 to 40

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years ago, even if proven true, cannot form the basis of liability in this case for two reasons. 1 First, if a Franciscan sexually molested Robert Van Handel 35 to 40 years ago, that 2 Franciscan was not in the course and scope of his employment as a matter of law. John R. v. 3 Oakland Unified School District (1989) 48 Cal.3d 438; Jeffrey E. v. Central Baptist Church 4 (1988) 197 Cal.App.3d 718; Rita M. v. Roman Catholic Bishop (1986) 197 Cal.App.3d 1453. 5 Second, there is no causal relationship between any alleged molestation of Robert Van Handel 6 and any later alleged molestation by Robert Van Handel as a matter of law. In Evan F. v. 7 Hughson United Mehodist Church (1992) 8 Cal.App.4th 828, a girl named Eyrene was 8 molested by her brother Evan. Eyrene claimed that her brother Evan had, in turn, been 9 molested by Dwayne Murphy who was employed by Hughson United Methodist Church. 10 Eyrene sued Dwayne Murphy and Hughson United Methodist Church, but the court granted 11 summary judgment in favor Murphy and the church. This was affirmed on appeal because 12 the court concluded, "on policy grounds, that Eyrene's injury was not proximately caused by 13 14 [the church]." Evan F., supra, 8 Cal.App.4th 838, nl.

Thus, even if plaintiff could establish as a fact that Robert Van Handel was molested by a Franciscan Friar 35 to 40 years ago, this would not entitle plaintiff to recover against either that individual Franciscan or against the Province. This assertion is causally unrelated to plaintiff's alleged injury as a matter of law.

19 C. <u>Aider and Abettor Liability</u>:

Plaintiff alleges that between 1964 and 1967 at least 11 friars at St. Anthony's
seminary sexually assaulted minors. The third amended complaint plaintiff alleges that,
"defendants did nothing to investigate, deter or prevent such conduct by the friars." [TAC
10:7-8] Plaintiff does not allege that the friars rendered "substantial assistance or
encouragement" to Robert Van Handel, or that Robert Van Handel was even aware of
misconduct by other friars.

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Even if plaintiff could prove that the Franciscans were aware of sexual misconduct of <u>other friars</u>, and even if plaintiff could allege that Robert Van Handel was aware of misconduct by <u>other friars</u> (a fact that plaintiff has <u>not</u> alleged) California law OFM VANH 1

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clearly holds that this is insufficient to state a cause of action.

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Restatement Second of Torts, Section 876, provides:

For harm resulting to a third person from the tortious conduct of another, a person is liable if he (a) orders or induces such conduct, knowing of the conditions under which the act is done or intending the consequences which ensue, or (b) knows that the other's conduct constitutes a breach of duty and gives substantial assistance or encouragement to the other so to conduct himself, ...

This rule as stated in the Restatement of Torts, has been adopted as the law of the State of 7 California. Pasadena Unified School District v. Pasadena Federation of Teachers (1977) 72 8 9 Cal.App.3d 100, 113. The California courts recognize that section 876 of the Restatement is liability for one who "aids and abets the commission of an intentional tort" by another person. 10 Saunders v. Superior Court (1994) 27 Cal.App.4th 832-846. The United States Supreme 11 Court has explained that Section 876 of the Restatement of Torts, "accepts a doctrine with 12 rough similarity to criminal aiding and abetting." Central Bank of Denver, N.A. v. First 13 Interstate Bank of Denver, N.A. (1994) 511 U.S. 164, 181, 114 S.Ct. 1439, 1450, 128 14 L.Ed.2d 119. 15 16 Plaintiff has not alleged that any other defendant "substantially assisted or encouraged" Robert Van Handel to molest plaintiff. Mere knowledge that other friars have 17

18 molested other children, or even knowledge that Robert Van Handel had molested plaintiff,

19 together with a failure to prevent this, does not constitute aiding and abetting:

> Mere knowledge that a tort is being committed and the failure to prevent it does not constitute aiding and abetting. [citation omitted] "As a general rule, one owes no duty to control the conduct of another."

Fiol v. Doellstedt (1996) 50 Cal.App.4th 1318, 1326. That case went on to state that, "mere 22 23 failure to act does not constitute the giving of 'substantial assistance or encouragement' to the 24 tortfeasor." Fiol, supra, 50 Cal.App.4th 1326.

25 In Cully v. Bianca (1986) 186 Cal.App.3d 1172, the court considered whether 26 liability could be imposed on passengers in a car operated by an intoxicated driver. In that case the passengers had ridden to and from the liquor store where the liquor was purchased dero Center 28 with the driver and had ridden to and from the area where the liquor was consumed with the OFM VANH 1 - 8 -

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driver. After the liquor was consumed, one of the passengers was riding with the intoxicated driver at the time of the accident with the plaintiff. Immediately after the collision the passenger yelled "go" to the intoxicated driver and the two left the scene. The Court held that this was insufficient to impose liability on the passenger saying:

> We believe that proof of such facts would fall short of establishing the "substantial assistance or encouragement" required by Restatement §876.

Cully v. Bianca (1986) 186 Cal.App.3d 1172, 1178. 7

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In Sindell v. Abbott Laboratories (1980) 26 Cal.3d 588, the California Supreme 8 Court considered whether plaintiff had alleged a cause of action under Restatement. 9 §876. Plaintiff in that case alleged that all of the manufacturers of the drug DES had 10 performed inadequate testing, knew that their testing was inadequate, relied on one another's 11 testing, yet entered into a "tacit understanding" not to warn that the testing was inadequate. 12 Based on those alleged facts, plaintiff asserted that all manufacturers of DES were generally 13 liable to her because the marketing of DES was a concerted action by all of the defendants 14 and that each of the defendants had substantially assisted and encouraged each of the other 15 16 defendants to improperly market the drug. The Supreme Court held that plaintiff had failed 17 to state a cause of action under Restatement §876:

> In our view, this litany of charges is insufficient to allege a cause of action under the rules stated above. The gravamen of the charge of concert is that defendants failed to adequately test the drug or to give sufficient warning of its dangers and that they relied upon the tests performed by one another and took advantage of each other's promotional and marketing techniques. These allegations do not amount to a charge that there was a tacit understanding or a common plan among defendants to fail to conduct adequate tests or give sufficient warnings, and that they substantially aided and encouraged one another in these omissions.

23 Sindell, supra, 26 Cal.3d 605. It is well established that, "mere failure to act does not 24 constitute the giving of 'substantial assistance or encouragement' to a tortfeasor." Fiol v. 25 Doellstedt (1996) 50 Cal.App.4th 1318, 1326. In Sindell, the Supreme Court went even 26 further, however, and expressed doubt that there could be liability as an aider and abetter even if it were proven that there was a "tacit understanding to fail to perform an act:" DETERT. MORAN

It seems dubious whether liability on the concert of action theory can be

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predicated upon substantial assistance and encouragement given by one alleged tortfeasor to another pursuant to a tacit understanding to fail to perform an act.

Sindell, supra, 26 Cal.3d 606. 3

4 A sexual assault upon a child is a crime. But unless the defendant stands in some special relationship to the criminal or the victim, the defendant has no duty to prevent 5 6 the crime even if the defendant knows the crime is occurring.

> It should be emphasized that all crimes are against the state and no citizen except those officials charged with the duty to do so, is required to take any affirmative action to prevent the commission of a public offense....

It is well settled that aiding and abetting the commission of a crime require some affirmative action. The mere knowledge or belief that a crime is being committed or likely to be committed, and the failure on the part of the one having such knowledge or belief to takes some steps to prevent it, in no sense amounts to aiding and abetting.

People v. Weber (1948) 84 Cal.App.2nd 126, 130. 12

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A case decided by the Missouri Court of Appeals is factually very similar to the allegations plaintiff makes in this case. In Bradley v. Ray (Mo.App.1995) 904 S.W.2d 14 15 302, a child was molested by her stepfather. The child alleged that her mother became aware 16 of the abuse and arranged to have the stepfather treated by two psychiatrists. Neither the mother nor either of the psychiatrists made a report of child abuse to any law enforcement 17 18 authority as required by the Missouri Child Abuse Reporting Act. Plaintiff alleged that after the stepfather began treatment with the two psychiatrists he continued to abuse her as a result 19 20 of the psychiatrist's failure to report the abuse. The child alleged three causes of action against the psychiatrists: (a) negligence per se based on failure to comply with the reporting 21 22 act; (b) common law negligence for failure to warn; and (c) aiding and abetting, under the authority of Restatement §876. The court of appeal held that plaintiff had stated a cause of 23 24 action for common law negligence for failure to warn pursuant to Tarasoff v. Regents of 25 University of California (1976) 17 Cal.3d 425. But the Court of Appeal held that the causes of action for negligence per se and for aiding and abetting were properly dismissed for failure 26 to state a cause of action. As to the claim of aiding and abetting, the Court stated that under DETERT. MORANT Restatement §876, "The defendant must affirmatively act to aid the primary tortfeasor; neither enharcadero Center28 **OFM VANH 1**

failure to object to the tortious act nor defendant's mere presence at the commission of the
 tort is sufficient to charge one with responsibility." <u>Bradley v. Ray, supra, 904 S.W.2d at</u>
 315. The Court held that plaintiff had not pled facts sufficient to state a cause of action under
 Restatement §876:

[P]laintiff did not plead facts which support a claim of aiding and abetting against defendants. Plaintiff merely states that Drs. Ray and Strnad were in agreement with Ms. Kopan [plaintiff's mother] "to shield and protect said Lester N. Pope [the stepfather] from further discovery, reporting and criminal prosecution regarding his said abuse of Kelly with the intent to thereby aid and abet said Lester N. Pope...." These facts do not establish that defendant affirmatively acted by giving substantial assistance or encouragement to Mr. Pope to abuse Kelly. Judgment of dismissal as to Count I is affirmed.

10 Bradley v. Ray, supra, 904 S.W.2d at 315.

In this case plaintiff alleges, in essence, that the Province did not viligantly police the behavior of <u>other friars</u> at St. Anthony's seminary and that this laxness by the province encouraged Robert Van Handel to molest the plaintiff. But this is insufficient to state a cause of action. Even if the allegation was made that the Province knew Robert Van Handel (as opposed to <u>other friars</u>) was molesting children, mere failure of the Province to take action to prevent further wrongdoing cannot be a basis of liability against the Province unless there is a duty on the province to take action.³

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Absent a "special relationship," one cannot be held liable for mere nonfeasance, such as not protecting another from a criminal attack by a third party.

20 Eric J. v. Betty M. (1999) 76 Cal.App.4th 715, 727. In that case the Court of Appeal

21 affirmed a nonsuit against a sexually molested child because, "The tort law of California does

22 not impose mandatory Good Samaritanism." Id.

Thus, no matter how rampant the sexual molestation of children may have been by other friars, and no matter how much the Province may have known about misconduct by

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other friars,⁴ mere failure to act on the part of the Province is not a basis for liability in this
 case.

SUMMARY ADJUDICATION OF EACH CAUSE OF ACTION AGAINST THE PROVINCE AND THE ARCHBISHOP SHOULD BE GRANTED.

There are seven causes of action in the third amended complaint asserted against the province and the archbishop. One or more essential element of each of those causes of action is indisputably missing.

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The Third Cause of Action of Intentional Infliction of Emotional Distress:

In the Third Cause of Action plaintiff alleges intentional infliction of emotional distress against Van Handel based on his alleged molestation of plaintiff when he served, during his free time, as Director of the Choir. Plaintiff alleges that the Province is liable for this intentional infliction of emotional distress based on the allegation that the Franciscans allegedly <u>ratified</u> Van Handel's behavior. Before a defendant can be held liable based on ratification it must be shown that the defendant had <u>actual knowledge</u> of what was done. Volandri v. Hlobil (1959) 170 Cal.App.2d 656.

> A principal is not bound by the unauthorized act of his agent unless he had knowledge of the agent's violation of his authority.

Montgomery v. Bank of America (1948) 85 Cal.App.2d 559, 564; See, also, In Re Estate of
Fletcher (1940) 36 Cal.App.2d 567. Constructive knowledge is insufficient to support a claim
of ratification. Reusche v. California Pacific Title Ins. Co. (1965) 231 Cal.App.2d 731;
Volandi v. Hlobil (1959) 170 Cal.App.2d 656.

"As a general rule, in order that a ratification of an unauthorized act of an agent may be valid and binding it is essential that the principal have full knowledge at the time of the ratification of all material facts and circumstances relative to the unauthorized act or transaction . . . unless the principal is wilfully ignorant or purposely refrains from seeking information." [citation omitted]

⁴ The Province by no means admits that it had knowledge of rampant sexual molestation by other friars at St. Anthony's Seminary before plaintiff claims he was molested by Robert Van Handel. The evidence is to the contrary. See Declaration of

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6 Gallagher v. California Pacific Title & Trust Co. (1936) 13 Cal.App.2d 482, 493.5

7 Plaintiff has testified in his deposition in this case that he told no one that he had been molested by Van Handel before 1997. [Plaintiff deposition, 57:6-26; Exhibit F to 8 Declaration of Heldt.] Undisputed evidence shows that the Province had no actual knowledge 9 that Van Handel had molested anyone until 1992. When the Province was first informed that 10 Van Handel had molested a child, he was immediately removed from all responsibilities, sent 11 to an in-patient facility for evaluation and treatment, and he has never been returned to any 12 pastoral duties for the Franciscans (or for anyone else for that matter). [Declaration of 13 "Dec. JC") ¶¶6 and 7] Robert Van Handel is no longer a member of the Franciscan 14 order. [Dec. RVH ¶14] 15

Plaintiff cannot shown this court a scintilla of admissible evidence of ratification. [Issue No. 2 to be summarily adjudicated.]

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. The Fourth Cause of Action For Negligent Infliction of Emotional Distress:

In the Fourth Cause of Action plaintiff alleges that, "the selection, approval, employment and supervision of Van Handel and Does 1-5 at St. Anthony's Seminary and the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir," caused plaintiff to suffer severe emotional distress. The evidentiary shortcoming of this allegation is that there is no evidence that the Province had anything to do with the selection, approval employment and supervision of Van Handel at "the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir," which was a distinct entity that Van Handel participated in

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⁵ Occasionally a failure to investigate a <u>specific complaint</u> of assault is treated as the equivalent of actual knowledge [McChristian v. Popkin (1946) 75 Cal.App.2d 249, 256] but no case has held that ratification can be found in the absence of actual knowledge and in the absence of a specific complaint of wrongdoing.

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while he was off duty.⁶ [Issue No. 4 to be summarily adjudicated] With regard to Van 1 Handel's "selection, approval, employment and supervision at St. Anthony's Seminary," the 2 defect in plaintiff's claim is that Van Handel's employment at the Seminary has no causal 3 relationship with any harm suffered by the plaintiff. [Issue No. 3 to be summarily 4 adjudicated] 5

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In Mendoza v. City of Los Angeles (1998) 66 Cal.App.4th 1333, the court of 6 appeal affirmed summary judgment in favor of the City who employed a police officer who 7 shot a family member while off duty. The court recognized that "liability for negligent hiring 8 9 and supervision," exists only, "in factual settings where the plaintiff's injury occurred in the work place, or the contact between the plaintiff and the employee was generated by the 10 employment relationship." Mendoza, supra 66 Cal.App.4th at 1339-1340. The court 11 recognized that, "failing to require a connection between the employment and the injured 12 party would result in the employer becoming an insurer of the safety of every person with 13 14 whom its employees come into contact, regardless of their relationship to the employer." 15 Mendoza, supra, 66 Cal.App.4th at 1341. The court of appeal went so far as to say, 16 "Assuming the evidence was sufficient to support the finding of negligence (and even if we 17 held it had a duty in this factual setting not to be), it was insufficient to support the finding of 18 causation." Mendoza, supra, 66 Cal.App.4th at 1342. Because there was no connection 19 between the victim who had been shot while the police officer was off duty, and the shooter's 20 employment as a police officer, the court of appeal reversed a judgment based on a jury verdict against the City of Los Angeles. 21

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Another case in which the existence of an employment relationship between the defendant and a criminal wrongdoer was held to be legally irrelevant to the case was Koepke 23

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Although Van Handel was discouraged from directing the choir because the time devoted to it detracted from his other duties, the Province had no reason to think that Van Handel's work with the choir was a bad thing. At various times, other friars referred to Van Handel's work with the choir as "good witness" of his faith and "excellent ministry." These complements (which are the kind that could be given to any layperson by any friend who shared his faith) do not make Van Handel an agent of the Province while serving as the Director of the Choir. OFM VANH 1

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1	v. Loo (1993) 18 Cal.App. 4th 1444. In that case, the plaintiff was shot by her ex-boyfriend
2	who was employed by the defendant. The defendant had actual knowledge that the employee
3	was alcoholic, owned a gun and had threatened the plaintiff. The employer went so far as to
4	take away the employee's gun, arrange for counseling, and warn the plaintiff. Later,
5	however, the employer returned the employee's gun without warning the plaintiff. The
6	employee then used this gun to shoot the plaintiff. The trial court granted summary judgment
. 7	to the employer and the Court of Appeal affirmed. Why? Because the missing ingredient
8	was any connection between the employment and the plaintiff; plaintiff's relationship with the
9	employee was unconnected with his employment.
10	We reject with little discussion the concept that the Loo-Logan
11	[employer-employee] relationship gave rise to a duty to warn Koepke [plaintiff]. Since Logan's [employee's] actions were in
12	no way related to his employment by Loo, the employer- employee relationship which existed between them cannot give
13	rise to a duty.
14	Koepke v. Loo (1993) 18 Cal.App. 4th 1444, 1452.
15	Thus, plaintiff can never prevail on his allegations of the fourth cause of action
16	against the Province.
17	C. <u>The Fifth Cause of Action for Negligent Hiring</u> :
18	In the Fifth Cause of Action plaintiff alleges that the Province was negligent
. 19	when they "hired Van Handel and Does 1-5 as employees of St. Anthony's Seminary and the
20	Santa Barbara Boy's Choir," because the Province "knew, or in the exercise of reasonable
21	diligence should have known," that Van Handel was incompetent and unfit. This cause of
22	action suffers the same infirmities as the fourth cause of action. The Province did not hire
23	Van Handel to serve as director of the choir; and Van Handel's employment on the faculty of
24	St. Anthony's Seminary has no causal relationship to his contact with plaintiff.
25	Furthermore, no evidence exists that the Franciscans were negligent when they
26	hired Van Handel to serve on the faculty of St. Anthony's Seminary. California law is very

One Embarcadero Center 28 Sixteenth Floor San Francisco, California 941113628	from the deviant propensities of another person, plaintiff must show that the defendant OFM VANH 1

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charged with negligence "must know" of the deviant propensities, not merely have a basis to 1 2 suspect. This was the precise question confronted by the court in Chaney v. Superior Court (1995) 39 Cal.App.4th 152. In that case a wife was sued for negligence after her husband 3 sexually abused children. The court of appeal stated in its opinion, "The question now is 4 what facts are required to be alleged to show a defendant wife's knowledge that her husband 5 harbors deviant propensities which would cause him to sexually molest a child," Chaney, 6 supra, 39 Cal.App.4th at 157. The court held that "actual knowledge" is required before a 7 defendant can be charged with negligence: 8

> Without knowledge of her husband's deviant propensities, a wife will not be able to foresee that he poses a danger and thus will not have a duty to take measures to prevent the assault. Although a wife's knowledge may be proven by circumstantial evidence, such inference must reflect the wife's actual knowledge and not merely constructive knowledge or notice.

Chaney v. Superior Court (1995) 39 Cal.App.4th at 157. The court in Chaney then went on to 13 examine the allegations of the complaint to determine if the allegations measured up to the 14 standard of "actual knowledge" if they were proven. The plaintiff in that case alleged that the 15 wife had "special and confidential information" about her husband's "deviant sexual 16 preferences and desires" which she failed to "recognize, accept and interpret." Plaintiff 17 alleged that the husband was "excessive" in his gift giving to the child and paid "excessive" 18 attention to her. The court of appeal held that these allegations were insufficient to withstand 19 a demurrer saying, "It is not enough to allege that the sexual misconduct was conceivable 20 [citation omitted]. The plaintiff must allege facts showing that it was foreseeable, i.e., facts 21 22 from which it can be inferred that the defendant wife must have known that her husband was engaging in, or wished to engage in, acts of sexual misconduct with a minor." Chaney, supra, 23 39 Cal.App.4th at 159 (emphasis in original). 24

In this case, undisputed evidence shows that the Province did not have actual knowledge of Van Handel's deviant propensities until 1992 when the first accusation of sexual misconduct was made against him. This was roughly 10 years after plaintiff says he was molested.

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D.

The Sixth Cause of Action for Negligent Supervision:

In the Sixth Cause of Action plaintiff alleges that the Province was negligent in 2 its supervision of Van Handel "in their employment" of him. This cause of action suffers the 3 4 same infirmities as the third and fourth causes of action. The Province did not employ Van 5 Handel as the director of the choir and had no duty to supervise him in that capacity. With regard to Van Handel's employment on the faculty at St. Anthony's Seminary, this 6 employment has no causal relationship or connection to the plaintiff in this case. Mendoza v. 7 City of Los Angeles (1998) 66 Cal.App.4th 1333. Koepke v. Loo (1993) 18 Cal.App. 4th 8 1444. 9

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The Seventh Cause of Action for Breach of Fiduciary Duty:

In the Seventh Cause of Action plaintiff alleges a breach of fiduciary duty on the basis that plaintiff was in the Province's "custody and control" on an ongoing basis during 13 1982 and 1983 while "participating in activities of the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir." The factual defect of this cause of action is that the Province has no connection with the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, nor did plaintiff or his family ever think that the Province had any connection with the Santa Barbara Boys Choir. Plaintiff was not in the custody and control of the Province while he was participating in activities of the Boy's Choir.

18 In addition to this glaring factual defect, the court has also previously sustained a demurrer to this cause of action because the law does not recognize a fiduciary duty arising 19 20 out of either a pupil-school relationship [see, Martin v. Roman Catholic Archbishop (1958) 21 158 Cal.App.2d 64, 68] nor on the basis of a priest-parishioner relationship [Roman Catholic 22 Bishop v. Superior Court (1996) 42 Cal.App.4th 1556-1568 ("There is no special relationship 23 here creating a heightened duty of care based on a priest/parishioner relationship.")] Plaintiff 24 has attempted to amend this cause of action but the amendments are merely cosmetic. This 25 cause of action is susceptible both to summary adjudication and to judgment on the pleadings.

F. The Eighth Cause of Action for Negligent Per Se:

In the Eighth Cause of Action plaintiff alleges that the Province is guilty of negligence per se because it failed to make reports of suspected child abuse pursuant to Penal OFM VANH 1

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Code §11166. Leaving aside that there is no evidence that the Province failed to make any 1 mandatory report required by the Penal Code before plaintiff alleges he was molested, the 2 3 California Supreme Court has also held that the reporting scheme of Penal Code §11166 "was intended to protect only those children in the custodial care of the person charged with 4 reporting the abuse, and not all children who may at some future time be abused by the same 5 offender." Randi W. v. Muroc Joint Unified School Dist. (1997) 14 Cal.4th 1066, 1087. In 6 that case the plaintiff had never been in the custodial care of the former employer of the 7 person she accused of molestation; therefore the Supreme Court held she could not state a 8 cause of action for negligence per se against that former employer of the alleged molester. 9 The same is true in this case. Plaintiff has never been in the custodial care of the Province or 10 11 the Archbishop. Therefore plaintiff has no standing to pursue a negligence per se cause of action against the Province or the Archbishop based on an allegation that the Province or 12 Archbishop failed to report suspected child molestation by Van Handel. 13

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The Ninth Cause of Action for Negligent Misrepresentation:

15 In the Ninth Cause of Action plaintiff alleges that the Province negligently represented that plaintiff "would be under the protection and in the care of" the Franciscans 16 while he participated in the Choir; that the "Santa Barbara Boys Choir director" was of "high 17 18 religious, moral and scholastic character," and that the Franciscans "accepted and assumed 19 responsibility for the religious, physical, emotional, psychological, educational and moral while he was in defendant's custody and/or control." The glaring factual 20 well-being of deficiency of this case of action is that neither the plaintiff nor his parents had heard anything 21 said on any subject by any Franciscan before plaintiff joined the Boys Choir. Plaintiff and his 22 family did not know any Franciscans before plaintiff joined the Choir and had never 23 communicated with any Franciscan. Plaintiff and his family were not Catholics. Plaintiff and 24 his family had not seen any written materials concerning the choir before plaintiff joined the 25 Choir. Plaintiff and his family had talked only to two persons about the Choir before plaintiff 26 a personal friend of plaintiff's father, and joined the Choir. These two persons, RT. MORAN27 a personal friend of plaintiff's mother, are both lay people who were, at that **₩28**

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time, members of the board of directors of the Boy's Choir. Neither

2 had any relationship with the Franciscans that would permit them to speak on
3 behalf of the Province. Thus, the cause of action for misrepresentation is susceptible to
4 summary adjudication because no representations on any subject were ever made to the
5 plaintiff or her parents by the Franciscans.

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V.

SUMMARY JUDGMENT SHOULD BE GRANTED TO THE ARCHBISHOP

The Archbishop truly has no legally cognizable relationship to the events of 8 this case. Robert Van Handel was never an employee of the Archbishop. St. Anthony's 9 Seminary was not operated or controlled by the Archbishop. The Santa Barbara Boys Choir 10 11 was not operated by the Archbishop. Plaintiff was never in the care or custody of the 12 Archbishop. The Archbishop never made any representations to plaintiff or his family about 13 anything related to the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, St. Anthony's Seminary, or Robert Van 14 Handel. Plaintiff and his family are not even Catholic. In the absence of all these facts, the 15 Archbishop owes no duties to plaintiff that will support any of the causes of action of the -16 complaint.

17 It is proper for the Province to request entry of summary judgment in favor of
18 the Archbishop because plaintiff has alleged that the Archbishop is the agent of the Province.
19 [TAC 4:6-11]

VI.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons set forth above, undisputed evidence shows that one or more essential elements is missing from each cause of action against the Province and the Archbishop. Defendant asks therefore that the court grant summary judgment in favor of the Province and the Archbishop.

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

As we promised we would do in our meet and confer telephone conference on Monday, January 10th, this letter outlines for you the initial round of depositions we intend to notice and take in this matter. Rather than unilaterally setting dates for the depositions, as you did, and then refusing to alter the schedule, I am inviting you to call my office and provide me with dates that would be convenient for you and, insofar as the list includes individuals who are still Friars, your clients. I have marked with an asterisk the names of those individuals that I understand to still be associated with the Friars and for whom I intend to issue only a Notice of Deposition. If I am incorrect with regard to any of these individuals, I expect you to let me know so that I can arrange to have them subpoenaed to attend the deposition(s). 2. Regarding the scheduling of these depositions, we believe that under CCP § 2025(c), it would be appropriate to ask the court to order most of the depositions of your client's employees in Santa Barbara, since they are spread all over the state. This would allow us to do more depositions in a much shorter period of time, and would dramatically reduce the expense to all parties. Please let me know your thoughts on this.

3. In your list of depositions, you identified an individual by the name of That name is unknown to us and does not appear in any of your interrogatory answers. Would you kindly advise us of who this person is, what his relationship with this lawsuit is, and the nature of the anticipated deposition testimony.

4. Your deposition notices of **Example 1** in Colorado and **Example 2** in Arizona are defective. Both Colorado and Arizona require a commission issued by a

court of competent jurisdiction, in this case the Santa Barbara Superior Court. A commission can only issue by noticed motion, which you did not do. Consequently, the depositions cannot go forward and any subpoenas you may have served on these deponents are of no force and effect. Please confirm in writing that these depositions are off calendar. Before you go to the time and expense of seeking a commission and having all of us travel to Colorado and Arizona, I suggest you allow my office to take the lead in coordinating the depositions of these two individuals in California. I believe they would both be willing to come to Santa Barbara where they could stay with friends and/or relatives, so the cost to the Friars would be far less than the other alternative. Please advise me of how you intend to proceed in this regard.

5. In our meet and confer session, we discussed the fact that both Mr. Roden and I have calendar conflicts on the date that you scheduled Robert Van Handel's deposition, January 25th. This conflict, the fact that you cannot compel us to move forward with Van Handel's deposition until we have received proper responses to our written discovery (which you asked for and the court granted more time to respond), and the fact that we have a motion to continue the hearing on the motion for summary judgment set on that same date in Santa Barbara, certainly amount to just cause to ask you to reset this deposition for a later date. However, you indicated that you would not consider changing this date because you felt you needed testimony from Mr. Van Handel to buttress your summary judgment motion. I find this strange, since you have virtually unlimited access to Mr. Van Handel and can obtain by declaration any testimony you want. The attorney for Mr. Van Handel has informed me that you are essentially directing Mr. Van Handel's defense in this case, as well as that of the Friars and the Archdiocese. If that remains your position, then we have no option but to file and serve a motion for a protective order. The filing of the motion does, of course, stay the deposition until the court can hear the motion, which we will schedule on the first available court date.

6. Scheduling depositions so as to take unfair advantage of your opponent constitutes sanctionable conduct under CCP § 128.5. Your motives here are transparent. You did not extend the normal professional courtesy of coordinating deposition dates. You have intentionally tied up virtually every day that plaintiff could have noticed depositions between now and the date of our presently due opposition to your motion for summary judgment. 

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INTERROGATORY #9:

As indicated in answer to interrogatory #7 above, by the early 1970's Robert Van Handel had clearly developed a sexual attraction

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to young boys. His interest in young boys was also noted in his 1 1970-1971 Semi-Annual Report #1 wherein it was written that "His 2 principal interest has been in the area of working with children. 3 One of his projects has been to organize and direct a boy's choir 4 for the Newman Center.... In his 1971-1972 Semi-Annual Report #1, 5 it is again noted that "His work with the Boys Choir at the Newman 6 Center, demanding as it is, is well worked into his schedule and he 7 shows good sense in making necessary choices." The Definitorium 8 clearly had the ability to approve or disapprove of this and other 9 Friar activity, as evidenced by Van Handel's March 22, 1973 letter 10 requesting permission to participate in a study on children and 11 dated March 28, 1973, government, and the response of 12 communicating the Definitorium's enthusiasm over the project and 13 granting "permission" for Van Handel to accept. 14 On November 4, 1978, after Van Handel had sought permission to travel abroad with 15 16 the Boy's Choir, wrote to him and acknowledged the "immense amount of good you have done with them and in the 17 community through them (the choir)." It was also recognized in 18 that letter that the project would mean a shift of Van Handel's 19 workload to other Friars while Van Handel prepared over the next 20 seven to eight months for the trip. On October 4, 1982, Van Handel 21 sought permission from the Definitorium to travel to England and 22 Ireland on what was best described as a church tour during the 23 months of July and August, 1983. On October 11, 1982, in response 24 to that request, the Definitorium wrote back and informed Van 25 Handel that "...you have our permission." On October 24, 1986, Van 26 Handel again wrote to the Definitorium, again asking for permission 27 28 to travel with the Boy's Choir to England and Switzerland this

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time. In that letter, he points out that "While resident in Oxford 1 Cathedral the choir practiced three times a day and performed a 2 Sunday was a day spent in church with three 3 service daily. separate and different services." Predictably, the Definitorium 4 wrote back on October 31, 1986 and approved the travel, noting that 5 "We do affirm your work with the choir and the contribution that it 6 makes." On January 14, 1988, in applying for graduate studies at 7 UCSB, Van Handel wrote to the Friars Committee for Graduate 8 Studies, noting in that letter that "I am already serving the ġ province as administrator of St. Anthony's Seminary and chaplain to 10 the 'Greater Community.' This could continue as well as my 11 outreach work through and with the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir." 12 On September 10, 1989, in yet another travel request for a trip to 13 England, Van Handel points out that on this trip the tentative 14 plans are "...to go to Lichfield Cathedral (North of Birmingham) 15 and to sing the choral services there for a week. Then we would 16 17 travel west into northern Wales before going to Cork, Ireland. We hope to be able to sing at St. Finbar's Cathedral, Cork, and 18 19 possibly at the Franciscan church in that city." In response, the Definitorium wrote back on September 27, 1989 and advised Van 20 21 Handel "With this letter, please receive the formal permission of 22 the definitorium to travel to England next summer. We believe that 23 your work with the boy's choir is a good witness in Santa Barbara 24 and a fine ministry for you to be involved in." The witnesses to the above would be Robert Van Handel, unknown persons who completed 25 26 his evaluation forms, members of the Devinitorium (unknown 27 identity), , and The 28 Friars' Committee for Graduate Studies. The documents are



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

This agreement is made between Robert Van Handel (hereinafter referred to as "Robert") and the Franciscan Friars of the Province of St. Barbara (hereinafter referred to as "the Franciscans") on this ____ day of _____, 1998.

Financial Assistance

Subject to the conditions set forth below, the Franciscans agree to pay Robert's housing costs for up to one year, to give him a monthly stipend for support, in an amount to be established by the Franciscans in their sole discretion, for up to one year, and to pay for costs of therapy, by a therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans, for up to one year. If Robert is able to support himself in less than one year, he is to assume his own support and the Franciscans may terminate financial assistance to Robert. If Robert is not able to support himself within one year, the Franciscans agree to evaluate after one year whether continued financial support for housing, monthly living expenses or therapy is appropriate for a second year.

Conditions to be Placed on Financial Support

1. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the costs of Robert's housing, the Franciscans shall have the right to approve or reject the place Robert chooses to live.

2. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the cost of therapy for Robert, Robert consents to disclosure of information from his therapist to the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans on the subjects of (a) whether Robert remains committed to the therapeutic goals, (b) whether continuing therapy will be beneficial, and (c) whether Robert presents a risk to any identifiable person or persons.

3. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way Robert agrees to faithfully visit the therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans and to pursue the goals of therapy.

4. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way, Robert agrees to obey all the terms of his parole or probation, including the obligation to register as a sex offender in any county where he resides. Robert consents to answer questions asked of him concerning his compliance with the terms of his probation and agree to provide the name and phone number of his probation officer as well as his consent that the probation officer may answer any questions

concerning Robert's probation asked by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans.

5. So long as the Franciscans provide financial support to Robert in any way, Robert agrees to seek and maintain suitable employment which does not involve working with children.

6. So long as the Franciscans provide any financial support for Robert, Robert agrees to disclose his efforts to seek employment and his financial condition, including the amounts of any wages or salary he is earning, an account of his financial obligations, and disclosure of any credit he has been extended.

7. Robert agrees he will have no overnight visits with children or with families having children, either in his home or in their home, unless in the presence of the children's parents who know of his conviction and its nature. Robert also agrees that he will spend no time with any child one-on-one, outside the presence of another adult.

8. Robert consents to disclosure by the Provincial Minister or his delegate to the press, to the public, or to any individual, of the nature of the support he is receiving and, if the Franciscans think it prudent or expedient, the conditions that have been placed on that support. Robert also consents to disclosure by the Provincial Minister or his delegate to the press, to the public, or to any individual, of statements describing the Franciscan's objectives in providing financial support to Robert, such as statements illustrated by the two block quotes in the next section of this agreement.

9. Robert consents to disclosure by the Franciscans to any of Robert's landlords, employers, prospective employers, co-workers, prospective co-workers, and others of Robert's conviction and its nature, if the Franciscans think it prudent or expedient.

10. If Robert does not abide by all of these conditions, then Robert understands that the financial support will be terminated immediately.

11. The financial support is for one year and it can be negotiated for a second year.

Answers to Questions of the Press or Public

The Franciscans may be questioned following the release of Robert from prison. The Franciscans, either as an

organization, or as individuals, may be asked to comment in general on the release of Robert, or on his relationship to the Franciscan Order. The Franciscans may also be asked more specific questions if it is known the Franciscans are providing support to Robert.

The extent of support to be provided to Robert by the Franciscans, and the conditions placed on that support, may be shared with all members of the Province, together with a prepared statement, along the following lines, that can serve as a guide to any Franciscan who is contacted or called upon to address the public or the press concerning the situation:

> Robert Van Handel has been (will be) released from prison in May 1998. While Robert Van Handel was in prison, he asked for and received an indult from the Vatican to be released from his vows and dispensed from priestly obligations. Robert Van Handel is now a layperson.

Although Robert Van Handel is no longer a Franciscan Friar of the Province of St. Barbara nor a Catholic priest and is not now a member of any Catholic religious order, the Franciscan Friars of the Province of St. Barbara have agreed under specified conditions to help in supporting him for a period of time, in finding suitable employment, in obtaining a suitable place to live, and in receiving needed therapy to help prevent re-offending.

The Franciscan Friars have agreed to provide this financial support for several reasons. Among those reasons is the requirement of Canon Law that a religious order is, "to observe equity and evangelical charity toward the member that is separated from it." In addition, however, the Franciscans remember the hope expressed by many victims that their painful disclosures would at least help prevent future wrongs. That hope of prevention of future wrongs cannot be best achieved if the Franciscans simply wash their hands of Robert now that he has left the Order. Therefore, the financial support to Robert Van Handel has certain conditions

> attached. To receive financial support Robert may not accept work with children. He must remain in therapy, and he must comply with the terms of his probation, including registering as a sex offender, among other things.

In 1993, the Franciscans made a public apology and a promise to work to prevent harm in the future when the Board of Inquiry publicly released the report of its investigation into the accusations of misconduct by friars at St. Anthony's Seminary. The Franciscans have endeavored to honor that pledge by addressing the needs of victims and their families who have sought help through the Board of Inquiry, many of whom are still receiving therapy. Robert Van Handel is in need of this healing assistance as well and does not, as yet, have the ability to provide it for himself.

It is the hope of the Franciscans that the assistance they offer to Robert Van Handel, as well as the assistance they continue to offer to his victims and others, will help prevent other wrongs in the future and will help restore the health and faith of so many people that has been tested.

If questions or concerns are raised that reveal a more specific awareness of the terms of the agreement between Robert and the Franciscans, or that probe more specifically the rationale for the Franciscans providing support to Robert, the following further statement can serve as a guide for a response:

> Although the Franciscans are required by Canon law to act with charity toward our former member, Robert Van Handel, we have not forgotten the past. Our support of Robert Van Handel has conditions attached. For instance, in order to receive financial support from the Franciscans, Robert has agreed that we may speak with his therapist to determine whether Robert remains committed to the goals of his therapy. In addition, to receive financial support from the Franciscans, Robert has agreed that we may

speak with his probation officer to determine if Robert is obeying all the terms of his probation. As long as Robert receives any financial support from the Franciscans, he has agreed that the Franciscans may disclose to his employers, co-workers, and others his conviction and its nature.

The Franciscans have attached these and other conditions to their financial support of Robert not so that he can begin a new life in a new place free of his past, but so that he can begin a new life in a new place in light of his past. When many of the victims came forward and shared their pain with the Board of Inquiry, they expressed the hope that their disclosures would make a difference for the future. They asked important questions about what the Franciscans would do to prevent such a thing from happening again and, more specifically, what the Franciscans would do to prevent Robert Van Handel from repeating his behavior. Robert Van Handel has now left the Franciscan Order and the Franciscans cannot control his life. But by helping Robert to establish a new life for himself, and attaching conditions to the support, the Franciscans hope that the new life Robert builds for himself will be amid a network of people who are aware of his past and in that way may serve as a check against any reoccurrence of his behavior. [The Independent Response Team, created by the Franciscans to identify and offer aid to victims, will be asked to enforce the conditions on the assistance offered to Robert Van Handel.]

The Franciscans have not forgotten the needs of Robert's victims in agreeing to provide financial support to Robert Van Handel. To contrary, the Franciscans have remembered the needs expressed by Robert's victims that their pain and disclosure should help spare children in the future.

This writing contains the entire agreement between Robert and the Franciscans. There are no other terms or agreements between Robert and the Franciscans that are not expressly set forth in writing.

This agreement may only be modified in writing, signed by Robert and by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscan Province of St. Barbara.

I hope this letter finds you well and enjoying the spring weather.

Last weekend, my sister, Christine, brought my parents down from Portland, Oregon, to visit me. We had a wonderful few days in Pacific Grove, and although it was cool and breezy, my parents really enjoyed escaping rainy Portland. The last time I saw my parents I was in prison in Vacaville. I tried to get up to see them at Thanksgiving, but Oregon Parole would not allow me in the state.

I was very sorry to hear about Berard's death. He had been a good friend to me; I always felt he understood my feelings, and he was supportive without being suffocating. Of course he certainly understood that I could not be in Santa Barbara for his funeral. I have heard many good things about the ceremonies and talks. I had to say "goodbye" from a distance. Bro. Angelo gave me a card from the funeral, and I hope I am still on the list to receive the obituaries.

In just over a week it will be one year since I was released on parole (May 25). I am very grateful to you and the friars for your most generous support of me during this transition. It has been difficult at times, but I felt cared for and loved by my family, friends, and the friars. I think Bro. Fabian has taken me on as his private apostolate! I can't imagine how I would have made it without so much help.

If I remember correctly, our agreement is to be reviewed by you at the end of one year, with the possible extension to a second year. As I think you know, I have been working for four months with Roger Holton, who was until recently employed by Aqua Prima, Inc; selling distilled drinking water machines. I am his administrative/sales assistant. I receive a base salary of \$500 a month plus a percentage of commissions, but we rarely sell a unit, so I have made little money. I am still working for Roger, (who now sells cars), and I am following up on the water customers who were good prospects. I have learned a lot about business, and about maintaining a computer database, but I am no where close to financial independence. Actually right now I am working on an idea of

starting my own business as a personal secretary/bookkeeper to the elderly who cannot take care of matters on their own, but I will tell you more of that later. Meanwhile I would like to request a continuance of the support I am receiving from the friars. Dr. Rosales is familiar with my present circumstances and he would be happy to share his thoughts with you on this matter. I would be pleased to meet with you or your delegate if that is in order. Thank you.

Quite independently of this request, I have written down some of my own thoughts on the past year while looking toward my second year on parole. As you might find it of interest, I will include it in this letter. I also gave a draft copy to Dr. Rosales.

Once again, many, many thanks for your help and support. If the opportunity presents itself, please pass on my gratefulness to the Province.

<u>ONE YEAR OUT – A SELF ASSESSMENT</u>

<u>GOALS</u>

My primary goals were to avoid re-offending, maintain a clear parole record, continue my therapy sessions in PTA and elsewhere, make a smooth transition to life on my own, discover a career or job that met my needs financially and gave me a sense of purpose, in general make a place for myself in society.

INITIAL RELEASE

My first hours out on parole were mixed with elation at being out and free, and fear of being discovered by the public. In the first few weeks I was nearly paranoid. I listened for every car that entered the lot at the Wiebe Motel. I was frightened by every telephone call. The press and some civic leaders were trying to locate me, and it was only with the help of Wes Ellison. Parole Agent, that I was not fully exposed. There was a large, noisy community meeting in San Juan Bautista. I was in the papers and on the news. This was a very dicey period for me. Wes has said that my name still comes up in community meetings. I still have to be very careful in Hollister and San Juan.

PAROLE & LEGAL MATTERS

I was blessed with a concerned, helpful parole agent. Wes has advised me about how to stay out of trouble, has visited me regularly, has shielded me from the press and others, found a place for me to live, and yet maintains a professional distance. Every day I contact parole regarding my activities. Wes introduced me to some of the local police and sheriffs. Recently, with Wes at my side, I appeared before a law enforcement committee in Santa Cruz to answer questions about my offenses and life. At present there is a civil suit against the Province, and me, but I have been advised to not respond, as I have no wealth or property.

FINANCES

The Franciscans have from the beginning been my sole support. Besides providing me with a car, auto insurance, and health insurance, they pay all of my bills. I am extremely grateful for their generosity.

On February 15, I started working for Roger Holton as an administrative/sales assistant with a small base salary and one-third of all commissions. Unfortunately we have not had much success at this business, we have made little money, and Roger has left the company. Soon I will have to find another job. I am presently working on an idea of starting a service as an in-home secretary to those who need such. It seems that financial independence is still in the distance. Herb and Beverly Liberman have given me a lot of assistance and encouragement in finding my place in the employment world.

<u>MEDICAL</u>

The Franciscans are paying for my Blue Cross Medical and Dental coverage. I have had some dental work done, and I need more, but I am waiting for the completion of one year of coverage so that the cost will be reduced. Basically I am in good physical condition, but there are a few old problems (blood pressure, hypothyroid), and one new one: Parkinson's Disease. I am only in the first stage of Parkinson's, but it affects my typing and coordination, particularly of my left hand.

THERAPY

Through the generosity of the Franciscans, I have been able to participate in a number of therapeutic experiences. I am a client of Pacific Treatment Associates in Santa Cruz where I participate in group therapy with Mary Simoni, a special "tape" group, workshops, and individual therapy with Dr. Vee Duvall. I am in weekly contact with Dr. Israel Rosales who coordinates my program on behalf of the Franciscans. Until recently I also met quarterly with Dr. Frank Lanou who worked for the parole system. Finally I am under the psychiatric care of Dr. William Harmon who treats me for depression.

SOCIAL LIFE

Outside of the Franciscans and PTA, I have made only one new friend: Bette Baptista, my landlady. I joined the choir at St. Mary's, Gilroy, but I had to give that up after a short time because too often children were at the practices. I volunteered for a short time at Dorothy's Place in Salinas, but I didn't like it there very much. I did enjoy volunteering at the St. Francis Catholic Kitchen in Santa Cruz, and I became somewhat friendly with the people there, but I had to quit when I started working for Roger

Bro. Fabian has been a great friend to me and he visits me regularly. I have also had rewarding visits from several Franciscans who have over and over shown their enduring friendship. I have been to San Diego twice to visit my sister, Christine; I have been to San Francisco and Berkeley, and I spent several wonderful days in Yosemite.

Oregon Parole would not let me visit my parents at Thanksgiving, but they are coming to see me in the middle of May.

SPIRITUAL MATTERS

I continue to pray the "Daily Office," and I go to Mass on Sundays, but I have not been able to establish satisfying contact with a religious community. I am conscious that I am not welcome in area churches, and my experiment at St. Mary's in Gilroy failed. I am grateful for God's goodness to me and of his protection, but even in prison I had a community with which to pray. This lack has exacerbated my distance from the Franciscan Order.

SUMMARY

Half full – Half empty. That's the story here. I have come a long way from the terrors of my first days on parole. I have gained confidence and I am better able to deal with stress and my fear. I have not been "found" by those who would expel me, and I have enjoyed living in my little trailer in Hollister. Roger has been an employer and a friend. I have always enjoyed great support from my family and from the Franciscans. I am able to see most things in a much more balanced way, and as a result, things in general seem to be going much better now.

<u>GOALS – YEAR II</u>

In addition to continuing the goals from last year, some new ones have come to the fore. I need to make new friends. One of my goals for the second year is to find some organization or club—maybe connected with UCSC—where I will feel comfortable meeting people with whom I share an interest. Perhaps I will take a class at the university. Maybe there is a chapter of the American Guild of Organists in the area. Even though this will mean driving even more than I already do, I need to develop in this area.

Usually I attend Sunday Mass at Mission San Juan Bautista. I used to go to St. Mary's in Gilroy, but the pastor there, while telling me I was welcome, told we that he was nervous about my being there. I have not contacted the pastor at the Mission. I arrive late, sit by myself if possible, or next to an adult, and then I leave early so that the fewest possible number of people see me. Remember the people of San Juan met with we when I was first released to make sure I didn't settle in their town. This sort of shy appearance at services leaves me feeling estranged from a worshipping community. I would like to find somewhere that I could be an active part of the church without all the ramifications associated with "being found out."

I would like to move into a larger trailer, actually a mobile home, when one becomes available at my trailer park. I have already asked the landlady to hold one for me. While my rent would go up, living in a larger place would be a big improvement as then I could have my books, a chair, and even an office. Somewhere further down the line I would like to explore moving out of Hollister to Santa Cruz or some similar community, but now is not the time for a move.

This agreement is made between Robert Van Handel (hereinafter referred to as "Robert") and the Franciscan Friars of the Province of St. Barbara (hereinafter referred to as "the Franciscans") on this ____ day of _____, 1998.

Financial Assistance

Subject to the conditions set forth below, the Franciscans agree to pay Robert's housing costs for up to one year, to give him a monthly stipend for support, in an amount to be established by the Franciscans in their sole discretion, for up to one year, and to pay for costs of therapy, by a therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans, for up to one year. If Robert is able to support himself in less than one year, he is to assume his own support and the Franciscans may terminate financial assistance to Robert. If Robert is not able to support himself within one year, the Franciscans agree to evaluate after one year whether continued financial support for housing, monthly living expenses or therapy is appropriate for a second year.

Conditions to be Placed on Financial Support

1. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the costs of Robert's housing, the Franciscans shall have the right to approve or reject the place Robert chooses to live.

2. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the cost of therapy for Robert, Robert consents to disclosure of information from his therapist to the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans on the subjects of (a) whether Robert remains committed to the therapeutic goals, (b) whether continuing therapy will be beneficial, and (c) whether Robert presents a risk to any identifiable person or persons.

3. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way Robert agrees to faithfully visit the therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans and to pursue the goals of therapy.

4. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way, Robert agrees to obey all the terms of his parole or probation, including the obligation to register as a sex offender in any county where he resides. Robert consents to answer questions asked of him concerning his compliance with the terms of his probation and agree to provide the name and phone number of his probation officer as well as his consent that the probation officer may answer any questions

concerning Robert's probation asked by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans.

5. So long as the Franciscans provide financial support to Robert in any way, Robert agrees to seek and maintain suitable employment which does not involve working with children.

6. So long as the Franciscans provide any financial support for Robert, Robert agrees to disclose his efforts to seek employment and his financial condition, including the amounts of any wages or salary he is earning, an account of his financial obligations, and disclosure of any credit he has been extended.

7. Robert agrees he will have no overnight visits with children or with families having children, either in his home or in their home, unless in the presence of the children's parents who know of his conviction and its nature. Robert also agrees that he will spend no time with any child one-on-one, outside the presence of another adult.

8. Robert consents to disclosure by the Provincial Minister or his delegate to the press, to the public, or to any individual, of the nature of the support he is receiving and, if the Franciscans think it prudent or expedient, the conditions that have been placed on that support. Robert also consents to disclosure by the Provincial Minister or his delegate to the press, to the public, or to any individual, of statements describing the Franciscan's objectives in providing financial support to Robert, such as statements illustrated by the two block quotes in the next section of this agreement.

9. Robert consents to disclosure by the Franciscans to any of Robert's landlords, employers, prospective employers, co-workers, prospective co-workers, and others of Robert's conviction and its nature, if the Franciscans think it prudent or expedient.

10. If Robert does not abide by all of these conditions, then Robert understands that the financial support will be terminated immediately.

11. The financial support is for one year and it can be negotiated for a second year.

Answers to Questions of the Press or Public

The Franciscans may be questioned following the release of Robert from prison. The Franciscans, either as an

organization, or as individuals, may be asked to comment in general on the release of Robert, or on his relationship to the Franciscan Order. The Franciscans may also be asked more specific questions if it is known the Franciscans are providing support to Robert.

The extent of support to be provided to Robert by the Franciscans, and the conditions placed on that support, may be shared with all members of the Province, together with a prepared statement, along the following lines, that can serve as a guide to any Franciscan who is contacted or called upon to address the public or the press concerning the situation:

> Robert Van Handel has been (will be) released from prison in May 1998. While Robert Van Handel was in prison, he asked for and received an indult from the Vatican to be released from his vows and dispensed from priestly obligations. Robert Van Handel is now a layperson.

Although Robert Van Handel is no longer a Franciscan Friar of the Province of St. Barbara nor a Catholic priest and is not now a member of any Catholic religious order, the Franciscan Friars of the Province of St. Barbara have agreed under specified conditions to help in supporting him for a period of time, in finding suitable employment, in obtaining a suitable place to live, and in receiving needed therapy to help prevent re-offending.

The Franciscan Friars have agreed to provide this financial support for several reasons. Among those reasons is the requirement of Canon Law that a religious order is, "to observe equity and evangelical charity toward the member that is separated from it." In addition, however, the Franciscans remember the hope expressed by many victims that their painful disclosures would at least help prevent future wrongs. That hope of prevention of future wrongs cannot be best achieved if the Franciscans simply wash their hands of Robert now that he has left the Order. Therefore, the financial support to Robert Van Handel has certain conditions

> attached. To receive financial support Robert may not accept work with children. He must remain in therapy, and he must comply with the terms of his probation, including registering as a sex offender, among other things.

In 1993, the Franciscans made a public apology and a promise to work to prevent harm in the future when the Board of Inquiry publicly released the report of its investigation into the accusations of misconduct by friars at St. Anthony's Seminary. The Franciscans have endeavored to honor that pledge by addressing the needs of victims and their families who have sought help through the Board of Inquiry, many of whom are still receiving therapy. Robert Van Handel is in need of this healing assistance as well and does not, as yet, have the ability to provide it for himself.

It is the hope of the Franciscans that the assistance they offer to Robert Van Handel, as well as the assistance they continue to offer to his victims and others, will help prevent other wrongs in the future and will help restore the health and faith of so many people that has been tested.

If questions or concerns are raised that reveal a more specific awareness of the terms of the agreement between Robert and the Franciscans, or that probe more specifically the rationale for the Franciscans providing support to Robert, the following further statement can serve as a quide for a response:

> Although the Franciscans are required by Canon law to act with charity toward our former member, Robert Van Handel, we have not forgotten the past. Our support of Robert Van Handel has conditions attached. For instance, in order to receive financial support from the Franciscans, Robert has agreed that we may speak with his therapist to determine whether Robert remains committed to the goals of his therapy. In addition, to receive financial support from the Franciscans, Robert has agreed that we may

> speak with his probation officer to determine if Robert is obeying all the terms of his probation. As long as Robert receives any financial support from the Franciscans, he has agreed that the Franciscans may disclose to his employers, co-workers, and others his conviction and its nature.

The Franciscans have attached these and other conditions to their financial support of Robert not so that he can begin a new life in a new place free of his past, but so that he can begin a new life in a new place in light of his past. When many of the victims came forward and shared their pain with the Board of Inquiry, they expressed the hope that their disclosures would make a difference for the future. They asked important questions about what the Franciscans would do to prevent such a thing from happening again and, more specifically, what the Franciscans would do to prevent Robert Van Handel from repeating his behavior. Robert Van Handel has now left the Franciscan Order and the Franciscans cannot control his life. But by helping Robert to establish a new life for himself, and attaching conditions to the support, the Franciscans hope that the new life Robert builds for himself will be amid a network of people who are aware of his past and in that way may serve as a check against any reoccurrence of his behavior. [The Independent Response Team, created by the Franciscans to identify and offer aid to victims, will be asked to enforce the conditions on the assistance offered to Robert Van Handel.]

The Franciscans have not forgotten the needs of Robert's victims in agreeing to provide financial support to Robert Van Handel. To contrary, the Franciscans have remembered the needs expressed by Robert's victims that their pain and disclosure should help spare children in the future.

This writing contains the entire agreement between Robert and the Franciscans. There are no other terms or agreements between Robert and the Franciscans that are not expressly set forth in writing.

This agreement may only be modified in writing, signed by Robert and by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscan Province of St. Barbara.

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Canon law instructs a religious institute, "to observe equity and evangelical charity toward the member who is separated from it." Robert Van Handel was laicized in 1997 and is expected to be released from prison on parole in approximately May, 1998. The Provincial has written to the parole authorities to request that Robert Van Handel be released to live outside of Santa Barbara, specifically to San Francisco, Alameda or Sacramento counties, in order of priority, and has informed the parole authorities that the Franciscans are willing to help Robert in several ways, including financial assistance to 1) find adequate housing, 2) prepare for and obtain suitable employment, and 3) obtain professional therapy.

This plan describes the offer that is proposed to be made to Robert, as well as the commitments proposed to be asked of Robert in return. The plan also describes the proposed response to the press and to the public when questions are raised concerning the Franciscans' financial assistance to Robert.

Financial Assistance

5 . .

It is proposed to commit initially to pay Robert's housing costs for up to one year, to give him a monthly stipend for support for up to one year, and to pay for costs of therapy, by a therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans, for up to one year. If Robert is able to support himself in less than one year, he should be expected to assume his own support. If Robert is not able to support himself within one year, it is proposed that the Franciscans agree <u>now</u> to evaluate after one year whether continued financial support for housing, monthly living expenses or therapy was appropriate. With regard to therapy beyond the first year, it is likely that Robert will not have sufficient resources to pay for the costs of therapy even if he is then employed. It is proposed that the Franciscans agree <u>now</u> to favorably consider funding the cost of therapy beyond one year, and then on a year-to-year basis,

Conditions to be Placed on Financial Support

It is proposed that some conditions be placed on the Franciscans' agreement to provide financial support to Robert Van Handel.

1. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the costs of Robert's housing, the Franciscans will ask for the right to approve or reject the place Robert chooses to live. The purpose of this requirement is both fiscal, so that the place where Robert lives will be appropriately modest as befits one supported by a religious organization, as well as practical, to ensure that

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Robert's housing is not unduly close to any schools, homes, or other places where children or families might feel threatened by Robert if they were aware of his conviction and its nature.

2. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the cost of therapy for Robert, Robert should consent to disclosure of information from his therapist to the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans on the subjects of (a) whether Robert remains committed to the therapeutic goals, (b) whether continuing therapy will be beneficial, and (c) whether Robert presents a risk to any identifiable person or persons.

3. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way Robert must agree to faithfully visit the therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans and pursue the goals of therapy.

4. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way, Robert must agree to obey all the terms of his parole or probation, including the obligation to register as a sex offender in any county where he resides. Robert must consent to answer questions asked of him concerning his compliance with the terms of his probation and agree to provide the name and phone number of his probation officer as well as his consent that the probation officer may answer any questions concerning Robert's probation asked by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans.

5. So long as the Franciscans provide financial support to Robert in any way, Robert should agree to seek and maintain suitable employment which does not involve working with children.

6. 10. If Robert does not abide by all of these conditions, then Robert understands that the financial support will be terminated immediately.

11. The financial support is for one year and it can be negotiated for a second year.

Reaching an Agreement With Robert Van Handel

Robert Van Handel has written to the parole authorities on January 21, 1998, asking that he be permitted to live in San Francisco when he is released on parole. Among other things, his letter states that, "Franciscans Friars of California agreed to fully fund all living expenses for an extended period, or until no longer needed." The Franciscans must have a clear understanding and agreement with Robert Van Handel concerning the financial commitment the Franciscans are willing to make. Robert's letter to the parole authorities describes the extent of financial commitment as "fully fund" and describes the duration of the commitment as "an extended period." Robert may mean by these expressions the same extent and duration of commitment that this proposal describes. On the other hand, Robert may have different expectations as to what the Franciscans are willing to offer. In addition, the parole authorities may have an understanding that Robert has received a commitment of financial support that will last at least for the duration of his parole, which is likely to be more than a year.

A discussion with Robert Van Handel should be undertaken before the terms of his parole are finalized so that the extent and duration of the Franciscans' commitment is

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mutually agreed upon and can be accurately described to the parole authorities if specific questions are asked. The agreement should be in writing to avoid later misunderstanding.

Answers to Questions of the Press or Public

It is the hope of the Franciscans that the assistance they offer to Robert Van Handel, as well as the assistance they continue to offer to his victims and others, will help prevent other wrongs in the future and will help restore the health and faith of so many people that has been tested.

If questions or concerns are raised that reveal a more specific awareness of the terms of the agreement between Robert and the Franciscans, or that probe more specifically the rationale for the Franciscans providing support to Robert, the following further statement can serve as a guide for a response:

> Although the Franciscans are required by Canon law to act with charity toward our former member, Robert Van Handel, we have not

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> forgotten the past. Our support of Robert Van Handel has conditions attached. For instance, in order to receive financial support from the Franciscans, Robert has agreed that we may speak with his therapist to determine whether Robert remains committed to the goals of his therapy. In addition, to receive financial support from the Franciscans, Robert has agreed that we may speak with his probation officer to determine if Robert is obeying all the terms of his probation. As long as Robert receives any financial support from the Franciscans, he has agreed that the Franciscans may disclose to his employers, co-workers, and others his conviction and its nature.

> The Franciscans have attached these and other conditions to their financial support of Robert not so that he can begin a new life in a new place free of his past, but so that he can begin a new life in a new place in light of his past. When many of the victims came forward and shared their pain with the Board of Inquiry, they expressed the hope that their disclosures would make a difference for the future. They asked important questions about what the Franciscans would do to prevent such a thing from happening again and, more specifically, what the Franciscans would do to prevent Robert Van Handel from repeating his behavior. Robert Van Handel has now left the Franciscan Order and the Franciscans cannot control his life. But by helping Robert to establish a new life for himself, and attaching conditions to the support, the Franciscans hope that the new life Robert builds for himself will be amid a network of people who are aware of his past and in that way may serve as a check against any reoccurrence of his behavior. [The Independent Response Team, created by the Franciscans to identify and offer aid to victims, will be asked to enforce the conditions on the assistance offered to Robert Van Handel.]

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> The Franciscans have not forgotten the needs of Robert's victims in agreeing to provide financial support to Robert Van Handel. To contrary, the Franciscans have remembered the needs expressed by Robert's victims that their pain and disclosure should help spare children in the future.

Monitoring And Enforcement of Conditions

If conditions are placed on the financial support that is provided to Robert Van Handel, then someone should be given the responsibility to enforce the conditions. A specific person should be assigned the task of regularly checking on Robert's efforts to find employment, on his financial condition, on his compliance with the terms of parole, and on his living arrangements. The proposed conditions give the Franciscans the right, if they think it prudent, to disclose Robert's conviction and its nature to his employer, co-workers, or others. The person charged with enforcing the conditions should periodically check to determine the nature of Robert's employment and the nature of his living arrangements, as well as what is known about Robert by his co-workers and neighbors to determine whether a disclosure by the Franciscans is prudent.

Financial Assistance

Subject to the conditions set forth below, the Franciscans agree to pay Robert's housing costs for up to one year, to give him a monthly stipend for support, in an amount to be established by the Franciscans in their sole discretion, for up to one year, and to pay for costs of therapy, by a therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans, for up to one year. If Robert is able to support himself in less than one year, he is to assume his own support and the Franciscans may terminate financial assistance to Robert. So long as the Franciscans contribute to the cost of therapy for Robert, Robert consents to disclosure of information from his therapist to the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans on the subjects of (a) whether Robert remains committed to the therapeutic goals, (b) whether continuing therapy will be beneficial, and (c) whether Robert presents a risk to any identifiable person or persons.

3. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way Robert agrees to faithfully visit the therapist approved by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans and to pursue the goals of therapy.

4. So long as the Franciscans contribute financially toward Robert's support in any way, Robert agrees to obey all the terms of his parole or probation, including the obligation to register as a sex offender in any county where he resides. Robert consents to answer questions asked of him concerning his compliance with the terms of his probation and agree to provide the name and phone number of his probation officer as well as his consent that the probation officer may answer any questions

concerning Robert's probation asked by the Provincial Minister of the Franciscans.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you, my brothers, that Robert Van Handel will be released from prison sometime in May. While Robert was in prison, he asked for and received an indult from the Vatican to be released from his vows and dispensed from priestly obligations. Robert Van Handel is now a lay person. Although he is no longer a friar and a priest, and not a member of any Catholic religious order, the Province has agreed to support him for a period of time in order to help Robert find suitable employment and to help him to find a suitable place to live. We have also agreed to help him receive needed therapy during this time. We have agreed to provide this financial support for several reasons. We know that both our Franciscan legislation and canon law ask us to observe evangelical charity and equity toward the member who has left the Order (Canon 702, General Statute 237). In addition, however, we remember the hope expressed by many that the painful disclosures would at least prevent future wrong. I believe that the prevention of future wrong cannot be best achieved if we simply wash our hands over the financial support to Robert Van Handel. To receive the Franciscan support, Robert must fulfill certain conditions among which are the following: (a) he must remain in therapy; (b) he must comply with the

He cannot, as yet, provide it for himself due to the vow of poverty under which he has lived for so many years. It is the hope of the friars that the assistance we offer to Robert, as well as the assistance we continue to offer to the victims and to others, will help prevent such wrongs in the future and will help restore the health and the faith of so many people. I am sure you can see that the Province is very concerned about the victims demands for future protection; our attempt to meet these demands has led us to place the many conditions on the financial support to Robert.



The Provincial Definitorium of the Province of St. Barbara met to discuss the status of Robert Van Handel's relation to the Order now that he has been convicted and sentenced for the sexual molestation of someone under 16 years of age. The Definitorium must consider if Robert is to be dismissed from the Order according to Canon 1395.2. The Canon does not require dismissal (si casus ferat). However, the Definitorium must review the case and offer an opinion to the Minister Provincial.

The Definitorium looked at the factors involved in this discussion: liability for the Province, scandal for the people of God, health of Robert, good of the fraternity, the gospel way of life, the timing and the situation, the reputation and morale of the local community that he might live with if he stays in the Order.

The Definitorium examined the following options available to it:

a. do nothing

b. dismiss him immediately

c. decide not to dismiss

- d. request letter from Robert in which he would ask to leave the Order
- e. delay any final decision.

The Definitorium is recommending to the Provincial Minister that he not act at this time, but leave the option open for review in the future and that such a review should take place in a year. The Definitorium recommends the above action for the following reasons:

- the frail psychological state of Robert Van Handel
- the lack of further information regarding liability implications
- the expectation of the people of God that the Province oversee Robert in the future

• the desire of the majority of friars to balance justice with mercy in the treatment of Robert

give Robert time to discern hown own future vocation

• the Province's plan to set up a house of containment could impact Robert's future.

reported to the Definitorium that he had visited Robert at the San Luis Obispo Men's Colony. During his visit, **mail** raised a number of issues with Robert. One such issue was Robert's future once he is released from prison. Robert and the Definitorium will need to look at a number of options.

It was also reported that individuals are coming forward at this time who say that they were abused by Robert from the years 1984 - 1989 when Robert left Santa Barbara.

It was agreed that there would be a thorough evaluation of Robert's situation at the November meeting of the Definitorium.

The Definitorium reviewed the situation of Robert Van Handel. He is presently in the State Prison at Vacaville, California and has a possible release date of March 1998.

the Provincial Minister, made the following observations:

· Robert has not given any consideration as to his future after his release date;

· It is a fact that he will always be in a high risk category which means that he

will always need a high level of constant care and monitoring.

In discussing the various options open to Robert, the Definitorium made the following points: • Robert needs to work through his future vis a vis the Order: it would be preferable

if he made the decision while he was in a safe environment;

· Robert as part of his decision-making process needs to understand the

severity of limitations that will be placed on him if he remains in the Order.

It was agreed that this Definitorium would like to set as its goals with respect to Robert:

help him make the decision to leave the Order on his own;

assure him that the Order would take care of him during his probation and help

him during his probation to leave the Order and get established;

· make a final decision on this issue by September 1996.

If Robert does not agree to the above, it was the <u>tentative opinion</u> of the Definitorium that the Canon Law regarding dismissal from the Order should be invoked in this case.

Peace and good.

At the last meeting of the definitorium in November we discussed your concerns in full session, and with the full consent of the definitorium and on my authority as provincial minister, I would like to answer your concerns in a formal way.

Clearly, we all recognize the extraordinary circumstances which occasion your concerns. I have just sent your petition for laicization to Rome and we can hope for some action in the next six months. Thank you for freely taking this courageous step.

Juridic relationships and the responsibilities which go with them are one thing; the bonds of friendship and love are entirely different. The Provincial Minister and the definitorium are bound by the common law of the Church and by the dictates of the Order's <u>Constitutions</u>. Upon a juridic severance from the Order, there is explicit provision that the demands of justice and charity be met in some way.


Recognizing this in your situation, the definitorium has established a "transition fund" which should aid you in a return to the law state and secular work after a release from prison. This fund is at the discretion of the provincial minister, but it is common and necessary that the demands of the law be met. I know that myself and others will be speaking with you and will accompany you to see how we might be of support.

I had a long talk with Skip Howie, Robert's civil attorney in San Jose. He had several issues on the agenda:


Robert's name in the lawsuit: he wants to talk with Nick Heldt but he feels that Robert should default on it (I gather that means not to respond). As Skip put it: why should the friars pay an attorney to protect Robert's assets when he doesn't have assets? They can sue Robert for any amount but if he does not have anything, then they can't get anything. In addition Robert's in jail so what does he care? I believe Skip is trying to save us some money.

He is trying to figure out for himself what he can do for Robert. He genuinely likes Robert and feels that he ought to do something. He talked about going down to Wasco. As Robert's attorney, he could get in but will that cause more problems especially if he tries to get Robert protected. He would be taking on the prison system and that might hurt Robert more. That is why he really does not know what to do.

In connection with #1, he wanted to know if the insurance carriers agreed to defend Robert. I said to the best of my knowledge each of the carriers has denied that they have an obligation to defend the individual friars. That is why he thought it best for Robert to default.

OFFENSE: The subject was arrested on warrant #443356 issued at the request of the Santa Barbara Police Dept on March 17, 1994. Detective Mike McGrew began his investigation on March 7, 1994, following the complaint of a former student at St. Anthony's Seminary, Santa Barbara, CA. The warrant was issued based on the allegations of sexual abuse in violation of 288(a) PC on the former member of the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir based at St. Anthony's Seminary, Santa Barbara, CA. The multiple incidences involving the victim in this action are reported to have started in 1983 and continued unabated until 1989. The offenses appear to be limited to the repeated erotic stimulation and fondling the of boys whose ages ranged from age eight (8) to age fourteen (14). No oral copulation or sodomy incidents are alleged or acknowledged to have been a part of this abuse pattern. The subject was arrested, without incident, on 03-22-94 at St. Francis Retreat House, San Juan Bauptista in San Benito County, California. The subjects bail has been set a \$250,000.00.

RESIDENCY/EMPLOYMENT: The subject was residing at the St. Francis Retreat Center at San Juan Bauptista, in San Benito County, California. The telephone number there is (408) 623-4234. He was placed there following his release from the treatment program at St. Luke Institute, Suitland, Maryland. He had been placed at St. Luke's from June 1992 for thirteen (13) months until he was transferred to St. Francis in July 1993. He remained there, entering another treatment program, until his arrest on the above charges on March 22, 1994.

When the defendant was transferred to St. Francis in San Juan Bauptista he entered the therapy program offered by Pacific Treatment Associates in Santa Cruz, CA. He attended a combination of individual and group counseling four (4) times per week. The program site is located about a 45 minute drive from St. Francis. This program is also used by the Santa Cruz County Probation Department for those persons on its caseloads that exhibit problems of a sexually deviant nature. In addition to being involved in counseling as noted above he also attends the Twelve (12) Step program through S.L.A.A. (Sex and Love Addicts Anonymous) telephone #(408)423-2377. The subject is reportedly being taught to avoid situations that would tempt him to re-enter the ranks of active child molestation. While the defendant still has sexual fantasies and thought of young boys he is now in a position to exercise control. He has been assigned duties that will not place him in a position of having an influence over or association with children. The subject states that he is never sure when his touching,

tickling, and hugging of the children would go from expressing love and happiness and began to enter the realm of molestation.

PRIOR RECORD:

The subject has no prior arrests. His NCIC, DMV, CLETS are returned clear.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: The subject is a Catholic Priest who was removed from active service in that office following a letter dated June 23, 1994 and mailed to the subject, plus three superiors or colleagues, from a parent of an earlier victim. The heartache and loss of faith that runs through this entire case is embodied in that letter. The letter was without rancor but expressed in no uncertain terms that the subject was badly in need of help, he should never be allowed to be in a position to have even the most casual contact with children, and that he should not function as a minister or priest ever again. According to the defendant that appears to have been the reaction of his superiors also.

The onset of the abuse, in this case only, is established as occurring on a regular basis from March 1983 and continued to September 1989. At that time the victim who was then fourteen (14) years old entered a drug rehabilitation program. According to police reports the nature of the incidents continued to involve the increasingly erotic rubbing of the victim's stomach, bare back, legs, and eventually extending beneath the clothing to the genitalia of the young victims. The defendant's victims were almost always selected from among the eight (8) to fourteen (14) year old. The subject was almost always seen by the boys as a "father figure", an authority figure, and a trusted member of the victims "extended family". This deception and molestation continued during the years of 1983 until 1989 according to this particular victim. Reportedly, the six (6) year statute of limitations has expired on approximately fifteen (15) other cases that are not considered as part of this action.

So far as this officer is aware the etiology of the exposure of this case can be attributed to one of the earlier victims whose parents wrote a letter to the defendant outlining the elements of the abuse that their son had suffered at the hands of this defendant. That letter was sent to the defendant on April 23, 1992. It was simultaneously sent to three (3) of the defendants superiors: Apparently, steps were immediately taken to remove the defendant from his priestly duties, remove him from the community, SANTA BARBARA MUNICIPAL COURT # FOUR OR/BR HEARING REPORT PAGE 3

and place him in the treatment program at St. Luke's at Suitland, Maryland where he essentially remained until his transfer to St. Francis into another treatment modality. The subject reports that he is taking, by injection, an unspecified dosage of Depo-provera, which is a testosterone suppressant, as a component of his treatment. The defendant does not express a belief that he is now or will ever be "cured" of his illness. What he does state is that he is learning to anticipate and avoid situations where he might be required to make a conscious choice regarding his overt behavior. For example; he does not stroll down streets without purpose, does not go near shopping malls to just brouse. If he is required to go shopping he goes straight to where his items are located and leaves the area immediately.

When questioned in reference to his self-concept he expressed a tremendous and ever present sense of remorse, of not being able to put his life back together in a meaningful manner. He reflected on his feeling of deep sorrow on his loss of being able to help people as a priest. He acknowledges the wisdom of the restrictions that have been placed on by the church and what will most likely be imposed by the state. He anticipates a period of prison and then his eventual return to the Franciscan life as a bookkeeper for a retreat that is isolated. The subject has two masters degrees and is considered highly intelligent.

In addition to two interviews with the subject this officer has read and viewed documents and personal journals written by the defendant. That the defendant has reflections of suicidal thought processes is interwoven in his writings. This was considered as a problem solving technique or solution when he would contemplate the cost of exposure for what he has done. He has tremendous fears of going to jail and this is compounded by his realization and acknowledgement that he will be classified as a pedophile while in custody. However, this does not prevent his feelings of arousal in reference to young boys. The arresting officer notes that the defendant has several contacts and friends outside of the U.S.A. These could conceivably be considered as havens and refuges if the subject were released and succumbed to the temptation to give in to an impulse to run. The subject stated that he was not seeking a released from custody. Further he related that he has no place to go that would accept him. As previously noted the defendant expects his future to include a prison commitment. The subject was himself the subject of sexual abuse at St Anthony's as a student. He accepts responsibility for perpetuation of the tendency for the abused to later in life becoming the abuser and in turn creating

another link in a very sordid and tragic continuation of harmful behavior. There is little doubt in the mind of this writer and also in the mind of the defendant that the defendant has caused irreparable damage to many of his victims. The church has contacted all of those students who were effected by this and others and provided psychiatric and psychological counseling in an effort to contain and correct the damage in as far as they could do so.

There have been no formal reference contacts made in this defendant behalf in that the Court did not grant the Unit sufficient time to conduct a thorough investigation between arraignment and this OR/BR Hearing. An effort was made to contact them but as yet this writer has not had any response from them. This writer does not believe that the provided references are hesitant to assist the defendant, but rather there has been an insufficient amount of time allowed in this case.

The defendant is not an acceptable candidate for O.R. consideration for several reasons. The defendant was and must be returned to his treatment mode if and when he is released under any circumstances. He is not now and most likely will never be "cured" of his tendency to think and, given the circumstances, react as a pedophile. He has, in his words, no place to live that is convenient to the Court for future hearings. The needed and necessary treatment modality is not available in this area. The defendants thought control is insufficient to provide an adequate deterrent to his sexual tendencies. So far as is known the church will not be able to provide reasonable supervision nor duplicate the living environment that is vital to this defendant. There is a natural tendency for the subject to want to flee this area in that it is hear that his worst nightmares were realized and even now continue to unfold. Out of his therapeutic milieu the subject is very near the consideration provided in Section 1275 of the Calif. Penal Code. The subject fears facing his victims or their parents. All of the above contribute to the reasonable considerations leading to the denial of an O.R. release.

RECOMMENDATION: THAT O.R. BE DENIED/ THAT BAIL BE SET IN AN AMOUNT OF NOT LESS THAN \$250,000.00


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

On 03/01/94 at approximately 1400 hours, ;, came to the Santa Barbara Police Department to report a 288 PC, Child Molest, which occurred between the years of 1983 through 1989.

Narrative:

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It should be noted that some of the child molest acts occurred outside of the statute of limitations. is now 18 years of age; these acts occurred when he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir at St. Anthony's Seminary located at 2300 Garden Street. The molest acts occurred when was 8 or 9 years of age and ended when he was 14 years of age, spanning the years 1983 through 1989. The suspect in the case was the choir director, Robert VanHandel.

told me that when he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, his name at that time was went on to tell me he has since changed his name, and he now uses his mother's maiden name of went on to tell me the reason he has done that is that he feels that he is starting his life over now and the change of name gives him a fresh start. stated he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, which had approximately 30 members. stated his father left when he was approximately 4 years of age. went on to say that Robert VanHandel, the choir director, was a father figure to him and that he trusted him. At the time of most of these incidents, Robert Van Handel lived at the Seminary at St. Anthony's. believes he is now living in the Northern California area.

stated he was in the choir when he was 7 1/2 years of age all the way through 14 years of age. stated that the offenses occurred when he was either 8 or 9 years of age, which is 1983 or 1984. said that all of the molest acts completely ended by the time he was 13 years of age or very early when he was 14 years of age. said he went into a drug rehabilitation in December of 1989 at the age of 14. said that no acts occurred after he went into rehabilitation.

stated that he really cannot come up with specific dates and times for what had occurred because it happened so often. : said at the time, he was living with his mother and sister at 15 South Soledad Street, #6, and for the most part, all of these molest incidents took place in Robert VanHandel's apartment at the Seminary. said there were also some trips that he and other choir members went on which molest acts occurred as well: : said that VanHandel's apartment was upstairs at "the casa," which was located on Seminary grounds.

stated that quite often he would stay at Robert VanHandel's apartment. He stated that always on Tuesday nights and on Sundays he would spend the night. said there were sometimes on Thursdays and once in a while Fridays and Saturdays he would also spend the night at Robert VanHandel's apartment. stated that on Tuesday nights, he attended CRIME/INCIDENT CONTINUATION

the boys choir practice in the afternoon somewhere around 2:30 that lasted until about 4:00 or 4:30 in the afternoon. stated he didn't have a father and his mother was a chef working many, many odd shifts, and he hardly saw her. There were times when his mother was leaving for work very, very early in the morning and there were times she worked extremely late. said he spent an immense amount of time at the Seminary staying with Robert VanHandel.

In reference to the molest acts that occurred, stated that when he did stay at VanHandel's apartment, that he wore pajamas, and just before bedtime, said he was lying almost asleep on a bed and that Robert VanHandel would come up and start massaging his back or his stomach area, whichever way was lying at the time. went on to say that Robert VanHandel would start by massaging him on top of his clothing and then eventually he would start massaging him underneath his pajamas. said that VanHandel would start massaging his genital area.

believed that VanHandel had his clothes on while he was giving a massage. did not know if VanHandel tried to masturbate while giving a massage. said that there were no words spoken between them.

time was there any oral sex involved and at no time did reciprocate in masturbating VanHandel. said these acts of massaging his genital area occurred until he fell asleep, and this would be at times a half hour duration.

stated he did not tell anyone about what had happened, and at the time, he did not believe that VanHandel was doing anything wrong because this was coming from someone who he trusted and looked up to.

In reference to out; of town trips, stated that he traveled with Robert VanHandel to Canada and believes it was Expo 1986 when they were in Canada for approximately three weeks. said they traveled in a camper with two to three other boys who were in the choir. Robert said that the massaging of his VanHandel was the only adult. genitals happened while they were in the camper when he would - sleep next to VanHandel. said between the years 1984 to 1987, that he went with Robert VanHandel to Yosemite three to four times. This was also in a camper, and it was mainly during the Thanksgiving weekend and one time during the Easter break. During these trips to Yosemite, again, VanHandel would sleep next to and again would molest him by massaging his genitals.

stated that during the summer of 1987, the entire choir went to England and traveled Europe. : stated he could not specifically remember VanHandel molesting him while they were in Europe.

said there are people who could verify he spent a lot of time at Robert VanHandel's apartment. stated there is a person by the first name of **section** was a student at the Seminary and was living in the same apartment as Robert VanHandel but in a different bedroom. **Section** lived there for approximately one year. said he would be able to get an address and telephone number of **section** through his therapist.

stated he would also play with a boy by the first name of who lived in an adjacent apartment to VanHandel at "the casa." did not know what the mother's name was but believed she had something to do with the Waldorf School. said that recently played a part in the movie "Hocus Pocus." believed that Santa Barbara Police Department Officer Debbie Daily would know who mother is.

In terms of the Statute of Limitations, it is believed that Robert VanHandel spent some time out of the State of California. Somewhere between 1982 and 1983, VanHandel took a six month sabbatical to England and stayed at Abingdon near Oxford, although I'm not sure of the name of the school there. Also, between May of 1992 through June of 1993, the Catholic Church sent Robert VanHandel to a treatment center in Suitland, Maryland, which is just outside of Washington D.C., a place called St. Luke's.

Current president of the St. Anthony's Boys Choir is Marianne Hellman. Her husband, Robert Hellman, is the current choir director. They live on Cheltenham Road and have access to scrapbooks of the boys choir which maygive more specific dates and times as to when the acts occurred.

also believes there is another choir member by the name of ; who may also have been a victim of Robert VanHandel's. believes that Marianne Hellman might be able to supply the address and telephone number of to verify.

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Dear Robert,

To begin, let me remind you that while I was recovering from my illness, I told you that I needed to talk to you. The time for the talk never came because I was still weak and you had the demands of a hectic schedule and move facing you.

Had that talk occurred, I would have told you that we had learned that a member of your Franciscan community, in addition to Phil Wolfe, had engaged in sexually inappropriate behavior with one of our boys when he was quite small that was upsetting to him at the time it was occurring. The memory remains with him.

I would have told you and I wished to tell ______ and the others of your organization that it is clear that many of the activities you men undertake are too dangerous to young people and yourselves to be continued. The risks are too great. The potential for damage to even one young person outweighs any good these may accomplish. The price of the life of even one child is too high.

I would have told you that the Boys Choir, as it is presently structured, should not be continued and you should not be involved in similar organizations in the future. There is too much opportunity for unsupervised time between one child and one greatly trusted adult. Tragically, we have all lived the danger inherent in the all male seminary high school boarding school, where authority, trust and love can and did become destructively mixed with drives for sexual power, satisfaction and institutional authority. Gender-segregated and therefore gender-imbalanced activities are simply too dangerous to continue. They are imbalanced and too easily lead to aberration.

I would have told you that solo visits to your residence and "overnights" by youngsters must be stopped. They are too dangerous to you and the children.



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This is what we learned at Christmas time. When one of our boys was a little boy, on various occasions when you put him to bed you gave "back rubs." The "back rubs" involved stroking the back, chest, stomach, lower abdomen and thighs in the groin area. He recalls that the stroking occurred very close to and around the genitals. He recalls his discomfort and embarrassment on one occasion that his lightweight knit pajamas would reveal the erection that your "back rub" had stimulated. He remembers the color and style of the pajamas. I do, too. He was probably around ten years old when he wore them.

We also learned at Christmas that when he visited your office on certain occasions you and he played darts. The stakes were that if he won he would get money. If you won, you could give him a "back rub" as described above. He recalls you offered him a pair of "thin shorts" to change into during the back rub. He said he was not comfortable with that and refused to change into them.

There should be no need for further comment on the obvious inappropriate use of the child or the sexual seductiveness of this type of physical touching and game playing. It should be enough simply to say we have all suffered too much because of matters such as this to make frivolous charges of this nature.

Robert, you know how we have loved you and trusted you with our lives. We gave our lives and our love to support what you believed in and wanted. Everything we owned was yours. That couldn't extend to that which we as parents don't even own--that is the right to touch our children's bodies in a sexually seductive or using manner.

Our concern extends beyond our family to the wide opportunity you have for individual one-on-one time with many little boys. When I spoke to you about Phil Wolfe's terrible molestation of our sons, you must remember I told you your order must talk of these matters openly so that those with such inclinations can obtain psychological help before they destroy themselves and others. Robert, have you received such help? Adequate help? Are you refraining from these dangerous times alone with children? I should tell you I have lost confidence in the expertise and impartiality in this special area of concern of a mental health professional in Santa Barbara known to both of us. While he is good

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in many ways, I don't believe his professional help in this particularly demanding area is adequate help.

Because we have shared our lives (and had hoped to continue this sharing) you know how much we have loved you. You must be able to guess the pain that surrounds this letter. We can only guess your pain in receiving it. We hope it will reinforce the desperate imperative you have to obtain help and remove yourself from potentially dangerous contacts with young boys.

Our purpose in writing this letter is to protect other children. A copy is being sent to to help you and him as Provincial Minister to keep the seriousness of this matter and the obligation for appropriate follow up in treatment and assignment clearly defined for you both. We also carbon Bishop Ziemann. He must know the full scope of the problems in this area of concern. None of us can afford to live in a fool's paradise any longer in so far as these matters are concerned.

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I then reviewed Case 92-9066. The report consists of a letter sent by , age 50 years, who is the mother of 5. told his mother about inappropriate The letter discloses that sexually related touching committed by Robert Vanhandel. felt was about 10 years old when this happened (approximately 12 years

The touching consisted of back rubs, stomach and abdomen rubs, and ago). touching of the thighs and groin area. There was no disclosure that there was any genital contact. The letter sent to SBPD is only a copy of a letter sent to different Franciscan priests who supervise Robert Vanhandel.

I contacted father of . He was involved in a committee that was looking into the allegations of sexual abuse committed by Franciscan priests at St. Anthony Seminary. Note that in 1989, another Franciscan priest, Phillip Wolfe, was arrested and convicted for molesting and his brother. . See Case 89-5806.

was concerned that there may be many other victims of sexual abuse who had attended either the seminary or participated in the Santa Barbara Boys Choir which was directed by Robert Vanhandel until May 1992. said that the committee organized to investigate these incidents included a psychiatrist, a lawyer, and a Franciscan priest. The spokes person for the group is Geoffrey Stearns, a Santa Barbara attorney. Higgins suggested I contact him for update information.

I contacted Geoffrey Stearns by phone. His group was looking into the allegations that occurred to members of the seminary only and not to members of the choir. Stearns said the seminary school had disbanded in June 1987. This was not because of any allegation of sexual abuse. Stearns said the group is interested in finding victims of sexual abuse so that counseling could be provided. Individual members will have an option of contacting the police department if these choose. Stearns said he would be mandated to report any incidents of sexual abuse per California state reporting requirements. Stearns was aware that generally there is a six year statute of limitations regarding sexual molestation cases. Stearns

said that because the school had closed nearly six years ago, there would not be many students who had been possibly molested, which could result in criminal prosecution. To his knowledge, any student who had made allegations, were from previous years and were well beyond any statute of limitations. At this time, Stearns only knew of incidents of inappropriate touching which did not include any acts of oral copulation or genital contact. Stearns said he and the committee are in the process of drafting a letter to be sent to all known former members of the seminary. All students who contact him will be told that they have an option to contact police.

I contacted the lay director of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, Mary Ann Helman. She was aware of all the allegations. She felt that

and the parents had blown the incidence of sexual molestation regarding Robert Vanhandel out of proportion. She believes that) inappropriate touching did take place; but that the affected parents were trying to blame all their children's problems on these fairly minor incidents. Helman said that she was part of a committee that had sent a letter to all known former choir members or their parents in October 1992. The committee included Dr. Scott Gorsuch and Father state director of the Franciscan church. The letter explains that Robert Vanhandel possibly touched boys inappropriately in a sexual manner. All parents of former choir members were instructed to contact Gorsuch for advise or counseling. This counseling was paid for by the Franciscans. Helman was not aware of any other incidence of sexual abuse than

and To her knowledge, these acts had occurred ten years ago or longer.

I contacted Dr. Scott Gorsuch by phone. Dr. Gorsuch said that he had been contacted in regards to two students who alleged being touched inappropriately by Vanhandel. Gorsuch said the allegations did not meet the state's requirements of reporting the incidents to the police dept. Gorsuch said that because of his doctor/client privilege, he would not

divulge the names of the students, but would relay the nature of the incident. Gorsuch said a letter had been sent to all former choir members. He received about 12 phone calls from parents expressing concern and asking for advise on how to question their children. He later received a call from a father of a former choir member. The father said his son is now 21 or 22 years old and is attending college in the bay area. The father had questioned his son who stated that Vanhandel had played a strip game with him. This involved the boy meeting Vanhandel in his office. They would then play a game of darts. If the boy won, he received 25 cents. If he lost, he had to strip down to his underwear. The boy did not expose his genitals, nor was he touched by Vanhandel.

Gorsuch received a call from a mother who stated both her sons had been molested. The older one would speak with Gorsuch, but the younger one would not. Dr. Gorsuch was then contacted by the older son. He is now about 22 years old. He stated that over 10 years before he was in the choir. Vanhandel met him in his office and had taken nude photographs of him. There was no mention of any actual genital touching. The boy did receive back rubs from Vanhandel. The boy's mother now had the photos that were taken. Gorsuch did not know how the mother obtained these.

Dr. Gorsuch said he does not anticipate receiving any more phone calls or referrals because a certain amount of time has elapsed. Gorsuch said that several parents of boys in the choir felt very strongly about the issue and about their sons being touched. Gorsuch had no other information suggesting that any more intrusive sexual touching had occurred.

At this time there does not appear to be any information that suggests Robert Vanhandel committed a sexual molestation that would amount to a felony filing. There is no information that suggests that any touching of an inappropriate nature occurred within the last 6 years. I recommend this case be closed at this time, sent to the D.A.'s office for review only.




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

OFFENSE: The subject was arrested on warrant #443356 issued at the request of the Santa Barbara Police Dept on March 17, 1994. Detective Mike McGrew began his investigation on March 7, 1994, following the complaint of a former student at St. Anthony's Seminary, Santa Barbara, CA. The warrant was issued based on the allegations of sexual abuse in violation of 288(a) PC on the former member of the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir based at St. Anthony's Seminary, Santa Barbara, CA. The multiple incidences involving the victim in this action are reported to have started in 1983 and continued unabated until 1989. The offenses appear to be limited to the repeated erotic stimulation and fondling the of boys whose ages ranged from age eight (8) to age fourteen (14). No oral copulation or sodomy incidents are alleged or acknowledged to have been a part of this abuse pattern. The subject was arrested, without incident, on 03-22-94 at St. Francis Retreat House, San Juan Bauptista in San Benito County, California. The subjects bail has been set a \$250,000.00.

RESIDENCY/EMPLOYMENT: The subject was residing at the St. Francis Retreat Center at San Juan Bauptista, in San Benito County, California. The telephone number there is (408) 623-4234. He was placed there following his release from the treatment program at St. Luke Institute, Suitland, Maryland. He had been placed at St. Luke's from June 1992 for thirteen (13) months until he was transferred to St. Francis in July 1993. He remained there, entering another treatment program, until his arrest on the above charges on March 22, 1994.

When the defendant was transferred to St. Francis in San Juan Bauptista he entered the therapy program offered by Pacific Treatment Associates in Santa Cruz, CA. He attended a combination of individual and group counseling four (4) times per week. The program site is located about a 45 minute drive from St. Francis. This program is also used by the Santa Cruz County Probation Department for those persons on its caseloads that exhibit problems of a sexually deviant nature. In addition to being involved in counseling as noted above he also attends the Twelve (12) Step program through S.L.A.A. (Sex and Love Addicts Anonymous) telephone $\ddagger(408)423-2377$. The subject is reportedly being taught to avoid situations that would tempt him to re-enter the ranks of active child molestation. While the defendant still has sexual fantasies and thought of young boys he is now in a position to exercise control. He has been assigned duties that will not place him in a position of having an influence over or association with children. The subject states that he is never sure when his touching,

tickling, and hugging of the children would go from expressing love and happiness and began to enter the realm of molestation.

PRIOR RECORD:

The subject has no prior arrests. His NCIC, DMV, CLETS are returned clear.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: The subject is a Catholic Priest who was removed from active service in that office following a letter dated June 23, 1994 and mailed to the subject, plus three superiors or colleagues, from a parent of an earlier victim. The heartache and loss of faith that runs through this entire case is embodied in that letter. The letter was without rancor but expressed in no uncertain terms that the subject was badly in need of help, he should never be allowed to be in a position to have even the most casual contact with children, and that he should not function as a minister or priest ever again. According to the defendant that appears to have been the reaction of his superiors also.

The onset of the abuse, in this case only, is established as occurring on a regular basis from March 1983 and continued to September 1989. At that time the victim who was then fourteen (14) years old entered a drug rehabilitation program. According to police reports the nature of the incidents continued to involve the increasingly erotic rubbing of the victim's stomach, bare back, legs, and eventually extending beneath the clothing to the genitalia of the young victims. The defendant's victims were almost always selected from among the eight (8) to fourteen (14) year old. The subject was almost always seen by the boys as a "father figure", an authority figure, and a trusted member of the victims "extended family". This deception and molestation continued during the years of 1983 until 1989 according to this particular victim. Reportedly, the six (6) year statute of limitations has expired on approximately fifteen (15) other cases that are not considered as part of this action.

So far as this officer is aware the etiology of the exposure of this case can be attributed to one of the earlier victims whose parents wrote a letter to the defendant outlining the elements of the abuse that their son had suffered at the hands of this defendant. That letter was sent to the defendant on April 23, 1992. It was simultaneously sent to three (3) of the defendants superiors. Apparently, steps were immediately taken to remove the defendant from his priestly duties, remove him from the community,

and place him in the treatment program at St. Luke's at Suitland, Maryland where he essentially remained until his transfer to St. Francis into another treatment modality. The subject reports that he is taking, by injection, an unspecified dosage of Depo-provera, which is a testosterone suppressant, as a component of his treatment. The defendant does not express a belief that he is now or will ever be "cured" of his illness. What he does state is that he is learning to anticipate and avoid situations where he might be required to make a conscious choice regarding his overt behavior. For example; he does not stroll down streets without purpose, does not go near shopping malls to just brouse. If he is required to go shopping he goes straight to where his items are located and leaves the area immediately.

When questioned in reference to his self-concept he expressed a tremendous and ever present sense of remorse, of not being able to put his life back together in a meaningful manner. He reflected on his feeling of deep sorrow on his loss of being able to help people as a priest. He acknowledges the wisdom of the restrictions that have been placed on by the church and what will most likely be imposed by the state. He anticipates a period of prison and then his eventual return to the Franciscan life as a bookkeeper for a retreat that is isolated. The subject has two masters degrees and is considered highly intelligent.

In addition to two interviews with the subject this officer has read and viewed documents and personal journals written by the defendant. That the defendant has reflections of suicidal thought processes is interwoven in his writings. This was considered as a problem solving technique or solution when he would contemplate the cost of exposure for what he has done. He has tremendous fears of going to jail and this is compounded by his realization and acknowledgement that he will be classified as a pedophile while in custody. However, this does not prevent his feelings of arousal in reference to young boys. The arresting officer notes that the defendant has several contacts and friends outside of the U.S.A. These could conceivably be considered as havens and refuges if the subject were released and succumbed to the temptation to give in to an impulse to run. The subject stated that he was not seeking a released from custody. Further he related that he has no place to go that would accept him. As previously noted the defendant expects his future to include a prison commitment. The subject was himself the subject of sexual abuse at St Anthony's as a student. He accepts responsibility for perpetuation of the tendency for the abused to later in life becoming the abuser and in turn creating

another link in a very sordid and tragic continuation of harmful behavior. There is little doubt in the mind of this writer and also in the mind of the defendant that the defendant has caused irreparable damage to many of his victims. The church has contacted all of those students who were effected by this and others and provided psychiatric and psychological counseling in an effort to contain and correct the damage in as far as they could do so.

There have been no formal reference contacts made in this defendant behalf in that the Court did not grant the Unit sufficient time to conduct a thorough investigation between arraignment and this OR/BR Hearing. An effort was made to contact them but as yet this writer has not had any response from them. This writer does not believe that the provided references are hesitant to assist the defendant, but rather there has been an insufficient amount of time allowed in this case.

The defendant is not an acceptable candidate for O.R. consideration for several reasons. The defendant was and must be returned to his treatment mode if and when he is released under any circumstances. He is not now and most likely will never be "cured" of his tendency to think and, given the circumstances, react as a pedophile. He has, in his words, no place to live that is convenient to the Court for future hearings. The needed and necessary treatment modality is not available in this area. The defendants thought control is insufficient to provide an adequate deterrent to his sexual tendencies. So far as is known the church will not be able to provide reasonable supervision nor duplicate the living environment that is vital to this defendant. There is a natural tendency for the subject to want to flee this area in that it is hear that his worst nightmares were realized and even now continue to unfold. Out of his therapeutic milieu the subject is very near the consideration provided in Section 1275 of the Calif. Penal Code. The subject fears facing his victime or their parents. All of the above contribute to the reasonable considerations leading to the denial of an O.R. release.

RECOMMENDATION: THAT O.R. BE DENIED/ THAT BAIL BE SET IN AN AMOUNT OF NOT LESS THAN \$250,000.00

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

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On 03/01/94 at approximately 1400 hours, , came to the Santa Barbara Police Department to report a 288 PC, Child Molest, which occurred between the years of 1983 through 1989.

It should be noted that some of the child molest acts occurred outside of the statute of limitations. is now 18 years of age; these acts occurred when he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir at St. Anthony's Seminary located at 2300 Garden Street. The molest acts occurred when was 8 or 9 years of age and ended when he was 14 years of age, spanning the years 1983 through 1989. The suspect in the case was the choir director, Robert VanHandel.

At the time of most of these incidents, Robert Van Handel lived at the Seminary at St. Anthony's. believes he is now living in the Northern California area.

stated he was in the choir when he was 7 1/2 years of age all the way through 14 years of age. stated that the offenses occurred when he was either 8 or 9 years of age, which is 1983 or 1984. said that all of the molest acts completely ended by the time he was 13 years of age or very early when he was 14 years of age. said he went into a drug rehabilitation in December of 1989 at the age of 14. said that no acts occurred after he went into rehabilitation.

stated that he really cannot come up with specific dates and times for what had occurred because it happened so often. said at the time, he was living with his mother and sister at

and for the most part, all of these molest incidents took place in Robert VanHandel's apartment at the Seminary. said there were also some trips that he and other choir members went on which molest acts occurred as well. said that VanHandel's apartment was upstairs at "the casa," which was located on Seminary grounds.

stated that quite often he would stay at Robert VanHandel's apartment. He stated that always on Tuesday nights and on Sundays he would spend the night. said there were sometimes on Thursdays and once in a while Fridays and Saturdays he would also spend the night at Robert VanHandel's apartment. stated that on Tuesday nights, he attended

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the boys choir practice in the afternoon somewhere around 2:30 that lasted until about 4:00 or 4:30 in the afternoon. After that he went to dinner at the Seminary and then he attended the mens choir group from about 7:00 P.M. or 7:30 P.M. which ended approximately 9:00 P.M. said he would then stay at VanHandel's apartment.

stated he didn't have a father and his mother was a chef working many, many odd shifts, and he hardly saw her. There were times when his mother was leaving for work very, very early in the morning and there were times she worked extremely late. ; said he spent an immense amount of time at the Seminary staying with Robert VanHandel. ;

In reference to the molest acts that occurred, stated that when he did stay at VanHandel's apartment, that he wore pajamas, and just before bedtime, said he was lying almost asleep on a bed and that Robert VanHandel would come up and start massaging his back or his stomach area, whichever way was lying at the time. went on to say that Robert VanHandel would start by massaging him on top of his clothing and then eventually he would start massaging him underneath his pajamas. said that VanHandel would start massaging his genital area.

said he was trying to go to sleep and ignored what VanHandel was doing.

believed that VanHandel had his clothes on while he was giving a massage. did not know if VanHandel tried to masturbate while giving a massage. said that there were no words spoken between them.

said this occurred always just before he went to sleep at night or when they were on trips when he took a daytime or afternoon map.

stated that he did get an erection when VanHandel was massaging his testicles and his penis area. stressed that it no

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time was there any oral sex involved and at no time did reciprocate in masturbating VanHandel. said these acts of massaging his genital area occurred until he fell asleep, and this would be at times a half hour duration.

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stated he did not tell anyone about what had happened, and at the time, he did not believe that VanHandel was doing anything wrong because this was coming from someone who he trusted and looked up to.

In reference to out of town trips, stated that he traveled with Robert VanHandel to Canada and believes it was Expo 1986 when they were in ; said they traveled in a Canada for approximately three weeks. camper with two to three other boys who were in the choir. Robert VanHandel was the only adult. 3 said that the massaging of his genitals happened while they were in the camper when he (3) would sleep next to VanHandel. said between the years 1984 to 1987, that he went with Robert VanHandel to Yosemite three to four times. This was also in a camper, and it was mainly during the Thanksgiving weekend and one time during the Easter break. During these trips to Yosemite, again, VanHandel would sleep next to and again would molest him by massaging his genitals.

stated that during the summer of 1987, the entire choir went to England and traveled Europe. stated he could not specifically remember VanHandel molesting him while they were in Europe.

said there are people who could verify he spent a lot of time at Robert VanHandel's apartment. stated there is a person by the first name of **section** was a student at the Seminary and was living in the same apartment as Robert VanHandel but in a different bedroom. lived there for approximately one year. said he would be able to get an address and telephone number of **section** through his therapist.

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stated he would also play with a boy by the first name of , who lived in an adjacent apartment to VanHandel at "the casa." did not know what the mother's name was but believed she had something to do with the Waldorf School. said that recently played a part in the movie "Hocus Pocus." believed that Santa Barbara Police Department Officer Debbie Daily would know who mother is.

In terms of the Statute of Limitations, it is believed that Robert VanHandel spent some time out of the State of California. Somewhere between 1982 and 1983, VanHandel took a six month sabbatical to England and stayed at Abingdon near Oxford, although I'm not sure of the name of the school there. Also, between May of 1992 through June of 1993, the Catholic Church sent Robert VanHandel to a treatment center in Suitland, Maryland, which is just outside of Washington D.C., a place called St. Luke's.

Current president of the St. Anthony's Boys Choir is Marianne Hellman. Her husband, Robert Hellman, is the current choir director. They live on Cheltenham Road and have access to scrapbooks of the boys choir which may give more specific dates and times as to when the acts occurred.

also believes there is another choir member by the name of , who may also have been a victim of Robert VanHandel's. believes that Marianne Hellman might be able to supply the address and telephone number of to verify.

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Dear Robert,

To begin, let me remind you that while I was recovering from my illness, I told you that I needed to talk to you. The time for the talk never came because I was still weak and you had the demands of a hectic schedule and move facing you.

Had that talk occurred, I would have told you that we had learned that a member of your Franciscan community, in addition to Phil Wolfe, had engaged in sexually inappropriate behavior with one of our boys when he was quite small that was upsetting to him at the time it was occurring. The memory remains with him.

I would have told you and I wished to tell ______ and the others of your organization that it is clear that many of the activities you men undertake are too dangerous to young people and yourselves to be continued. The risks are too great. The potential for damage to even one young person outweighs any good these may accomplish. The price of the life of even one child is too high.

I would have told you that the Boys Choir, as it is presently structured, should not be continued and you should not be involved in similar organizations in the future. There is too much opportunity for unsupervised time between one child and one greatly trusted adult. Tragically, we have all lived the danger inherent in the all male seminary high school boarding school, where authority, trust and love can and did become destructively mixed with drives for sexual power, satisfaction and institutional authority. Gender-segregated and therefore gender-imbalanced activities are simply too dangerous to continue. They are imbalanced and too easily lead to aberration.

I would have told you that solo visits to your residence and "overnights" by youngsters must be stopped . They are too dangerous to you and the children.

This is what we learned at Christmas time. When one of our boys was a little boy, on various occasions when you put him to bed you gave "back rubs." The "back rubs" involved stroking the back, chest, stomach, lower abdomen and thighs in the groin area. He recalls that the stroking occurred very close to and around the genitals. He recalls his discomfort and embarrassment on one occasion that his lightweight knit pajamas would reveal the erection that your "back rub" had stimulated. He remembers the color and style of the pajamas. I do, too. He was probably around ten years old when he wore them.

We also learned at Christmas that when he visited your office on certain occasions you and he played darts. The stakes were that if he won he would get money. If you won, you could give him a "back rub" as described above. He recalls you offered him a pair of "thin shorts" to change into during the back rub. He said he was not comfortable with that and refused to change into them.

There should be no need for further comment on the obvious inappropriate use of the child or the sexual seductiveness of this type of physical touching and game playing. It should be enough simply to say we have all suffered too much because of matters such as this to make frivolous charges of this nature.

Robert, you know how we have loved you and trusted you with our lives. We gave our lives and our love to support what you believed in and wanted. Everything we owned was yours. That couldn't extend to that which we as parents don't even own--that is the right to touch our children's bodies in a sexually seductive or using manner.

Our concern extends beyond our family to the wide opportunity you have for individual one-on-one time with many little boys. When I spoke to you about Phil Wolfe's terrible molestation of our sons, you must remember I told you your order must talk of these matters openly so that those with such inclinations can obtain psychological help before they destroy themselves and others. Robert, have you received such help? Adequate help? Are you refraining from these dangerous times alone with children? I should tell you I have lost confidence in the expertise and impartiality in this special area of concern of a mental health professional in Santa Barbara known to both of us. While he is good

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in many ways, I don't believe his professional help in this particularly demanding area is adequate help.

Because we have shared our lives (and had hoped to continue this sharing) you know how much we have loved you. You must be able to guess the pain that surrounds this letter. We can only guess your pain in receiving it. We hope it will reinforce the desperate imperative you have to obtain help and remove yourself from potentially dangerous contacts with young boys.

Our purpose in writing this letter is to protect other children. A copy is being sent to to help you and him as Provincial Minister to keep the seriousness of this matter and the obligation for appropriate follow up in treatment and assignment clearly defined for you both. We also carbon Bishop Ziemann. He must know the full scope of the problems in this area of concern. None of us can afford to live in a fool's paradise any longer in so far as these matters are concerned.

I was contacted by Dep. Chief J. McCoy who had information regarding a possible molestation victim. Chief McCoy requested I contact , and obtain a statement.

I contacted by phone. referred to a report made by alleging molestation. stated that he is a former member of the seminary school at St. Anthony's Seminary, 2300 Garden St. said approximately 8 or 9 years before, he had been touched inappropriately by a priest named Robert Vanhandel. was reluctant to discuss exactly what happened. said he would be willing to write a statement that would be included in a report previously made by the parents of

I received a handwritten letter from The letter relates that on several occasions, Robert Vanhandel had given him back rubs and tummy rubs while was staying in the seminary dorm. There was never any genital contact. said that eventually he would just pull the covers over his head which stopped Vanhandel from bothering him. said this happened when he was either 14 or 15.

I then reviewed Case 92-9066. The report consists of a letter sent by , age 50 years, who is the mother of

The letter discloses that told his mother about inappropriate sexually related touching committed by Robert Vanhandel. felt

was about 10 years old when this happened (approximately 12 years ago). The touching consisted of back rubs, stomach and abdomen rubs, and touching of the thighs and groin area. There was no disclosure that there was any genital contact. The letter sent to SBPD is only a copy of a letter sent to different Franciscan priests who supervise Robert Vanhandel.

I contacted father of He was involved in a committee that was looking into the allegations of sexual abuse committed by Franciscan priests at St. Anthony Seminary. Note that in 1989, another Franciscan priest, Phillip Wolfe, was arrested and convicted for molesting and his brother, See Case 89-5806. was concerned that there may be many other victims of sexual abuse who had attended either the seminary or participated in the Santa Barbara Boys Choir which was directed by Robert Vanhandel until May 1992. said that the committee organized to investigate these incidents included a psychiatrist, a lawyer, and a Franciscan priest. The spokes person for the suggested I group is Geoffrey Stearns, a Santa Barbara attorney. . contact him for update information.

I contacted Geoffrey Stearns by phone. His group was looking into the allegations that occurred to members of the seminary only and not to members of the choir. Stearns said the seminary school had disbanded in June 1987. This was not because of any allegation of sexual abuse. Stearns said the group is interested in finding victims of sexual abuse so that counseling could be provided. Individual members will have an option of contacting the police department if these choose. Stearns said he would be mandated to report any incidents of sexual abuse per California state reporting requirements. Stearns was aware that generally there is a six year statute of limitations regarding sexual molestation cases. Stearns

said that because the school had closed nearly six years ago, there would not be many students who had been possibly molested, which could result in criminal prosecution. To his knowledge, any student who had made allegations, were from previous years and were well beyond any statute of limitations. At this time, Stearns only knew of incidents of inappropriate touching which did not include any acts of oral copulation or genital contact. Stearns said he and the committee are in the process of drafting a letter to be sent to all known former members of the seminary. All students who contact him will be told that they have an option to contact police.

I contacted the lay director of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, Mary Ann Helman. She was aware of all the allegations. She felt that

and the parents had blown the incidence of sexual molestation regarding Robert Vanhandel out of proportion. She believes that inappropriate touching did take place; but that the affected parents were trying to blame all their children's problems on these fairly minor incidents. Helman said that she was part of a committee that had sent a letter to all known former choir members or their parents in October 1992. The committee included Dr. Scott Gorsuch and Father state director of the Franciscan church. The letter explains that Robert Vanhandel possibly touched boys inappropriately in a sexual manner. A11 parents of former choir members were instructed to contact Gorsuch for advise or counseling. This counseling was paid for by the Franciscans. Helman was not ayare of any other incidence of sexual abuse than and

and To her knowledge, these acts had occurred ten years ago or longer.

I contacted Dr. Scott Gorsuch by phone. Dr. Gorsuch said that he had been contacted in regards to two students who alleged being touched inappropriately by Vanhandel. Gorsuch said the allegations did not meet the state's requirements of reporting the incidents to the police dept. Gorsuch said that because of his doctor/client privilege, he would not

divulge the names of the students, but would relay the nature of the incident. Gorsuch said a letter had been sent to all former choir members. He received about 12 phone calls from parents expressing concern and asking for advise on how to question their children. He later received a call from a father of a former choir member. The father said his son is now 21 or 22 years old and is attending college in the bay area. The father had questioned his son who stated that Vanhandel had played a strip game with him. This involved the boy meeting Vanhandel in his office. They would then play a game of darts. If the boy won, he received 25 cents. If he lost, he had to strip down to his underwear. The boy did not expose his genitals, nor was he touched by Vanhandel.

Gorsuch received a call from a mother who stated both her sons had been molested. The older one would speak with Gorsuch, but the younger one yould not. Dr. Gorsuch was then contacted by the older son. He is now about 22 years old. He stated that over 10 years before he was in the choir. Vanhandel met him in his office and had taken nude photographs of him. There was no mention of any actual genital touching. The boy did receive back rubs from Vanhandel. The boy's mother now had the photos that were taken. Gorsuch did not know how the mother obtained these.

Dr. Gorsuch said he does not anticipate receiving any more phone calls or referrals because a certain amount of time has elapsed. Gorsuch said that several parents of boys in the choir felt very strongly about the issue and about their sons being touched. Gorsuch had no other information suggesting that any more intrusive sexual touching had occurred.

At this time there does not appear to be any information that suggests Robert Vanhandel committed a sexual molestation that would amount to a felony filing. There is no information that suggests that any touching of an inappropriate nature occurred within the last 6 years. I recommend this case be closed at this time, sent to the D.A.'s office for review only.

Robert's name in the lawsuit: he wants to talk with Nick Heldt but he feels that Robert should default on it (I gather that means not to respond). As Skip put it: why should the friars pay an attorney to protect Robert's assets when he doesn't have assets? They can sue Robert for any amount but if he does not have anything, then they can't get anything. In addition Robert's in jail so what does he care? I believe Skip is trying to save us some money.

2. He is trying to figure out for himself what he can do for Robert. He genuinely likes Robert and feels that he ought to do something. He talked about going down to Wasco. As Robert's attorney, he could get in but will that cause more problems especially if he tries to get Robert protected. He would be taking on the prison system and that might hurt Robert more. That is why he really does not know what to do.

OFFENSE: The subject was arrested on warrant #443356 issued at the request of the Santa Barbara Police Dept on March 17, 1994. Detective Mike McGrew began his investigation on March 7, 1994, following the complaint of a former student at St. Anthony's Seminary, Santa Barbara, CA. The warrant was issued based on the allegations of sexual abuse in violation of 288(a) PC on the former member of the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir based at St. Anthony's Seminary, Santa Barbara, CA. The multiple incidences. involving the victim in this action are reported to have started in 1983 and continued unabated until 1989. The offenses appear to be limited to the repeated erotic stimulation and fondling the of boys whose ages ranged from age eight (8) to age fourteen (14). No oral copulation or sodomy incidents are alleged or acknowledged to have been a part of this abuse pattern. The subject was arrested, without incident, on 03-22-94 at St. Francis Retreat House, San Juan Bauptista in San Benito County, California. The subjects bail has been set a \$250,000.00.

RESIDENCY/EMPLOYMENT: The subject was residing at the St. Francis Retreat Center at San Juan Bauptista, in San Benito County, California. The telephone number there is (408) 623-4234. He was placed there following his release from the treatment program at St. Luke Institute, Suitland, Maryland. He had been placed at St. Luke's from June 1992 for thirteen (13) months until he was transferred to St. Francis in July 1993. He remained there, entering another treatment program, until his arrest on the above charges on March 22, 1994.

When the defendant was transferred to St. Francis in San Juan Bauptista he entered the therapy program offered by Pacific Treatment Associates in Santa Cruz, CA. He attended a combination of individual and group counseling four (4) times per week. The program site is located about a 45 minute drive from St. Francis. This program is also used by the Santa Cruz County Probation Department for those persons on its caseloads that exhibit problems of a sexually deviant nature. In addition to being involved in counseling as noted above he also attends the Twelve (12) Step program through S.L.A.A. (Sex and Love Addicts Anonymous) telephone #(408)423-2377. The subject is reportedly being taught to avoid situations that would tempt him to re-enter the ranks of active. child molestation. While the defendant still has sexual fantasies and thought of young boys he is now in a position to exercise control. He has been assigned duties that will not place him in a position of having an influence over or association with children. The subject states that he is never sure when his touching,

tickling, and hugging of the children would go from expressing love and happiness and began to enter the realm of molestation.

The heartache and loss of faith that runs through this entire case is embodied in that letter. The letter was without rancor but expressed in no uncertain terms that the subject was badly in need of help, he should never be allowed to be in a position to have even the most casual contact with children, and that he should not function as a minister or priest ever again. According to the defendant that appears to have been the reaction of his superiors also.

The onset of the abuse, in this case only, is established as occurring on a regular basis from March 1983 and continued to September 1989. At that time the victim who was then fourteen (14) years old entered a drug rehabilitation program. According to police reports the nature of the incidents continued to involve the increasingly erotic rubbing of the victim's stomach, bare back, legs, and eventually extending beneath the clothing to the genitalia of the young victims. The defendant's victims were almost always selected from among the eight (8) to fourteen (14) year old. The subject was almost always seen by the boys as a "father figure", an authority figure, and a trusted member of the victims "extended family". This deception and molestation continued during the years of 1983 until 1989 according to this particular victim. Reportedly, the six (6) year statute of limitations has expired on approximately fifteen (15) other cases that are not considered as part of this action.

So far as this officer is aware the etiology of the exposure of this case can be attributed to one of the earlier victims whose parents wrote a letter to the defendant outlining the elements of the abuse that their son had suffered at the hands of this defendant. That letter was sent to the defendant on April 23, 1992. It was simultaneously sent to three (3) of the defendants superiors. Apparently, steps were immediately taken to remove the defendant from his priestly duties, remove him from the community.

and place him in the treatment program at St. Luke's at Suitland, Maryland where he essentially remained until his transfer to St. Francis into another treatment modality. The subject reports that he is taking, by injection, an unspecified dosage of Depo-provera, which is a testosterone suppressant, as a component of his treatment. The defendant does not express a belief that he is now or will ever be "cured" of his illness. What he does state is that he is learning to anticipate and avoid situations where he might be required to make a conscious choice regarding his overt behavior. For example; he does not stroll down streets without purpose, does not go near shopping malls to just brouse. If he is required to go shopping he goes straight to where his items are located and leaves the area immediately.

When questioned in reference to his self-concept he expressed a tremendous and ever present sense of remorse, of not being able to put his life back together in a meaningful manner. He reflected on his feeling of deep sorrow on his loss of being able to help people as a priest. He acknowledges the wisdom of the restrictions that have been placed on by the church and what will most likely be imposed by the state. He anticipates a period of prison and then his eventual return to the Franciscan life as a bookkeeper for a retreat that is isolated. The subject has two masters degrees and is considered highly intelligent.

In addition to two interviews with the subject this officer has read and viewed documents and personal journals written by the defendant. That the defendant has reflections of suicidal thought processes is interwoven in his writings. This was considered as a problem solving technique or solution when he would contemplate the cost of exposure for what he has done. He has tremendous fears of going to jail and this is compounded by his realization and acknowledgement that he will be classified as a pedophile while in custody. However, this does not prevent his feelings of arousal in reference to young boys. The arresting officer notes that the defendant has several contacts and friends outside of the U.S.A. These could conceivably be considered as havens and refuges if the subject were released and succumbed to the temptation to give in to an impulse to run. The subject stated that he was not seeking a released from custody. Further he related that he has no place to go that would accept him. As previously noted the defendant expects his future to include a prison commitment. The subject was himself the subject of sexual abuse at St anthony s as a student. He accepts responsibility for perpetuation of the tendency for the abused to later in life becoming the abuser and in turn creating

another link in a very sordid and tragic continuation of harmful behavior. There is little doubt in the mind of this writer and also in the mind of the defendant that the defendant has caused irreparable damage to many of his victims. The church has contacted all of those students who were effected by this and others and provided psychiatric and psychological counseling in an effort to contain and correct the damage in as far as they could do so.

There have been no formal reference contacts made in this defendant behalf in that the Court did not grant the Unit sufficient time to conduct a thorough investigation between arraignment and this OR/BR Hearing. An effort was made to contact them but as yet this writer has not had any response from them. This writer does not believe that the provided references are hesitant to assist the defendant, but rather there has been an insufficient amount of time allowed in this case.

The defendant is not an acceptable candidate for O.R. consideration for several reasons. The defendant was and must be returned to his treatment mode if and when he is released under any circumstances. He is not now and most likely will never be "cured" of his tendency to think and, given the circumstances, react as a pedophile. He has, in his words, no place to live that is convenient to the Court for future hearings. The needed and necessary treatment modality is not available in this area. The defendants thought control is insufficient to provide an adequate deterrent to his sexual tendencies. So far as is known the church will not be able to provide reasonable supervision nor duplicate the living environment that is vital to this defendant. There is a natural tendency for the subject to want to flee this area in that it is hear that his worst nightmares were realized and even now continue to unfold. Out of his therapeutic milieu the subject is very near the consideration provided in Section 1275 of the Calif. Penal Code. The subject fears facing his victims or their parents. All of the above contribute to the reasonable considerations leading to the denial of an O.R. release.

RECOMMENDATION: THAT O.R. BE DENIED/ THAT BAIL BE SET IN AN AMOUNT OF NOT LESS THAN \$250,000.00

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


On 03/01/94 at approximately 1400 hours, , came to the Santa Barbara Police Department to report a 288 PC, Child Molest, which occurred between the years of 1983 through 1989.

It should be noted that some of the child molest acts occurred outside of the statute of limitations. is now 18 years of age; these acts occurred when he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir at St. Anthony's Seminary located at 2300 Garden Street. The molest acts occurred when was 8 or 9 years of age and ended when he was 14 years of age, spanning the years 1983 through 1989. The suspect in the case was the choir director, Robert VanHandel.

told me that when he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, his name at that time was went on to tell me he has since changed his name, and he now uses his mother's maiden name of went on to tell me the reason he has done that is that he feels that he is starting his life over now and the change of name gives him a fresh start. stated he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, which had approximately 30 members. stated his father left when he was approximately 4 years of age. went on to say that Robert VanHandel, the choir director, was a father figure to him and that he trusted him. At the time of most of these incidents, Robert Van Handel lived at the Seminary at St. Anthony's. believes he is now living in the Northern California area.

In reference to out of town trips, stated that he traveled with Robert VanHandel to Canada and believes it was Expo 1986 when they were in Canada for approximately three weeks. said they traveled in a camper with two to three other boys who were in the choir. Robert VanHandel was the only adult. said that the massaging of his genitals happened while they were in the camper when he (;) would said between the years 1984 to 1987, that sleep next to VanHandel. he went with Robert VanHandel to Yosemite three to four times. This was also in a camper, and it was mainly during the Thanksgiving weekend and one time during the Easter break. In terms of the Statute of Limitations, it is believed that Robert VanHandel spent some time out of the State of California. Dear Robert,

To begin, let me remind you that while I was recovering from my illness, I told you that I needed to talk to you. The time for the talk never came because I was still weak and you had the demands of a hectic schedule and move facing you.

Had that talk occurred, I would have told you that we had learned that a member of your Franciscan community, in addition to Phil Wolfe, had engaged in sexually inappropriate behavior with one of our boys when he was quite small that was upsetting to him at the time it was occurring. The memory remains with him.

I would have told you and I wished to tell and the others of your organization that it is clear that many of the activities you men undertake are too dangerous to young people and yourselves to be continued. The risks are too great. The potential for damage to even one young person outweighs any good these may accomplish. The price of the life of even one child is too high.

I would have told you that the Boys Choir, as it is presently structured, should not be continued and you should not be involved in similar organizations in the future. There is too much opportunity for unsupervised time between one child and one greatly trusted adult. Tragically, we have all lived the danger inherent in the all male seminary high school boarding school, where authority, trust and love can and did become destructively mixed with drives for sexual power, satisfaction and institutional authority. Gender-segregated and therefore gender-imbalanced activities are simply too dangerous to continue. They are imbalanced and too easily lead to aberration.

I would have told you that solo visits to your residence and "overnights" by youngsters must be stopped. They are too dangerous to you and the children.



This is what we learned at Christmas time. When one of our boys was a little boy, on various occasions when you put him to bed you gave "back rubs." The "back rubs" involved stroking the back, chest, stomach, lower abdomen and thighs in the groin area. He recalls that the stroking occurred very close to and around the genitals. He recalls his discomfort and embarrassment on one occasion that his lightweight knit pajamas would reveal the erection that your "back rub" had stimulated. He remembers the color and style of the pajamas. I do, too. He was probably around ten years old when he wore them.

We also learned at Christmas that when he visited your office on certain occasions you and he played darts. The stakes were that if he won he would get money. If you won, you could give him a "back rub" as described above. He recalls you offered him a pair of "thin shorts" to change into during the back rub. He said he was not comfortable with that and refused to change into them.

There should be no need for further comment on the obvious inappropriate use of the child or the sexual seductiveness of this type of physical touching and game playing. It should be enough simply to say we have all suffered too much because of matters such as this to make frivolous charges of this nature.

Robert, you know how we have loved you and trusted you with our lives. We gave our lives and our love to support what you believed in and wanted. Everything we owned was yours. That couldn't extend to that which we as parents don't even own--that is the right to touch our children's bodies in a sexually seductive or using manner.

Our concern extends beyond our family to the wide opportunity you have for individual one-on-one time with many little-boys. When I spoke to you about Phil Wolfe's terrible molestation of our sons, you must remember I told you your order must talk of these matters openly so that those with such inclinations can obtain psychological help before they destroy themselves and others. Robert, have you received such help? Adequate help? Are you refraining from these dangerous times alone with children? I should tell you I have lost confidence in the expertise and impartiality in this special area of concern of a mental health professional in Santa Barbara known to both of us. While he is good

in many ways, I don't believe his professional help in this particularly demanding area is adequate help.

Because we have shared our lives (and had hoped to continue this sharing) you know how much we have loved you. You must be able to guess the pain that surrounds this letter. We can only guess your pain in receiving it. We hope it will reinforce the desperate imperative you have to obtain help and remove yourself from potentially dangerous contacts with young boys.

Our purpose in writing this letter is to protect other children. A copy is being sent to to help you and him as Provincial Minister to keep the seriousness of this matter and the obligation for appropriate follow up in treatment and assignment clearly defined for you both. We also carbon Bishop Ziemann. He must know the full scope of the problems in this area of concern. None of us can afford to live in a fool's paradise any longer in so far as these matters are concerned.

I received a handwritten letter from The letter relates that on several occasions, Robert Vanhandel had given him back rubs and tummy rubs while was staying in the seminary dorm. There was never any genital contact. said that eventually he would just pull the covers over his head which stopped Vanhandel from bothering him. said this happened when he was either 14 or 15.

I then reviewed Case 92-9066. The report consists of a letter sent by age 50 years, who is the mother of , 22 years. The letter discloses that told his mother about inappropriate sexually related touching committed by Robert Vanhandel. i felt. , was about 10 years old when this happened (approximately 12 years The touching consisted of back rubs, stomach and abdomen rubs, and ago). touching of the thighs and groin area. There was no disclosure that there was any genital contact. The letter sent to SBPD is only a copy of a letter sent to different Franciscan priests who supervise Robert Vanhandel. I contacted father of He was involved in a committee that was looking into the allegations of sexual abuse committed by Franciscan priests at St. Anthony Seminary. Note that in 1989, another Franciscan priest, Phillip Wolfe, was arrested and convicted for molesting . See Case 89-5806. and his brother, was concerned that there may be many other victims of sexual abuse who had attended either the seminary or participated in the Santa Barbara Boys Choir which was directed by Robert Vanhandel until May 1992. said that the committee organized to investigate these incidents included a psychiatrist, a lawyer, and a Franciscan priest. The spokes person for the group is Geoffrey Stearns, a Santa Barbara attorney. suggested I contact him for update information. I contacted Geoffrey Stearns by phone. His group was looking into the allegations that occurred to members of the seminary only and not to members of the choir. Stearns said the seminary school had disbanded in

June 1997. This was not because of any allegation of sexual abuse. Stearns said the group is interested in finding victims of sexual abuse so that counseling could be provided. Individual members will have an option of contacting the police department if these choose. Stearns said he would be man ated to report any incidents of sexual abuse per california state reporting requirements. Stearns was aware that generally there is a six year statute of limitations regarding sexual molestation cases. Stearns

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said that because the school had closed nearly six years ago, there would not be many students who had been possibly molested, which could result in criminal prosecution. To his knowledge, any student who had made allegations, were from previous years and were well beyond any statute of limitations. At this time, Stearns only knew of incidents of inappropriate touching which did not include any acts of oral copulation or genital contact. Stearns said he and the committee are in the process of drafting a letter to be sent to all known former members of the seminary. All students who contact him will be told that they have an option to contact police.

I contacted the lay director of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, Mary Ann Helman. She was aware of all the allegations. She felt that

parents had blown the incidence of sexual molestation and the regarding Robert Vanhandel out of proportion. She believes that inappropriate touching did take place; but that the affected parents were trying to blame all their children's problems on these fairly minor incidents. Helman said that she was part of a committee that had sent a letter to all known former choir members or their parents in October 1992. The committee included Dr. Scott Gorsuch and Father state The letter explains that Robert director of the Franciscan church. Vanhandel possibly touched boys inappropriately in a sexual manner. A11 parents of former choir members were instructed to contact Gorsuch for advise or counseling. This counseling was paid for by the Franciscans. Helman was not aware of any other incidence of sexual abuse than To net knowledge, these acts had occurred ten years ago or and longer.

I controled Dr. Scott Gorsuch by phone. Dr. Gorsuch said that he had been contacted in regards to two students who alleged being touched inapproviately by Vanhandel. Gorsuch said the allegations did not meet the state's requirements of reporting the incidents to the police dept. Gorsuch said that because of his doctor/client privilege, he would not

divulge the names of the students, but would relay the nature of the incident. Gorsuch said a letter had been sent to all former choir members. He received about 12 phone calls from parents expressing concern and asking for advise on how to question their children. He later received a call from a father of a former choir member. The father said his son is now 21 or 22 years old and is attending college in the bay area. The father had questioned his son who stated that Vanhandel had played a strip game with him. This involved the boy meeting Vanhandel in his office. They would then play a game of darts. If the boy won, he received 25 cents. If he lost, he had to strip down to his underwear. The boy did not expose his genitals, nor was he touched by Vanhandel.

Gorsuch received a call from a mother who stated both her sons had been molested. The older one would speak with Gorsuch, but the younger one yould not. Dr. Gorsuch was then contacted by the older son. He is now about 22 years old. He stated that over 10 years before he was in the choir. Vanhandel met him in his office and had taken nucle photographs of him. There was no mention of any actual genital touching. The boy did receive back rubs from Vanhandel. The boy's mother now had the photos that were taken. Gorsuch did not know how the mother obtained these.

Dr. Gorsuch said he does not anticipate receiving any more phone calls or referrals because a certain amount of time has elapsed. Gorsuch said that several parents of boys in the choir felt very strongly about the issue and about their sons being touched. Gorsuch had no other information suggesting that any more intrusive sexual touching had occurred.

At this time there does not appear to be any information that suggests Robert Vanhandel committed a sexual molestation that would amount to a felony iling. There is no information that suggests that any touching of an inappropriate nature occurred within the last 6 years. I recommend this case be closed at this time, sent to the D.A.'s office for review only.



Thank you very much for the letter which arrived today. I know full well how little time you have for anything, so I am doubly grateful for the letter. I was just thinking today that I should set up a time every week to call or else I will lose touch with you and the fitter I made up for some years of distance last year, but now I am drifting away again. I think I will ask to call him at his apartment. I don't want to speak with just anyone so I am reluctant to call FST or the Provincial Office.

Thank you for voicing your personal support for me. I think you are wonderful and have been very good to me. I never doubted your support, but I do feel quite badly for the trouble I have caused. You have told me that you are glad to do whatever you can, but I still know that I have betrayed you, the province, and the Order, and that is both true and difficult. On the other hand, I cannot undo the past. As my therapist says, the only thing I can do now is give myself and you the gift of a solid recovery, and an ongoing recovery.

As you know, Srs. Monica and Ann came for a weekend. I am so blessed with good friends that it is overwhelming. We met twice with my therapist, and were able to say some difficult things to each other. We also had a great time visiting and traveling about Washington. Their love and cars for me seems boundless. I know that Monica spoke with you, as I was hoping she would, and was able to describe the visit and herefeelings. Everyone here was quite stunned that the two of them would fly here to visit for the weekend. Their visit was very good for me. I have you to thank for introducing us eight years ago when I went on sabbatical. I was a mess that time also.

The program here goes fairly well. I have had my second patient-staff conference, and they seem to be pleased with my progress. It is a difficult matter to quantify, and at times I feel as though I cam standing still, but my therapist tells me to have more trust in him. I meet in a small group of eight with two therapists three times a week. I started the group a couple of weeks ago with great fear, You will remember I am not fond of small group work. Yesterday I realized that I am no longer at all frightened in the group and speak up quite easily. Everyone else may wish I would shut up, but I feel good about it. I have also spoken several times at large group meetings, but that is more difficult. On Wednesday afternoons we have "intercom", a meeting of all the paitents and all the therapists. There is no agenda, just discussion about life, conflicts, addictions, etc. Last session several people get into quite a fight, but I just sat there and enjoyed it. A short time before I would have byolted for the door. This time I found it interesting and was sorry when we ran out of time.

This week and next we are having a workshop on sexuality. I will enclose the horarium. I'm quite interested in seeing what the psychodrama groups are like. They are an integral part of the program here, and people always come out of the sessions looking stunned, but I do not have a regular group yet. During this workshop will be my first time.



As always I have to have someone from SLI with me -- called a prudent companion -- but I have just about cleared the bureaucracy here so that we can go. 

Dear Father Robert,

We, Bob Niemack and Ann Hassett, are documentary filmmakers. We have been asked to make a documentary film about sexual abuse and the clergy for broadcast on HOME BOX OFFICE. Enclosed is a one page treatment for the film we plan to make. We've also enclosed some information about us and a list of the other films we have made.

If you are interested in seeing our work, we will be happy to send you a VHS tape. We have been making social issue films for almost 20 years, and have produced a body of work we are very proud of. Most of our films are about real people facing real crisis in their lives. The films have little or no narration, no hidden faces, and the stories are told in the words of the people involved.

We have researched the issue of sexual compulsion in the clergy for the last 6 months. We've also seen several news and documentary broadcasts on the issue, and have concluded that the "voice" that has not been heard is that of the priests involved. We believe telling that story will be an important step in the healing process for a church torn apart by mistrust and misinformation.

We hope to find a priest (or several) who has experienced sexual addiction, treatment and recovery, and who is willing to talk about it honestly. Our goal is to tell that priest's story frankly, with sympathy and understanding. We believe that seeing a film about someone's personal crisis is a powerful way to help others find freedom from their own isolation.

In the course of our research, we attended the VOCAL conference in Chicago. One of the participants of the conference was a who told us about

abuse at St. Anthony's School. Recently we visited the second suggested that you might be the priest who could tell his story and begin the healing process. They are a family in pain, wounded by a sense of betrayal both by the church, by priests they adored, and by the church community who they feel abandoned them. They are typical of the hundreds of participants at the VOCAL conference: wounded, confused, and feeling abandoned.

As journalists at the conference, we couldn't help feeling frustration at the inability of these victims to get what they need to heal. It seemed that what they needed was some support and an apology. But a recent conversation with a priest suggested another need: they need to be able to forgive. Without that, they will remain in agony, consumed with their own anger. It is our belief that a film that reveals the truth about the human tragedy of sexual abuse - about the roots of sexual addiction as well as about treatment and the possibility of recovery - would be a catalyst for understanding and healing.

Our research into the treatment program at St. Luke has convinced us that the most likely participants for this film would come from their former patients. We have had many conversations with Father Canice Connors, who has expressed a need for this type of film. We are very aware that we are asking you to become one of the rare individuals who is willing to speak out. We cannot offer money. This film is a documentary, not a dramatic version of a priest's story. Our only offer is a guarantee of sensitive cooperation and a mutual goal of honest enlightenment. Our hope is to make a compassionate film that will open the mind of the viewer and begin the process necessary to implement healing and understanding. To this end we solicit your help.

Our first request is for an anonymous telephone conversation with you. We don't expect you to give us a commitment to participate based on this letter. We can be reached at our office, and you are welcome to call collect.

We hope we are not not being too bold, and that you will have the time and interest to help us with this film. Perhaps you could call us after you review this material.

CONFESSIONS OF A PRIEST

Sexual abuse by a Priest is a shocking accusation but since 1985, more than 200 American priests and brothers have been reported for molesting minors, in most cases boys -- an average of one case every ten days.

Jeffrey Anderson, a lawyer who represents the victims in such cases estimates that the actual number is closer to 1,000.

It has been reported that damages, legal and medical fees have cost the Church \$400 million. In 1986 the insurance company representing over half the nation's dioceses adopted an exclusion of coverage clause for claims against priests for sexual abuse.

Approximately 6 percent of the 50,000 Roman Catholic priests in the U.S. have had sexual contact with children according to author Richard Sipe, who counseled or interviewed over 1,000 priests and 500 other sources for his book <u>A Secret World: Sexuality and the Search for Celibacy</u>.

Sexual abuse of children by priests is one of the most serious scandals that the church has ever had to face because it destroys the one element that is essential for ministry: trust. <u>Slaver of the Soul</u>, Stephen J. Rossetti.

Of the 600 abusing priests treated at a New Mexico facility, 98% returned to clerical life immediately after treatment. It is widely believed that the priests behavior was not altered by treatment, and there is little contradictory proof. The public remains terrified of these men and angry with the church officials who re assign them seemingly unconcerned with public pessimism about "cure".

Very little, if anything, has been written or reported on these cases telling the offending priest's side of the story. Pressured by the Church not to tell their stories, and shamed by the social stigma attached to these crimes, the accused remain silent.

Robert's journey has been a most excruciating encounter with honesty: honesty with oneself, honesty with God, honesty with others. And as Robert knows even today, this work of honesty is never finished, but it calls forth the healthy lifestyle of the Twelve Step Program.

In the famous chapter five of the Big Book, it is said: Rarely have we seen a person fail who has thoroughly followed our path. Those who do not recover are people who cannot or will not completely give themselves to this simple program, usually men and women who are constitutionally incapable of being honest with themselves.

This has not come easily to Robert -- his own admission of illness and unmanageability continues to take hard work and endurance of pain. To see himself honestly -- without illusion -- remains a never ending challenge.

But the second part is to see God clearly and be honest with God. If it were not for this step, Robert could easily despair and be depressed. Rather, for the first time in his life, Robert is being honest with God and seeing God more clearly. It is wise to remember here the teaching of one spiritual master that when we miss the mark and sin and falter, that God seeks to draw us only closer to Godself. It's as though God connects to us with a string, and when we miss the mark the string is broken, but God desires to pick up the loose ends and tie them together once again and thus pulls us all the closer. God's love, not our goodness, keeps us from despair, and honesty with God connects us over and over with the truth of God's love.

Thirdly -- with others. How many of us have had to work so hard to regain the capacity for a simple, humble honesty with others. To be honest is to risk a real relationship instead of a facade of one; it is to know that love endures and wins out over evil and tragedy -- but what a risk it is to trust others and simply be who we are. In fact, this honesty with others is often the source of grace -- our connection with God is mediated through imperfect others and imperfect self.

Not easy was all this for Robert. Private and unique in his former path, and very unhappy and tormented by his duplicity and his addiction. But Robert, the Lord, your Franciscan community, and the fellowship have given you a new song --a new harmony, and another concert -- but not as one who stands apart from the choir, but one who stands in the midst of it and who receives direction in pursuit of a life-giving harmony.

Dear Robert,

To begin, let me remind you that while I was recovering from my illness, I told you that I needed to talk to you. The time for the talk never came because I was still weak and you had the demands of a hectic schedule and move facing you.

Had that talk occurred, I would have told you that we had learned that a member of your Franciscan community, in addition to Phil Wolfe, had engaged in sexually inappropriate behavior with one of our boys when he was quite small that was upsetting to him at the time it was occurring. The memory remains with him.

I would have told you and I wished to tell and and the others of your organization that it is clear that many of the activities you men undertake are too dangerous to young people and yourselves to be continued. The risks are too great. The potential for damage to even one young person outweighs any good these may accomplish. The price of the life of even one child is too high.

I would have told you that the Boys Choir, as it is presently structured, should not be continued and you should not be involved in similar organizations in the future. There is too much opportunity for unsupervised time between one child and one greatly trusted adult. Tragically, we have all lived the danger inherent in the all male seminary high school boarding school, where authority, trust and love can and did become destructively mixed with drives for sexual power, satisfaction and institutional authority. Gender-segregated and therefore gender-imbalanced activities are simply too dangerous to continue. They are imbalanced and too easily lead to aberration.

I would have told you that solo visits to your residence and "overnights" by youngsters must be stopped. They are too dangerous to you and the children.

This is what we learned at Christmas time. When one of our boys was a little boy, on various occasions when you put him to bed you gave "back rubs." The "back rubs" involved stroking the back, chest, stomach, lower abdomen and thighs in the groin area. He recalls that the stroking occurred very close to and around the genitals. He recalls his discomfort and embarrassment on one occasion that his lightweight knit pajamas would reveal the erection that your "back rub" had stimulated. He remembers the color and style of the pajamas. I do, too. He was probably around ten years old when he wore them.

We also learned at Christmas that when he visited your office on certain occasions you and he played darts. The stakes were that if he won he would get money. If you won, you could give him a "back rub" as described above. He recalls you offered him a pair of "thin shorts" to change into during the back rub. He said he was not comfortable with that and refused to change into them.

There should be no need for further comment on the obvious inappropriate use of the child or the sexual seductiveness of this type of physical touching and game playing. It should be enough simply to say we have all suffered too much because of matters such as this to make frivolous charges of this nature.

Robert, you know how we have loved you and trusted you with our lives. We gave our lives and our love to support what you believed in and wanted. Everything we owned was yours. That couldn't extend to that which we as parents don't even own--that is the right to touch our children's bodies in a sexually seductive or using manner.


Our concern extends beyond our family to the wide opportunity you have for individual one-on-one time with many little boys. When I spoke to you about Phil Wolfe's terrible molestation of our sons, you must remember I told you your order must talk of these matters openly so that those with such inclinations can obtain psychological help before they destroy themselves and others. Robert, have you received such help? Adequate help? Are you refraining from these dangerous times alone with children? I should tell you I have lost confidence in the expertise and impartiality in this special area of concern of a mental health professional in Santa Barbara known to both of us. While he is good

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in many ways, I don't believe his professional help in this particularly demanding area is adequate help.

Because we have shared our lives (and had hoped to continue this sharing) you know how much we have loved you. You must be able to guess the pain that surrounds this letter. We can only guess your pain in receiving it. We hope it will reinforce the desperate imperative you have to obtain help and remove yourself from potentially dangerous contacts with young boys.

Our purpose in writing this letter is to protect other children. A copy is being sent to to help you and him as Provincial Minister to keep the seriousness of this matter and the obligation for appropriate follow up in treatment and assignment clearly defined for you both. We also carbon Bishop Ziemann. He must know the full scope of the problems in this area of concern. None of us can afford to live in a fool's paradise any longer in so far as these matters are concerned.



Peace. Well, now you have arrived at this place and are probably getting settled. I just want you to know that you have my love and full support. Together, we can adress the issues and get through them. I just look forward to your return, and earnot emphasize enough how you are a valued and loved member of the fraternity and a good priest. I know it is difficult; I know also, there is much more good, an infinitely greater amount, than bad here. Let's move always towards the good.

I know you are aware of and somewhat concerned about what will happen in Santa Barbara, especially with those who might have been offended. Yesterday, the definitorium met with two specialists (Thomas Tobin, PHD, and Tom West) and our attorney to see what needs to be done. Everyone wants to do what is best for you and for everyone involved.

I would like to ask if, during the therapeutic process the issue of how best to deal with people who have been offended might not be addressed; perhaps action in this area can be made part of the aftercare program; at the moment, we are suggesting that it may be best if you contact those who have been offended most and make some personal amends. I have written to Dr. Valcour along these lines and ask you to discuss the situation, when appropriate, with him. I know it is difficult; certainly, everything will become clearer for all of us as the process unfolds.

I am asking Fr. Tom West to work with you and with the staff at St Luke's as to how best to approach the situation with respect to Santa Barbara. It seems better to ask him, given our own friendship, and the need for objectivity in the pastoral situation.

Robert, again, let me assure you of my support. It is our journey together. I do not mind making it with you; in fact, I am grateful for our friendship. Thank you for the courage.

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Dear Boys' Choir Parent:

Although it saddens us to do so, it is our duty to inform you of an incident about which we have recently learned. The situation concerns Fr. Robert Van Handel, a founder of the Boys' Choir who was involved with the organization from 1976 until 1991. A boy who was in the choir approximately twelve years ago has told us that he was touched by Fr. Robert in an inappropriately sexual way. This behavior consisted of back rubs, tummy rubs, and stroking of the lower abdomen and inner thighs that felt embarrassing to the boy. On some occasions the child was asked to engage in games that involved this kind of touching. Fr. Robert has entered a psychiatric facility for treatment. He is very contrite and shares our concern that we want to act in the most considerate and pastoral way possible. From discussions with Fr. Robert, we believe another boy may also have been touched inappropriately, and we have contacted him to offer our assistance.

Fr. Robert enriched the lives of many, and news of this event is sure to generate a variety of emotions in all of us. In order to best deal with these emotions, and to protect the interests of the boys and parents who have been associated with the choir over the years, the Franciscan Province of Santa Barbara along with the board of directors of the Boys' Choir have taken the following steps:

By way of this letter, we are informing the parents of boys who were involved with the choir during Fr. Robert's tenure about this incident.

The Franciscan Province and the directors of the choir are in ongoing communications about this matter. The Franciscans pledge their full cooperation, including financial reimbursement for counseling.

The choir has retained the services of an independent psychologist, Dr. Scott Gorsuch, to assist individuals and families of the Boys' Choir in dealing with this matter. He is available in person or by phone, at 687-3128, to answer questions. This is provided without cost to you and is completely confidential.

The Franciscan Province has asked Fr. Tom West, M.A. (Counseling Psychology) to also be available to all parties concerned for spiritual or counseling assistance. He can be at (415) 863-0111.

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A few parents have expressed questions about how to best handle this subject with their sons. For individuals who are now age 14 and over, it is Dr. Gorsuch's recommendation that they be given a copy of this letter to read for themselves.

Parents of younger children may wish to refer to the enclosed suggestions, or to consult Dr. Gorsuch or Fr. Tom West for assistance. You should be aware that we have no evidence that any inappropriate activity occurred between Fr. Robert and any other boys in the choir at any time during the past eight years.

It is important that we learn if other individuals were interfered with in any way. If any young men received unwanted attention from Fr. Robert, they are asked to notify their parents, or if they prefer, they can notify Dr. Gorsuch confidentially by phone at (805) 687-3128) or in writing at 1335 State Street, Santa Barbara, CA 93101. They may also contact Fr. Tom West confidentially at (415) 863-0111 or write him at 133 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, CA 94102.

Whenever a trusted and admired figure betrays our confidence, feelings of hurt, anger, and dismay are inevitable. We may initially deal with such feelings through the use of denial (disbelieving the truth) or projection (blaming the Church or other individuals or institutions). Conversely, our anger may be aimed directly at the individual in question. Any or all of these feelings are normal. In any event, most individuals and families will benefit from an open discussion of their reactions. They may wish to share their feelings and concerns with other families and individuals from the Boys' Choir, or they may wish to do so privately or with a professional.

For anyone who wishes to take advantage of it, a group meeting is being scheduled for Wednesday, October 28th, at 7:00 PM. The purpose of the meeting will be to answer questions, share common concerns, and express the many feelings at inevitably emerge in this type of situation. Please RSVP to 682-5641 if you wish to attend. The Franciscan Minister Provincial, Director, Robert Helman, Fr. Tom West, and Dr. Gorsuch will be present.





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

This will confirm our telephone discussion on April 13, 1993, regarding my clients. I represent two men in their early twenties who were the victims of inappropriate touching and other behavior by Father Robert and others affiliated with the choir. One of my clients lives in the Washington DC area, and the other lives locally. Both have asked for me to make arrangements for counselling. They do not want to use a counsellor who has been designated or approved by representatives of the Franciscans, but would like to select their own counsellor.

You have assured me that the Fransicans will finance counselling for the young men, and that they may choose their own counselor. Per your direction, I will either have the counsellors bill you directly at the address indicated above, or will have the bills sent to my office and I will bill you on my letterhead for each visit (if my clients prefer to keep the identity of the counsellors confidential).

I will ask each counsellor to provide a projection, perhaps after the first month of treatment, of the future course of therapy, so that you may gauge the anticipated costs. At that point, we should contact one another to make sure that the counselling that is proposed for the future can be financed by the Franciscans. Neither of my clients are in a position to pay for their own counselling.

I greatly appreciate your sympathetic and constructive attitude about this problem. If my clients are comfortable with it, I will ask them at some point in the future to provide the factual details of what occurred to them to you, to assist with the investigation which is underway through the Franciscans.

You have also indicated that the Board of Inquiry, headed by Geoff Sterns, is not currently authorized to extend its investigation to the boys' choir, and that I should deal through you unless I receive further notice to the contrary.

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POLICIES AND PROCEDURES IN THE ST. BARBARA PROVINCE ON REPORTING KNOWN OR SUSPECTED INSTANCES OF CHILD ABUSE

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

California's statute with respect to reporting suspected child abuse is strict and detailed. The goal of this statute requires that such reporting be made quickly. The statutory guidelines are clear. This statute mandates that employers inform employees hired after January 1, 1985, of the childabuse reporting statute.

In the State of California, child abuse is the abuse of anyone, male or female, under the age of eighteen (18).

In the following pages, the term "employee" means both those who receive compensation and those who volunteer their services at one of our Franciscan institutions.

The lawyers of the Province have recommended that we, as a Province:

- A. Adopt a policy on reporting such instances; Β.
 - Develop a procedure for such reporting;

C.

Recommend that Friars in ministerial leadership roles inform all employees of the current law.

Province policy on this matter, then, is (as far as California is concerned), no more than a restatement of California law.

WHO ARE AFFECTED BY THIS STATUTE?

Friars and those working in our parishes, retreat centers, and other apostolic works, who observe or learn from a child that he or she has been a victim of child abuse are affected by this statute. The law envisions primarily those who are child-care custodians, medical practitioners; but also non-medical practitioners are included.

"Non-medical practitioners means...a marriage, family, or child counselor; or a religious practitioner who diagnoses, examines or treats children." (Cal. Penal Code, 11165)

Many friars and employees of our Franciscan apostolates might be considered "non-medical practitioners". Moreover, in the case of People vs. Younghanz it was stated: " The statute imposes a duty to report on a very large group of people." The law, then, embraces a wide group of people.

Since our Friars and those whom we hire in our parishes, retreat centers and other apostolates do have contact with children (minors), we could easily be held by this law to report cases of suspected or known child abuse. One need not have a license for counseling; one would be under the definition of the law by the defacto act of counseling.

Moreover, if any of our Friars or those in our employ are licensed to practice as social workers, psychologists, psychiatrists, marriage, family, or child counselors or any other position which requires a license from the State, they are also within the scope of the reporting requirements.

Friars and other employees of a Franciscan apostolate who serve as teachers in private Catholic schools, or as school principals, or as counselors are within the definition of "child care custodians." The statute covers both the teacher and the care taker, as well as the administrative officer and supervisor. Friars who are pastors or directors of a retreat center or administrators of some other Franciscan apostolate might, therefore, be included under this aspect of the law.

Friars and others who are in a supervisory position and who learn of suspected child abuse not directly from the minor would also be held to make a report if they have reasonable suspicion of child abuse as defined by California State Law as described below.

We also have the obligation to inform all professional staff who are in our employ since January 1, 1985. These people must sign a statement indicating that he or she has knowledge of the reporting provisions, the standard for reasonable suspicion, and will comply with the requirements. The signed statements are to be retained by the employer (i.e., at the local level).

Employees who are "support staff or maintenance staff and who do not work with, observe, or have knowledge of children as part of their official duties" are not included in this statute [Cal. Penal Code 11166.5 (a)]. For the most part, then, cooks, maintenance people, gardeners, etc., are not affected.

In our parishes, retreat centers and other apostolates, friars, too, should sign such a statement, which should also be kept on file by the employer (pastor, retreat director, etc.).

We would recommend that even those who may have been hired prior to January 1, 1985, sign such statements. This would apply to friar and non-friar alike.

WHAT IS A REASONABLE SUSPICION OF CHILD ABUSE?

The reporting duty is triggered when a friar or other employee of the friars "knows or reasonably suspects" a case of child abuse. The legal standard of "reasonable suspicion" reads as follows:

"that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain such a suspicion, based on facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his or her training and experience, to suspect child abuse." [Call Penal Code, 11166 (a)]

Child abuse can be known or suspected by the behavior of the child through signs of emotional distress, or through direct communication. Child abuse can be known through other channels as well.

The law focuses on "reasonable suspicion." The law also favors the child. As a result, even though there might not be certainty as to child abuse, if there is a reasonable suspicion, child abuse must be reported. Failure to report can result in a possible legal suit against the Province and/or against the person involved.

It should be noted that:

Ю

(a) if a suspected child abuse situation is reported, the one suspected of such child abuse will indeed suffer as also perhaps the institution to which he or she belongs.

The law favors the child. Concern for the reputation of an individual or an institution is, in the eyes of this law, completely secondary. The position of the child must be favored over the reputation of the suspected person involved or the institution (parish, retreat center, etc.).

if a suspected child abuse situation is not reported, the individual failing to report is liable to possible legal suit, and, in certain cases, the institution (parish, retreat center, even province) would most probably be included in the legal suit.

If several people in our employ notice the same instance of suspected or known child abuse and are aware that the others have reached a similar conclusion, only one such person needs to make the report.

IF2

Even with the above description of "reasonable suspicion" of child abuse, some doubts might remain. Advice should be sought in such matters from people who have experience in this regard. In determining whether to report a situation or not, it should be recalled that the law will always favor the child and negligence in reporting might be construed as a criminal act. However, witch-hunting is also not the intent of the law.

WHEN MUST THE REPORT BE MADE?

If the accusation has met the legal standard defined above, a friar or other employee has the duty to report immediately to the child protective agency. The child protective agency will then pursue its own investigation procedures and determine the accuracy of such an accusation. To delay reporting under these circumstances would be a violation of California State law, which could then be punished as a misdemeanor.

The province, parish, retreat center, etc. is not allowed to make an internal, preliminary investigation first before the individual contacts the local child protective agency. Rather, the reporting to the child protection agency must be made first.

"However, internal procedures to facilitate reporting and appraise supervisors and administrators of reports may be established provided that they are not inconsistent with the provisions of this article." [Cal. Penal Code, 11166 (f)]

The individual is required to report known or suspected instances of child abuse "<u>immediately or</u> as soon as possible by telephone and shall prepare and send a written report thereof within 36 hours of receiving the information concerning the incident." [Cal. Penal Code, 11166; emphasis added by the Province lawyer].

Such reporting is to be made to the Child Protective Agency. If the telephone of this agency is not known, one can simply call the local police department.

The reporting requirements are individual and cannot be fulfilled by reporting to one's superior.

Indeed, the statute expressly prohibits a supervisor from impeding or interfering with an employee's reporting duties.

"The reporting duties under this section are individual, and no supervisor or administrator may impede or inhibit the reporting duties and no person making such a report shall be subject to any sanctions for making the report. [Cal Penal Code, 11166 (f)]

INTERNAL REPORTS CONCERNING ALLEGATIONS OF CHILD ABUSE

If the province itself, or the parish, or the retreat center, or other Franciscan apostolate arranges for an internal investigation, such internal reports <u>may</u> be subject to court subpoenas or other discovery in a subsequent criminal or civil proceeding. This possibility should be made clear to all those who take part in any internal review and reporting.

LIABILITY

Not only is the person alleged to have committed child abuse subject to investigation, and if the suspicion seems verified, subject to possible criminal charges, but the institution itself might also come under "vicanous liability". This means that the parish, the retreat center, another Franciscan apostolate and even the Province as such might be liable to suit, if the administrators of any of these institutions: (a) have deliberately delayed or prevented such reporting, or (b) have not

adequately advised all employees of this California statute, or (c) have negatively sanctioned any employee who has made such a reporting.

This policy is in no way meant to be construed as either supplanting California State Law or as impeding and inhibiting the obligation of individuals to report child abuse cases.

This Province Policy serves as the statement required by the California Penal Code 1116.5 (a)

THE STATE OF ARIZONA

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Province policy is no more than a restatement of Arizona state law (Criminal Code 13-3620).

WHO MUST REPORT?

Any physician, hospital intern or resident, surgeon, dentist, osteopath, chiropractor, podiatrist, county medical examiner, nurse, psychologist, school personnel, social worker, peace officer, parent or counselor or any other person having responsibility for the care or treatment of children whose observation or examination of any minor discloses grounds to believe that a minor is or has been the victim of injury, sexual molestation, death, abuse, or physical neglect which appears to have been inflicted upon such minor by other than accidental means or which is not explained by the available medical history as being accidental in nature or who has reasonable grounds to believe there has been a denial or deprivation of necessary medical treatment or nourishment with the intent to cause or allow the death shall immediately report or cause reports to be made of such information to a peace officer or to the protective services of the department of economic security.

Any person other than one required to report or cause reports to be made who has reasonable grounds to believe that a minor is or has been a victim of abuse or neglect may report the information to a peace officer or to the child protective services.

In any civil or criminal litigation in which a child's neglect, dependency, abuse or abandonment is an issue, a clergyman or priest shall not, without his consent, be examined as a witness concerning any confession made to him in his role as a clergyman or a priest in the course of the discipline enjoined by the church to which he belongs. However, nothing in the law discharges the clergyman or priest from the duty to report.

HOW TO REPORT?

The reports shall be made immediately by telephone or in person and shall be followed by a written report within seventy-two (72) hours. This report is made to a peace officer or to the child protective services. IN ADDITION THE PROVINCIAL OFFICE MUST BE INFORMED IMMEDIATELY THAT SUCH A REPORT HAS BEEN MADE.

WHAT TO REPORT?

Such reports shall contain:

 The names and addresses of the minor and his parents or person or persons having custody of such minor, if known;

 The minor's age and the nature and extent of his injunes or physical neglect, including any evidence of previous injuries or physical neglect;

 Any other information that such person believes might be helpful in establishing the cause of the injury or physical neglect.

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LIABILITY

A person turnishing a report, information, or records required or authorized under this law, or a person participating in a judicial or administrative proceeding or investigation resulting from a report, information or records required or authorized under this law, shall be immune from any civil or criminal liability by reason of such action unless such person acted with malice or unless such person has been charged with or is suspected of abusing or neglecting the child or children in question.

VIOLATION/PENALTY

A person who violates any provision of this law is guilty of a class 1 misdemeanor.

THE STATE OF NEVADA

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Province policy is no more than a restatement of Nevada state law (432B.010 to 432B.400).

WHO MUST REPORT?

A report must be made immediately to an agency which provides protective services or to a law enforcement agency when there is reason to believe that a child has been abused or neglected.

Reports must be made by the following persons who, in their professional or occupational capacities, know or have reason to believe that a child has been abused or neglected: those in the medical field or as well as psychologists, marriage and family therapists, alcohol or drug abuse counselors; any personnel of a hospital or similar institution engaged in the administration, examination, care or treatment of persons or an administrator, manager or other person in charge of a hospital or similar institution upon notification of suspected abuse or neglect of a child by a member of the staff of the hospital; a clergyman, practitioner of Christian science or religious healer, unless he has acquired the knowledge of the abuse or neglect for the offender during a confession; a social worker and an administrator, teacher, librarian or counselor of school; any person who maintains, is employed by or serves as a volunteer for an agency or service which advises persons regarding abuse or neglect of a child and refers them to persons and agencies where their requests and needs can be met.

A report may be made by any other person.

HOW TO REPORT?

A report must be made to an agency which provides protective services or to a law enforcement agency immediately, but in no event later than 24 hours after there is reason to believe that a child has been abused or neclected. IN ADDITION THE PROVINCIAL OFFICE MUST BE INFORMED IMMEDIATELY THAT SUCH A REPORT HAS BEEN MADE.

WHAT MUST BE REPORTED?

The report must contain the following information, if obtainable:

- The name, address, age and sex of the child;
- The name and address of the child's parents or other person responsible for his care;
- The nature and extent of the abuse or neglect of the child;
- Any evidence of previously known or suspected abuse or neglect of the child or the child's siblings;
- The name, address and relationship, if known, of the person who is alleged to have abused or neglected the child; and
- Any other information known to the person making the report that the agency which provides protective services considers necessary.

LIABILITY

Immunity from civil or criminal liability extends to every person who in good faith:

- Makes a report pursuant to the provisions of this law;
- Conducts an interview or allows an interview to be taken pursuant to this law;
- Participates in a judicial proceeding resulting from a referral or recommendation.

PENALTY/VIOLATION

Any person who knowingly and willfully violates the provisions of this law is guilty of a misdemeanor. (7-19-89)

THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Province's policy is no more than a restatement of the New Mexico state law (Children's Code 32-1-15).

WHO MUST REPORT?

Any licensed physician, resident or intern examining, attending or treating a child, any law enforcement officer, registered nurse, visiting nurse, schoolteacher or social worker acting in his official capacity or any other person knowing or suspecting that a child is an abused or a neglected child shall report the matter immediately.

HOW TO REPORT?

The report shall be made immediately to:

- the criminal prosecution division of the office of the district attorney; or
- 2) 3)
- the county social services office of the human services department in the county where the child resides; or
- the probation services office of the judicial district in which the child resides:

IN ADDITION THE PROVINCIAL OFFICE MUST BE INFORMED IMMEDIATELY THAT SUCH A REPORT HAS BEEN MADE.

WHAT MUST BE REPORTED?

The report shall contain the names and addresses of the child and his parents, guardians or custodians, the child's age, the nature and extent of the child's injuries, including any evidence of previous injuries, and other information that the maker of the report believes might be helpful in establishing the cause of the injuries and the identity of the person or persons responsible for the injuries.

LIABILITY

Anyone reporting an instance of alleged child neglect or abuse or participating in a judicial proceeding brought as a result of a report required by the law is presumed to be acting in good faith and shall be immune from liability, civil or criminal, that might otherwise be incurred or imposed by the law, unless the person acted in bad faith or with malicious purpose.

VIOLATION/PENALTY

Any person failing, neglecting or refusing to report is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00

THE STATE OF OREGON

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Province policy is no more than a restatement of Oregon state law (ORS 418.740 to 418.775).

WHO MUST REPORT?

Any public or private official (physician, dentist, school employee, licensed practical nurse or registered nurse, peace officer, psychologist, clergyman, social worker, optometrist, chiropractor, certified employer of day care, etc) having reasonable cause to believe that any child with whom the official comes in contact in an official capacity has suffered abuse, or that any person with whom the official comes in contact in an official capacity has abused a child shall report or cause a report to be made in the manner required.

Nothing contained in Oregon law shall affect the duty to report imposed by this section, except that a psychiatrist, psychologist, clergyman or attorney shall not be required to report such information communicated by a person if the communication is privileged under Oregon law.

Oregon law (ORS 40.260 Rule 506) defines privileged communication for clergy-penitent to be:

-"Confidential communication" means a communication made privately and not intended for further disclosure except to other persons present in furtherance of the purpose of the communication.

•A member of the clergy shall not, without consent of the person making the communication, be examined as to any confidential communication made to the member of the clergy in the member's professional character.

If a clergyman receives information concerning a child abuse instance outside of this privileged communication definition, he is required to make a report according to the law.

HOW TO REPORT?

An oral report shall be made immediately by telephone or otherwise to the local office of the Children's Services Division or to a law enforcement agency within the county where the person making the report is at the time of the contact. IN ADDITION THE PROVINCIAL OFFICE MUST BE INFORMED IMMEDIATELY THAT SUCH A REPORT HAS BEEN MADE.

WHAT MUST BE REPORTED?

If known, such reports shall contain the names and addresses of the child and or other persons responsible for care of the child, the child's age, the nature and extent of the abuse (including any evidence of previous abuse), the explanation given for the abuse and any other information which the person making the report believes might be helpful in establishing the cause of the abuse and the identity of the perpetrator.

LIABILITY

Anyone participating in good faith in the making of a report pursuant to Oregon law and who has reasonable grounds for the making thereof, shall have immunity from any liability, civil or criminal, that might otherwise be incurred or imposed with respect to the making or content of such report.

(7-19-89)

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THE STATE OF UTAH

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Province policy is no more than a restatement of the Utah state law (Social Services Code 62-A-4-501 to 504).

WHO MUST REPORT?

Whenever any person including, but not limited to, persons licensed under the Medical Practices Act or the Nurse Practice Act, has reason to believe that a child has been subjected to incest, molestation, sexual exploitation, sexual abuse, physical abuse, or neglect, or who observes a child being subjected to conditions or circumstances which would reasonably result in sexual abuse, physical abuse, or neglect, he shall immediately make a report.

Reporting requirements of this law do not apply to a clergyman or priest, without the consent of the person making the confession, with regard to any confession made to him in his professional character in the course of discipline enjoined by the church to which he belongs, if:

- the confession was made directly to the clergyman or priest by the perpetrator; and
- b)

a)

the clergyman or priest is, under canon law or church doctrine bound to maintain the confidentiality of that confession.

If a clergyman or priest receives information about abuse or neglect from any source other than confession of the perpetrator, he is required to give notification on the basis of that information even though he may have also received a report of abuse or neglect from the confession of the perpetrator. Exemption of notification requirements for a clergyman or priest does not exempt a clergyman or priest from any other efforts required by law to prevent further abuse or neglect by the perpetrator. (62A-4-503)

HOW TO REPORT?

The report is made immediately to the nearest police officer, law enforcement agency, or office of the division. Oral reports shall be followed by a written report within 48 hours, of so requested by the division. IN ADDITION THE PROVINCIAL OFFICE MUST BE INFORMED IMMEDIATELY THAT SUCH A REPORT HAS BEEN MADE.

LIABILITY

Any person or official participating in good faith in making a report is immune from any fability, civil or criminal, that otherwise might result by reason of those actions.

VIOLATION/PENALTY

Any person or official required to report a case of suspected child abuse, neglect, fetal alcohol syndrome, or fetal drug dependency, who willfully fails to do so is guilty of a class B misdemeanor.

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THE STATE OF WASHINGTON

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In the State of Washington a child is legally defined as any person under 18 years of age; developmentally disabled persons of any age are also protected under the law.

Province policy is no more than a restatement of Washington state law (Chapter 26.44).

WHO MUST REPORT?

The Washington State law (RCW 26.44) requires the following persons to report suspected child abuse: licensed providers of health care (physicians, nurses, dentists, pharmacists, psychologists, physician assistants, etc) and religious healing practioners, professional school personnel, social workers, employees of the Department of Social and Health Services.

Any other person who has reasonable cause to believe that a child or adult dependent or developmentally disabled person has suffered abuse or neglect may report such incident to the proper law enforcement agency or to the department of social and health services.

Since clergy are not specifically mentioned in the statute naming those classifications of persons who a obliged by law to report instances of child abuse, clergy then fail automatically into the category of those may report.

In Washington state law, there is a specific statute recognizing the priest-penitent privilege but the stagilegislature has deliberately qualified that privilege to exclude child abuse. Therefore, clergy are not requery law to report child abuse, but clergy are obliged by the law to testify if they are subpoended. There is evidence to indicate that this particular statute will be tested in the courts.

HOW TO REPORT?

Reports are made by phone, in writing (if requested) or in person to the local law enforcement agency or Department of Social and Health Services Community Service Office, Child Protective Services. To find out which local CPS office should be contacted call: **1-800-562-5624**. THIS TOLL FREE, 24 HOUR HUMBER WILL GIVE YOU THE LOCAL PROTECTIVE SERVICES' PHONE NUMBER IN YOUR AREA.

The report shall be made at the first opportunity, but in no case longer than forty-eight (48) hours after the reasonable cause to believe that the child or adult has suffered abuse or neglect. IN ADDITION THE PROVINCIAL OFFICE MUST BE INFORMED THAT SUCH A REPORT HAS BEEN MADE.

WHAT MUST BE REPORTED?

Name, address, age, height, weight, and head circumference (when appropriate) of the child;
Name and address of the adult having custody of the child;
Description of current physical and/or emotional condition, abuse, and/or neglect;
Any evidence of previous injuries or negligence and their nature and extent;
Any information which would help establish the cause of the child's death, injuries, or neglect, and the possible identity of the perpetrator. Include pertinent notes by paramedical, nursing, or social work staff in addition to physician's record.

LIABILITY

Any person who in good faith makes a report and gives testimony in regard to suspected child abuse is immune from civil or criminal liability.

VIOLATION/PENALTY

Every person who is required to make, or to cause to be made, a report and who knowlingly fails to make, or fails to cause to be made, such a report, shall be guilty of a gross misdemeanor.

delwrote. "Idid whatever I could to resist the inevitable arrival of puberty."

But puberty came and so did his education at the now closed St. Anthony's in Santa Batbara where he said he, too, was molested by a priest.

Van Handel wrote that the incident occurred in 1962, during his sophomore or junior year, as he slept alone in the school's infirmary.

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
"He went on to abuse the way he had been abused. It was almost a carbon copy," said Annette Goodheart, a Santa Barbara psychologist who has treated some of Van Handel's victims.

The Franciscan father's abuse of boys began in the early 1970s while he attended graduate school in Berkeley. He wrote that his first victim was either a 5-year-old relative in Oregon or a young choir boy he met in 1972.

He took nude photographs of some victims and kept the snapshots until fear of discovery drove him to destroy the evidence. "There is something about me

that is happier when accompanied by a small boy," Van Handel wrote. "I think it is probably a combination of sexual feelings, emotional attachment and perhaps the child in me wants a playmate."

The need to be near boys led him to form the Santa Barbara Boys

Van Handel, as with other successful molesters, used his friendship with the boys' families to gain their trust so he could be near the children.

Only Van Handel and another priest were prosecuted because the other molestations were revealed after the statute of limitations had expired.

"Everyone held the priests in high regard, so who could the boys turn to for help?" Mar asked, "The : successful molester is someone

who will be very skilled at being able to endear himself to others.' Van Handel proved quite adept. "He was very likable on the face of it," said Santa Barbara police Ofwhose two ficer younger brothers were victimized by Van Handel. "The families trusted him to care for their little ones."

Van Handel presided at 1985 wedding. She only learned of the molestations years later.

The night after Van Handel's sentencing, dreamed the priest had stolen her 20-month-son.

"My parents don't go to church anymore." Said. "Everyone in my family is bitter. There is a deep ache inside." $\gamma > -\epsilon$

The St. Anthony's nightmare came to light when police arrested Van Handel's associate, the Rev. Philip Wolfe, who was convicted of molesting a child in 1989.

Attention then focused on Van Handel, who confessed to church officials in the spring of 1992. He received months of therapy at a church-run institution in Suitland, Md., before being moved to another center in Santa Cruz County.

On March 1 of this year, one of Van Handel's victims told officers Van Handel had abused him from 1983 to 1989.

Despite his long and self-documented history as an abuser, the arrest that followed took him by surprise.

"Oh. my God!" Van Handel said when McGrew arrived.

"He was shocked, but he instantly clammed up." McGrew said.

Priest's writings describe descent inte degradation

By the Rev. Robert Van Handel's account, his journey from piety to prison began with a view of sex twisted by a stern, religious upbringing and his molestation at the hands of a deviant cleric.

The 47-year-old former St. Anthony's Seminary rector provided a self-portrait of a pedophile through writings in a diary and typed autobiography.

The recently released materials were key evidence in the case against Van Handel, who wassentenced by Santa Barbara Superior Court Judge Patrick McMahon on Aug. 12 to an eightyear prison term for child molestation.

St. Anthony's Seminary Priest Gets Maximum Prison

O Santa Barbara-Superior Court Judge Patrick McMahon sentenced former Santa Barbara Boys Choir leader and St. Anthony's Seminary Rector Robert Van Handel to eight years in state prison, the maximum possible sentence, for sexually molesting a former choirboy in the late 1980s.

Van Handel, 47, had been accused by several former choirboys and seminary students of molestation, but in all of those cases the statute of limitations had already expired. It was only early. this year that an 18 year-old former chorboy, approached police, and told them that he too had been molested by-Van Handel, recently, enough that the six-year statute of limitations had not expired Police arrested Van Handel at a retreat house in San Juan Baurista, where he was living while receiving. psychiatric treatment at an outpatient clinic in Santa Cruz. Among his posses-sions, police seized a diary. Van Handel had written as part of his therapy which chronicled his sexual history with boys. Shorthy after his arrest. Van Handel pleaded guilty to one charge of lewd behavior with a minor.

The revealing diary, together with the written evaluations of Van Handel's court appointed psychiatrists and probation officer, convinced the judge he should deny a defense request for

parole and sentence Van Handel to the harshest possible sentence. That the defendant on one day could give communion to the same child he had fondied or photographed the day before is evidence of a criminal pathology so severe it shocks even the most hardened members of the criminal justice system," wrote Van Handel's probation officer in his recommendation for stiff. sentencing 1.... 1. 12.

Among the diary's revelations was a confession that the priest molested his five year old nephew, and a narrative of his "relationship" with a boy whom he tied up and photographed posed as a prisoner in the seminary tower. In addition to the boys he abused. Van Handel also wrote about his experiences with three adult female parishioners with whom he had sex. While the diary was often filled with passages about selfloathing, suicide, and failure, it also showed a side of the priest's tortured psyche that McMahon characterized as evil." Prior to making up his mind, said McMahon, "I read, and I read, and I read, and it was not easy reading."

Van Handel himself was a victim of secual abuse at St. Anthony's when he was fifteen, and the way he chose to molest boys by giving them massages" and fondling their genitals eerily paralleled his own experience at the

Ex-student is fourth to sue seminary

A fourth ex-student of St Anthony's Seminary in Santa Barbara is suing a priest and church heirarchy for an alleged sexual molestation that occurred 39 years ago.

Last November, the Franciscan Order consented to an inquiry into allegations that boys had been molested by priests at the school. investigators revealed that at least 34 boys had been molested by 11 faculty members over 20 years. The school closed in 1987.

In a lawsuit filed in Superior Court in Santa Barbara last week former student Michael T. Donnelyalleges he was molested by Mario Cimmarusti in 1964. Other former students have publicly said Chimmarusti moiested them, but they have not filed suft

The court filing does not say how old Donnelly was at the time the alleged molestation occurred, or where he lives now. He attended the school until 1968.

Donnelity's court papers say he was molested by Cimmarusti when he visited the friar for treatment of a poison oak rash in his groin area. Cimmarusti administered first aid at the school.

The lawsuit slieges that Cimmanusti fondled the boy's genitals and attempted to orally copulate him. Romaeling suit says he repressed his memory of the incident until he was reminded of it during the inquiry last year by a panel inade up of priests, abuse courselors and a representative of students' families.

Two seminary priosis have been adjudicated for criminal child molestations.

The Rev. Robert Van Handel, the seminary's last rector and the leader of the unaffiliated Santa Barbara Boys Choir, pleaded guilty to charges of molestation and is due for sentencing Aug. 12. The Rev. Philip Wolfe, a former

The Rev. Phillp Wolfe, a former seminary teacher and a boys choir director, was jailed for a year in 1991 for sexually molesting a boy and has since been defrocked.





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

Dear Robert

Peace. I hope you are well; please be assured always of my love and support.

As you know, the Santa Barbara situation is fast coming to a close. With this letter I would like to bring you up to date on happenings.

The Board of Inquiry has issued two reports: an Internal Administrative Report to me which contains all the pertinent information and details of the allegations; a public report which will be presented to the public (whoever comes) on Monday evening, November 29th, at the Goleta Valley Community Center in Santa Barbara. The public report is about eighty pages long, and it does contain a section listing the number of friars reported (12), the number of victims (35), and a description of the behavior involved. No names are used.

There is also a series of five composite portraits (sort of like case studies) of the types of abuse that occurred. This is followed by a description of the impact of the actions on the victims. There is a brief description of the actions the fraternity and the provincial minister have taken with respect to the friars reported. This is generic and I do not think anyone will be able to identify the individual friars from what has been said. With respect to yourself, the text reads, "Two friars have been completely removed from ministry and are currently enrolled in sexual offender treatment programs known to be rigorous. They are forbidden contact with minors, required to participate in therapy, and have a local monitor."

The report concludes with some recommendations to the fraternity, the laity, and the administration. Overall, it is a good document, but parts of the text are very difficult to read, very explicit and jarring. Many of us have worked long and hard to get it in this shape and to protect as much as possible the good name of the fraternity and the identity and dignity of the friars involved.

Given the circumstances, we have done the best we could.

As you know, your name has been publicly identified in the papers, and I have no idea how much further exposure will be given. I think we have taken all the best steps to move the situation forward, and I am deeply grateful for your cooperation. Certainly, under no circumstances should you return to Santa Barbara County at this time. Probably, if the people ask there about your disposition explicitly, I will give them as much information as is warranted. I am grateful for your release in this area. I ant so much to treat you with the respect and dignity you deserve. We know that this has happened, Robert; but I also know, that there is so much more to you than this--and you are good.

I know that the press will be present when the report is released; this event will probably be covered on local tv, the newspaper, possibly the LA Times, and the National Catholic Reporter. We have little control over what will be reported. It is my hope that they will indicate how well the friars have responded: the fraternity the composition and helping the victims and friars, in establishment of the Board, the willingness to be honest about this problem in our midst, the adoption of a continuing mechanism for addressing this problem, the cooperation of the friars who have been reported, etc. But, I do not know that these positive notes will be reported in the press. I do think that all of us, including yourself, can say that we did the best we could and acted in the best Christian and Franciscan way.

Thanks, Robert. Let us remember each other in prayers.

1. I have been in contact with Robert Van Handel about every six weeks. This contact usually occurs when I stop at his place of residence; there has been little formal discussion, and the initiative lies with me.

gre

2. Robert and I have a very good relationship. We had one serious discussion in which we were able to share mutual feelings about the whole circumstances which have ensued after the disclosure of his activity at St. Anthony Seminary. I found this to be a very good exchange; he seems to me to be making progress around the expression of his feelings.

3. Currently, Robert is enrolled, at my insistence and his final agreement, in a sexual offender treatment clinic in SantaCruz, California. I believe this has moved him beyond the point where he was when discharged from St. Luke's. The approach appears to be more confrontive and is not church based. He does not engage in external sacramental ministry, but has been very useful to the province in taking on administrative projects, something I hope he can do more of in the future. He has been present at some very difficult community meetings where it was well known that he had abused children and that this has caused great difficulty for the fraternity, its public image and liabilities. The friars, I think, have received him well, and he has faced the situation with courage. I hope that progress can continue along these lines, as it is beneficial for all involved.

4. A more accurate description of his current progress can be obtained from the members of his support group. I think he needs to take more initiative in contacting people, getting involved in productive work, speaking about his feelings. The current program in Santa Cruz is absolutely essential to progress.

Let me introduce myself. I am the religious superior of one of our friars, Father Robert Van Handel, who has been referred to Pacific Counselling Associates for treatment. It is my understanding that you are his current therapist.

As you know, Father Robert was engaged in pedophilic behavior with a group of children associated with a Boys Choir which he founded in Santa Barbara. The same activity extended to some of the high school seminarians at St. Anthony Seminary. You are probably well aware of this history both from Father Robert and also from the evaluations from the treatment center in Maryland, St. Luke's Institute.

Over the past year, a Board of Inquiry established by our Province has been investigating the allegations of sexual abuse perpetrated by some of the friars in Santa Barbara. In the course of the investigation, many of Robert Van Handel's victims came forward to describe what has happened to them. The Board has compiled a profile of his behavior as they have heard it, and they have now presented that profile to me so that it might become part of his therapeutic process. I have already spoken to Robert about it, and have told him that I would be forwarding this profile to you so that it can be dealt with in the therapy. Please find this enclosed.

INTRODUCTION TO SEX OFFENDER TREATMENT PROGRAM

The purpose of this letter is to describe to you the goals and requirements of the Pacific Treatment Associates OFFENDER PROGRAM and to give you a general idea of what you can expect during your time here. It would be a good idea to keep this letter in your personal folder so that you can refer to it in the future.

The primary goal of the Offender Program is the prevention of reoffense. Because you have committed a crime against another person or persons you are considered to be a risk to the community there is a strong possibility that you could reoffend. Therefore, it is important that you recognize from the beginning that your presence here in this program is a privilege not a right. You, your primary counselor, and the rest of the staff will work together to decrease that risk.

The Offender Program provides group and individual counseling as well as family reunification counseling when desired and appropriate. You can expect to be in treatment for two to three years; you are required to attend group for the entire time and individual counseling for as long as necessary. Your group counselor will be your primary counselor for the duration of your treatment. He or she will be responsible for monitoring your progress. Your individual counselor will be someone other than your group counselor.

You are expected to:

Attend all group meetings.

Participate actively in group meetings and individual sessions.

Do assigned work within the given period of time.

Pay for group counseling at the beginning of each month. Pay for individual and family counseling before each session, unless arranged otherwise, and be respoonsible for other costs (see, below).

Adhere to the "personal rules" developed by you in your group.

Take a polygraph exam six months into treatment. You may also be required to take a polygraph exam at any time.

Comply with treatment as prescribed by your therapist

Suspension from your group or from the program will occur when there are violations of the above stated expectations. If suspension occurs the court will be notified.

People in the community, neighbors or employers for example, might know of your offense. Several government agencies who have become involved in your life from the moment of reporting will continue to be involved. We will be working with these agencies throughout your treatment here in order to insure that your behavior is consistent with your treatment and legal requirements. Being honest about your thoughts, feelings and behaviors may be difficult under these circumstances. However, we expect you to make this committment. It is the first step in reconstructing your life.

The purpose of this letter is to give you some information about the goals and structure of the group you will be starting, and to help you do well in that setting. When you begin group, you are likely to hear things that shock you or make you feel uncomfortable. You might think, "I don't like this, I don't need it, I'm not as bad as these other guys." Let the group know what you're thinking and give the men a little time to let you know who they are, what they can offer, and what they expect from you.

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If you are like most new men here, you'll look for differences rather than similarities between you and the others. That could slow the pace of your progress, so for now, let's look at how you're alike rather than different.

Most of the men in the program are law abiding except for their deviant sexual behavior. Generally, their sexual problems continued despite remorse, promises, anger, prayer, the realization that the behavior is wrong, and their own attempts to control the problem. Many in your group have tried to avoid experiencing the emotional fear and pain following offense by burying themselves in work, refusing to think about it, drinking, blaming and/or making excuses.

Most new men in group are convinced that they won't offend again. For most group members, the offense is contrary to their own values and beliefs. It's as though they have been leading a double life. They have probably disappointed people important to them just as you have. You are probably reluctant to be completely honest about the problem because you're embarrassed, and because you've lied already to important people and don't want to have to go back to them and tell them about the problem as it really is. You might also be concerned about legal consequences following full disclosure.

Most men in your group don't want to offend but they don't know how to stop permanently, on their own.

Let's talk now about the purpose of group therapy. Group is a weekly reminder of the problem you are working to correct. Before being caught, most men didn't think about their sexual behavior problem unless they were planning it, doing it, being angry with themselves afterwards or worrying about getting caught. The primary purpose of group is to UNDERSTAND, PREDICT, AND CONTROL your problem behavior. In group you'll learn about your warning signs, that is, what your're thinking, feeling, and doing and what's going on in your body prior to the offending. You'll learn about patterns, cycles and controls. There will be instruction, support, and confrontation when you minimize, blame or lie. You'll

get rules and assignments that will help you not to offend again.

Group encourages honesty and self-disclosure. In return you'll get treatment tools that are well-matched and helpful and you'll get a knowlegeable, supportive group to turn to when you need it. There will be good role models in group. Men who are doing well and getting what they want for themselves and their families.

In group, you'll reinact, perhaps unintentionally, some of the problems that bring you here. These might be, for example, secrecy, manipulation, withdrawal, aggressiveness, and blaming. These behaviors will be pointed out to you. You'll be encouraged to try out different, appropriate ways to get what you want: assertiveness, honesty, compassion, and a willingnmess to compromise and negotiate. Also, you'll learn to tolerate frustration without acting in ways that are hurtful to yourself and others.

Your group will meet once a week for two hours. There will be approximately twelve men in the group and they will all have sexual behavior problems. Some of the men are voluntary and some are ordered to be here by other agencies. There will be a therapist in the room at all times. The amount of time you spend in group is related to your honesty, effort, cooperation and progress. You will be placed in a group that is appropriate for you, given your sexual problem, lifestyle, strengths and limitations.

In group, there are candidates, members and graduates; you are a candidate. After a few weeks, when you'll be asking for membership, you'll find there are several requirements. All the members and graduates have to vote you in. In order to decide, they will be looking for the following: that you see yourself as a sex offender, that you are motivated to change, that you have been helpful to the best of your ability, and that you are demonstrating change both inside and out of the group setting. In addition, your first written assignment, a sexual autobiography, must be read to and approved by your group prior to the granting of membership status.

In order to graduate from the program, you must have your sexual deviance problem under control for some time and have a working knowledge of your patterns and controls. All assignments must be completed. There will have been healthy changes in your behavior, attitude and lifestyle. All counselors who have worked with you and your family must be in agreement that you are ready to leave the program.

About your first meeting: Group begins with a summary of the previous week's process provided by that week's leader. Then, a new leader is elected. Each man in the group will tell you about his history of sexual deviancy and then tell the leader what he'd like to accomplish in that week's agenda.

Now, it's your turn. You'll tell the group your history of sexual

deviancy as best you can from the béginning to the present. Members of the group will ask questions so that they can help you do well. Through their questions, support and confrontations you'll learn a lot about yourself. You'll learn how you developed your problem and why you repeated your hurtful behaviors. You'll learn to predict the slide into reoffense and how to control the urge before it becomes hurtful behavior.

When you finish discussing your sexual history, the group will answer any questions you have about the program. Then, you and your group will discuss and get together your rules that will guide your behavior in and out of treatment. For example, whether you can use alcohol, live with children or drive without a destination in mind. There are many standard rules and one of the most important ones is that whatever is said in group stays in group unless the member himself says it's okay to discuss his situation with others. You will be expected to attend every session. You will be expected to be punctual and have your assignments in on time.

Immediately after the first meeting, a couple of the men will stay after with you and give you the first assignment. It's called a sexual autobiography and the content and purpose will be clearly defined for you. You will have two weeks to complete it. If you have any questions or complaints about the program, assignments, rules, or process, tell your group and your counselor right away.

The staff's suggestion is that you accept that you do have a sexual behavior problem that could come back and that you have a lot in common with the other men in your group. They have much to offer and like you, they've "been there." They know what it's like to do what you've done and to struggle to free themselves from the patterns and - they are succeeding.

The group is on your side. They don't expect perfection, but they do demand that you be honest and do what you've agreed to do. If you are honest and work hard, you'll find acceptance and community in your group. You'll learn to like yourself again and to become hopeful about your future. With the group's help, you'll stop hurting people. Perhaps you will return to your family if you are now separated. You will stop wasting your time and energy planning your offense, offending, getting angry with yourself, making false promises and then worrying about getting caught.

Whatever happens in your group, you can handle it. If your therapist has asked you to begin group, it's because he or she is convinced that you have all the necessary skills and strengths to do well and to benefit from the experience.

- to accomplish the behavior and attitude changes needed to prevent reoffense in the future.

Additional goals I want to accomplish:

I agree to attend every weekly group session (except when emergencies arise of when I have obtained group or staff permission) and to pay \$30 for each weekly group session whether I am present or not. I understand that should I miss attending two consecutive meetings without notifying the staff, or miss paying for two consecutive meetings, I will automatically be dropped from the program. Should this occur, I understand that my probation officer (or other appropriate person) will be notified.

I agree to participate in group meetings, to attend individual and other counseling session when applicable, to do assignments which have been designed to help me fulfill my treatment goals, and to respect the privacy of other group members by not revealing names or other 'identifying information to anyone outside of Pacific Treatment Associates.

I acknowledge that I have read and understand this contract, and that in signing it, I make a pledge to complete the entire treatment program.

INTRODUCTION

Child molestation is a common sexual crime that affects one in four females in the United States. A variety of programs have been established to deal with the aftermath of child molestation, but few programs focus on preventing molestation by treating the molester himself. Those programs that do focus on this aspect have come into existence because they believe that if the incidence of child molestation is to be decreased, greater efforts need to be focused on treatment methods which will help the molester gain control over his deviant behavior.

The treatment of those who commit sex offenses (including child molestation) is a relatively new discipline. At least two factors have significantly affected the direction of sex offender treatment over the years; 1) the gradual movement away from the medical or psychiatric model, in which the preferred form is individual therapy sessions, using conventional diagnoses and 2) the new perceptions of rape that have grown out of the women's movement. Before the development of a cohesive women's movement the prevailing view about rapists were that they were sexually unfulfilled men carried away by sudden, uncontrollable surges of sexual desire. It was believed that these desires might have been unleashed by provocative victims and that rapists were psychologically sick men. Today, the majority of programs are rooted in the perception that 1) rape is basically an assaultive crime acted out sexually; 2) that such behavior is generally culturally or experientially learned; and 3) that rape victims include a powerless range of subjects such as little babies, young children, elderly women, and the infirm, as well as other more able but equally unprovocative victims--young women and young men. These ideas are now seen to be applicable to the entire range of sex offenses.

The new sex offender discipline is an integrated one which inludes a variety of psychoynamic, behavioral, cognitive, and biomedical elements and incorporates a wide range of educational and training components. The roots of current techniques can be traced back partially to the work of Masters & Johnson in treating sexual dysfunction. However, most of the concepts now in use have only been developed over the last 10 to 15 years. During this time, scientific research methods have been used to determine the effectiveness of the various approaches in changing behavior and attitudes.

COMPREHENSIVE TREATMENT GOALS

Treatment programs currently existing, both inpatient and outpatient, use the following goals to structure treatment:

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trans the first the Start of Each offender needs a complete, individualized assessment and fredtment plan. Assessment determines individual needs and, in the case of CSATP, as well as other outpatient programs, determines the risk to the THTERVER FOR SOL SOL community.

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2. Each offender needs to a) accept responsibility for the offense(s) in which he has been involved and b) have and understanding of the sequence of thoughts, feelings, events, circumstances, and arousal stimuli that make up the "offense syndrome" that precedes his involvement in sexually aggressive behaviors.

Each offender needs to learn how to a) intervene in or break into his offense pattern at its very first sign and b) call upon the appropriate mehtods, tools, or procedures he has learned, in order to suppress, control, manage, and stop the behavior.

4. Each offender needs to participate in a re-education and resocialization process in order to a) replace anitsocial thoughts and behaviors with prosocial ones, b) acquire a positive self-concept and new attitudes and expectations of himself, and c) learn new social and sexual skills to help cultivate positive, satisfying, pleasurable, and nonthreatening relatationships with others. e international au

Each offender needs time to assimilate new concepts, attitudes, and behaviors and a place to test them safely.

6. Each offender needs a) a post-treatment support, peer, or "rap" group and b) continual posttreatment access to therapy and support in order to maintain permanently a safe lifestyle.

ASSESSMENT

Assessment includes testings, clinical interview, and a measure of arousal by the plethysmograph. Richard Laws, a pioneer in the development of behavioral procedures operates on two beliefs: 1) All sex offenders have problems with deviant sexual arousal and 2) all offenders have problems with self-control of that arousal. The erection response, therefore, gives information on the kinds of things that will "turn a person on." This can help in determining risk for community-based program.

RESPONSIBILITY AND UNDERSTANDING

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We use police reports, reports from victim therapists, interviews of family members, and polygraph testing to promote honesty and acceptance of full responsibility. At CSATP a variety of educational units are presented which help offenders to become familiar with the sequence of thoughts, feelings, events, cricumstances and arousal stimuli that make up his offense.

INTERVENTION AND CONTROL

Interventions come in the form of simplé behavioral techniques such as cognitive deterrents, impulse-charting, thought-shifting or stronger ones such as scheduled overmasturbation, monitoring of behavior and manipulation of the environment. Most researchers recommend that at least two behavioral interventions be used to decrease deviant arousal: aversive conditioning (covert sensitization) and verbal satiation (boredom tapes). Some recommend the use of Depo-provera. Covert sensitization teaches the offender to disrupt fantasies of young children by replacing them with aversive images and satiation reduces arousal by satiating or boring the offender with his own deviant sexual fantiasies.

Satiation

This is a technique which research has shown to be extremely effective in eliminating deviant sexual arousal. It eliminates or greatly reduces fantasies which would otherwise remain in people's minds. While many child molesters claim that they can control their deviant fantasies by eliminating their use of deviant fantasy, this is effective only for short periods of time. In the long run deviant fantasies will return. Offenders can learn to develop methods that will eradicate fantasies, rather than develop strategies to avoid them. To destroy these fantasies, offenders must reach into their memories and "bring them out" while developing some method to destroy their erotic nature. The use of fantasies during satiation is NOT like the use of fantasy in the past. The use of fantasy during satiation does not increase interest and arousal to young children but instead destroys it.

Covert sensitization

This method pairs aversive consequences with the sexually deviant fantasy so that it becomes less pleasurable and erotic. The covert sensitization cycle consists of 1) a neutral pleasant scene followed by 2) a deviant fantasy followed by 3) an aversive consequence and 4) an escape scene.

RE-EDUCATION AND RE-SOCIALIZATION

In CSATP this goal is addressed through the use of Rational Thinking and other methods to overcome cultural stereotypes about the roles of men and women, to overcome misperceptions about human sexuality, to learn to increase appropriate arousal, to deal with the offender's own victimization as a child, to learn to be empathic, to learn to be an assertive person who can manage anger and other negative feelings, to increase self-esteem, and to learn the means of controlling various impulses. These goals are accomplished through various educational units such as Rational Thinking, Sexuality, Communication and Stress Management, and through various assignments such as writing an empathy paper and a reoffense paper.

ASSINILATION AND PRACTICE

OFM VANH 1

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The length of time spent in treatment is approximately two years, which gives the offender time to assimilate material and begin changes. These changes can be practiced in, and monitored by, the group through support and confrontation.

POSTTREATMENT

Each offender is expected to develop and adhere to a posttreatment plan. This plan, wich is approved by the offender's group and the staff, should address the continued need for support, for healthy interactions with others, and for awareness and monitoring of deviant impulses/fantasies/ thoughts, as well as other issues specific to each offender. At CSATP we expect follow-up visits to group for two years following the completion of treatment and a request for additional treatment if the need arises.

This morning I phoned to ask if Robert Van Handel, a Franciscan priest of the St. Barbara Province, could come to St. Luke Institute for diagnostic testing. We agreed that he would arrive Sunday, May 17 and leave sometime after 12:30 pm on Friday, May 22. Following your suggestion, I asked him to call Delia Manning in Admissions for further information regarding what to expect, what to bring, arrival time, etc. I told him that he could also call you if he wished. Thank you for your friendly and professional help and support.

Robert recently received a letter from parents regarding inappropriately touching their son. The letter is enclosed. This incident would have occurred several years ago. My understanding is that the family seems to have no intention of pursuing this situation except 1) I believe they are concerned that Robert get any psychological help he may need; 2) The family filed the issue with the Santa Barbara police. It is not yet clear what the police will do with the information.

Robert is very willing to come to St. Luke Institute for diagnostic testing. He is aware of the fact that you will be forwarding a report with recommendations to Rev. the Provincial of the St. Barbara Province:

I want to thank you for your concern for me at this time. I really appreciate it. And I am sorry if I seemed pushy, but I was, am rather desperate to help my family heal. It is like seeing them in an airplane that is in a tailspin, and all I can do is watch them hopelessly as they fall deeper into their pain.

I know you will reach out very lovingly to them and anything I can do to help you in this, please let me know. This is truly among the heaviest crosses I have had in my life, and the pain is felt very much for Robert also. Be assured of my prayers for you in the decisions you must make. Besides this you have all the rest of the Province to be concerned about.

I am doing O.K. in all this, and I have people I can talk to. Also, God is near and very supportive. I will keep in touch and where I feel appropriate will make suggestions. I hope you will be open to that, and at the same time, assure me, as you did last evening, that you need to work it out in your own way. These checks and balances will help us cope with this whole thing in the best manner possible.

To briefly summarize what I said on the phone last night, I see a real deterioration in spirit. This is why I suggested using the team mentioned in our guidelines. I see them drifting towards external sanctions-court action if the statute of limitations is lifted by the legislature and/or civil action based on interior suffering. They do not seem to be inclined to publicize the matter at present, but I do not think the door to that is closed. that is closed.

I urged them to see their counsellors, and I am trying to find out if there is a support group for those whose children have experienced child abuse. I will suggest to them that they join such a group as a means of helping them heal. I am beginning to think that people can get into such a hurting state that they lose the hope of healing, or for whatever reasons, want to stay in their hurt. I'll keep doing what I can.


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

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

In your most recent letter to us you offered to pay for our counseling costs. We are responding for ourselves.

Before addressing the counseling matter we vividly recall our meeting with you and the Definitorium during the Philip Wolfe proceedings. During that meeting we presented the board with a series of attainable goals. We asked that you apprise us of the outcome of the board's deliberations regarding the goals. To-date we have not received a response from you on the resolution. We certainly feel that a response is long overdo.

As we discussed by phone, we definitely want to know the outcome of the psychological testing of Robert VanHandel, whether any further psychological treatment will be undertaken and what the plans for him will be after the aforementioned are completed.

We recall the way in which you preferred to handle the counseling costs for the same approach with our counseling costs as you preferred with them. We have sought professional counseling as a means of reaching the stated amount. Given this we are presenting you with a \$50,000 bill for each of us, making a total of \$100,000. This covers all counseling costs for us associated with the Wolfe trauma, the VanHandel trauma and future counseling costs associated with both. The heavy anguish experienced by each member of this family occasioned by these events continues on a daily basis. You can have no idea of the extent of the pain and life changes that have come in their aftermath. The latest developments have increased this trauma exponentially. 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



SUGCESTIONS FOR PARENTS WHO WISH TO ASK THEIR CHILDREN ABOUT POSSIBLE SEXUAL INTERFERENCE

In general it best to approach these matters in a calm, relaxed, matterof-fact way. If you are uncomfortable in asking the questions, your child will most likely be uncomfortable in answering them. An unblased, nonjudgemental approach is most likely to elicit truthful answers. Few children will want to tell their parents about something that the parents view as shocking or horrifying. Therefore, it is best to inquire about specific events in as neutral a fashion as possible.

The following example may help:

"Son, do you remember Father Robert from the Boys' Choir? Some of the boys from the choir have recently mentioned that he sometimes gave them back rubs and tummy rubs. I was just curicus, did he ever give back fubs or tummy rubs to you? Did he ever invite you to play games that involved touching you, your legs, tummy, or private parts?"

If the answer is he, you might want to say something like:

"O.K., fine, I was just curious. If you think of something later just let me know. Sometimes some adults do things that aren't such a good idea, or that make you uncomfortable, and it is always important to let another idult know if something like that ever happens to you."

If the child wants to know why Father Robert (or any adult) would do such a thing, you might explain that

"Sometimes people have problems that make them want to do things that they shouldn't. It doesn't mean that Father Robert is a bad person, but it is important that he get help for his problems. That is why it is important that other adults be told when such things have happened, so that they can help Father Robert. Ele is getting such help right now."

A few parents have expressed questions about how to best handle this subject with their sons. For individuals who are now age 14 and over, it is recommended that they be given a copy of this

letter to read for themselves.

It is important that we learn if other individuals were interfered with in any way. If any young men received unwanted attention from Fr. Robert, they are asked to notify their parents, or if they prefer, they can notify Dr. Gorsuch confidentially by phone at (805 687-3128 or in writing at 1335 State Street, Santa Barbara, CA 93101. They may also contact Fr. Tom West confidentially at (415) 863-0111 or write to him at 133 Golden Gate Ave. San Francisco, CA 94102.

Parents of younger children may wish to refer to the enclosed suggestions, or to consult Dr. Gorsuch or Fr. Tom West for assistance. Keep in mind that we have no evidence that any inappropriate activity occurred between Fr. Robert and any other boys in the choir at any time during the past eight years.

Whenever a trusted and admired figure betrays our confidence, feelings of hurt, anger and dismay are inevitable. We may initially deal with such feelings through the use of denial (disbelieving the truth) or projection (blaming the Church or other individuals or institutions). Conversely, our anger may be aimed directly at the individual in question. Any or all of these feelings are normal. In any event, most individuals and families will benefit from an open discussion of their reactions. They may wish to share their feelings and concerns with other families and individuals from the Boys Choir, or they may wish to do so privately or with a professional.

"Did that ever make you embarrassed or uncomfortable?"

If the child responds that yes it did:-

"Well, it was wrong of Father Robert to do that, but it certainly was not your fault."

You might then explain (as above) why Father Robert would do such a thing, and suggest that:

"We talk to a Doctor about this and explain what happened so that Father Robert can get help for his problems, and so that the Doctor can help you to understand that this wasn't your fault."

If the child has answered that yes this did happen to him but no it did not make him embarrassed or uncomfortable, you should probably explain that it was not a good idea for Father Robert to do this and explain (as above) why it is important to always tell another adult when such a thing happens. If you wish, you may still suggest that:


"We explain to a Doctor what happened so that Father Robert can get help for his problems".

Dear Cardinal Mahony:

You have not met us, declining our offer to meet with you in 1989, referring us instead to your auxiliary, Bishop Patrick Ziemann. Our names and our story should be familiar to you. You should remember that in September of 1989, Fr. Phillip Mark Wolfe, O.F.M. was convicted of felony sexual molestation of the state of the admitted of like activity with statute of limitations had already run out. Therefore, there was no legal punishment for more than three years of very serious on going sexual molestation under threat to maintain his silence.

What you must know is that in December of 1991, we learned that had also been sexually molested when he was around the age of 10 by Fr. Robert Van Handel, O.F.M., founder of the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir, faculty member and sometime Rector of Saint Anthony's Seminary in Santa Barbara. A criminal complaint has been filed with the Santa Barbara Police Department.

You denied jurisdiction in the earlier cases because the priest perpetrator was a Franciscan. Once again we beg to differ with that posture, knowing that no priest can function in the archdiocese without archdiocesan permission.

The circle of pain, distrust and damage caused by these men is

growing and becoming increasingly known in our community. This is despite years and months respectively of public Church silence.

The destruction to young lives is impossible to measure or even estimate. The pain of parents, family members and other community members cannot be described in just a few words, as we consider the betrayal and manipulation by our dearly loved and trusted priests.

It is time for the official Church to publicly address this source of pain and destruction. It refuses to go away. It intrudes and weighs down all the other moments of our lives. We are attempting to continue our lives in the shadow of our children's suffering and our own pain of betrayal and loss.

We spoke of these matters with your Episcopal Vicar, Reverend Monsignor John Rohde. We asked that you be personally informed of these tragic developments and our requests for further action by you. Your support staff was not satisfied with the verbal requests as conveyed by Monsignor Rohde. They asked that we put our challenges in writing. So, once again we are writing to you hoping that you will take a more proactive approach this time. Now that this is being put in written form you will note that the letter is being shared with interested members of the community.

Cardinal Mahony, we challenge you as spiritual leader of this archdiocese, as shepherd of a wounded and wandering flock to address this horror, the destruction of our children's lives by sexual abuse by clergy. We challenge you to make a public statement regarding this matter.

Further, we challenge you to form an independent committee to formulate a policy for education, prevention, and response to this evil that includes proper reporting to civil authorities. If such a policy exists, it should be reviewed especially as it pertains to outreach and care of victims and family members. It should define a response to those molested by Order priests, who receive their permission to work in the area from the Archdiocese.

Finally, we challenge you to implement age-appropriate programs of education to teach children in Kindergarten through High School to protect themselves from all forms of sexual abuse. These programs should be in place and operational in one year. If adequately and

sensitively educated, the children are their own best first line of defense. There needs to be concurrent seminars for parents to educate them and foster knowledge so that the children may turn to their parents and to other adults in safety, knowing that they will be believed and threats cannot be made good to enforce their silence.


These three items can be accomplished without great difficulty or expense. They do require a firm commitment to the safety and health of our children and young people. Implementation of these measures would go a long way toward lessening the heart rending, soul slaying anguish of the horror of clerical sexual abuse.

We are ready to meet with you at any time to discuss these three items and any related matters.

You must know that the good works and ministry of the archdiocese have been undermined by this horrendous evil. No ministry has any value if its price is paid with the life of one child. The archdiocese can remain silent no longer in this matter.

The Provincial Definitorium of the Province of St. Barbara met to discuss the status of Robert Van Handel's relation to the Order now that he has been convicted and sentenced for the sexual molestation of someone under 16 years of age. The Definitorium must consider if Robert is to be dismissed from the Order according to Canon 1395.2. The Canon does not require dismissal (si casus ferat). However, the Definitorium must review the case and offer an opinion to the Minister Provincial.

The Definitorium looked at the factors involved in this discussion: liability for the Province, scandal for the people of God, health of Robert, good of the fraternity, the gospel way of life, the timing and the situation, the reputation and morale of the local community that he might live with if he stays in the Order.

The Definitorium examined the following options available to it:

do nothing

a.

b.

c.

e.

dismiss him immediately

decide not to dismiss

d. request letter from Robert in which he would ask to leave the Order

delay any final decision.

The Definitorium is recommending to the Provincial Minister that he not act at this time, but leave the option open for review in the future and that such a review should take place in a year. The Definitorium recommends the above action for the following reasons:

the frail psychological state of Robert Van Handel

• the lack of further information regarding liability implications

• the expectation of the people of God that the Province oversee Robert in the future

• the desire of the majority of friars to balance justice with mercy in the treatment of Robert

give Robert time to discern hown own future vocation

• the Province's plan to set up a house of containment could impact Robert's future.

• Robert as part of his decision-making process needs to understand the severity of limitations that will be placed on him if he remains in the Order.

It was agreed that this Definitorium would like to set as its goals with respect to Robert:

help him make the decision to leave the Order on his own;

- assure him that the Order would take care of him during his probation and help him during his probation to leave the Order and get established;

• make a final decision on this issue by September 1996.

If Robert does not agree to the above, it was the <u>tentative opinion</u> of the Definitorium that the Canon Law regarding dismissal from the Order should be invoked in this case.

Priest at St. Francis arrested for alleged child molestation

"A priest at the St. Francis Retreat Center was arrested by the Santa Barbara Police Department Tuesday for having allegedly molested a young boy during the 1980:.

ing the 1980s. The Rev. Robert Michael Vanhandel was arrested on suspicion of lewd or lascivious acts with a minor with a \$250,000 warrant, according to information from 11. John Thayer of the Santa Barbara Police Department.

Vanhandel, the former head of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir at St. Anthony's Seminary in Santa Barbara, is accused of repeatedly molesting a choir member, Thayer said.

Vanhandel has been stationed at the retreat center in San Juan Bautista for the past six months where he has been working as a bookkeeper and doing other clerical tasks, according to Thayer.

"I think the church assigned him there not so much to hide (him) as to reduce his exposure to the public." Theyer said.

to the public," Thayer said. Before he was transferred to St. Francis, Vanhandel was sent by the Catholic Church to St. Luke's, a treatment center in Maryland, from May of 1992 to june of 1993, according to Thayer.

The alleged molestation started in March of 1983 when the boy was 8 years old and continued until September of 1989 when the boy turned 14,

according to Thayer.

The victim, who is now 18, told investigators that he frequently spent the night on a couch in Vanhandel's apartment in the seminary where Vanhandel would reportedly massage him and rub his genitals, Thayer said.

The alleged molestation continued even after the youth left the seminary in December of 1987 to transfer to Santa Barbara High School.

Vanhandel reportedly had the youth spend at least one night a week at his spartment, Thayer said.

Santa Barbara Police started the investigation earlier this

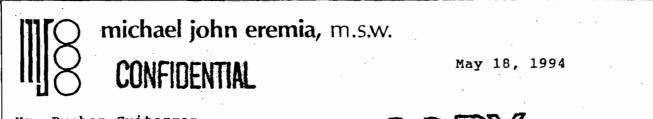

Dear Mr. Guiterrez:

I am writing on behalf of the above-named client, a selfconfessed child molester currently detained at the IRC facility of Santa Barbara County Jail while awaiting sentencing. Please accept the following clinical evaluation and recommendations for your review and consideration.

Mr. Van Handel, a 5'9" tall Caucasian male weighing 156 lbs., with brown eyes, balding with brown hair, is a Franciscan priest whose meek demeanor, hunched stance, and soft-spoken voice reflect his self-reports of feelings of humiliation, guilt and inadequacy. Even while acknowledging his own capacity for being manipulative, this prisoner comes across as a kind, empathic, intelligent, and passive man. His general attitude and behavior during the twice weekly sessions since April 12 have been characterized by cooperativeness, anxiety, displays of remorse and self-pity, and-at times--despair.

The quality of Mr. Van Handel's speech suggests he is struggling for control over unwanted feelings of helplessness. While speaking spontaneously, clearly and coherently, the rate of flow indicates he is carefully thinking through his thoughts and verbal productions in an effort to reduce his anxieties about imprisonment, while making certain the interviewer obtains needed information. The client readily acknowledged that one of the most anxiety-inducing aspects of imprisonment for him is the loss of control over management of his daily life. Jail time has heightened his self-acknowledged exaggerated control needs by frustrating his abilities to function freely in society. All of Mr. Van Handel's speech has been relevant in content, with no evidence of loss of goal idea, thought blocking, or circumstantial responses.

His primary mood is depression, currently controlled by a daily intake of 25 mg. of Zoloft, reportedly prescribed by the County Jail psychiatrist, Dr. Howard Babus. Additionally, the prisoner is administered 100 mg. of Nortriptalene to reduce his bedtime anxieties and make sound sleep possible. During the

interview sessions, Mr. Van Handel, appearing preoccupied, frequently moves his right hand across his forehead or touches the back of his neck in an apparent effort to calm or reassure himself as he discloses his life history and daily activities, thoughts and moods. The telling and re-telling of personal details of his life and anti-social behavior has been both anxiety-provoking and depressing for this man.

The onset, duration, and intensity of his depression have an escalating history dating back to 1983 when he sought private therapy with Gerald White, Ph.D., clinical psychologist. At that time, thoughts of suicide were strong and pervasive enough to cause chronic loss of sleep. Currently, obsessive thoughts about suicide do recur, but the client states he would not act on those thoughts and does not view himself as suicidal. In his presentation of self, Mr. Van Handel gave no evidence of complaints or overconcern with his physical health or body functioning. Nor did he display symptomatic expression of ruminative thinking--repeated the thoughts at the abstract ideational level. Such thinking is found in those sex offenders who are either pre-schizophrenic, in a state of denial, or simply trying to distract the interviewer--none of There is some evidence of echolalia, which apply to this client. or perseverated thinking, in Mr. Van Handel's repetitive references to his conviction that he is "a failure with nothing to live for." The client produced no thoughts or verbalizations which suggested delusions, hallucinations, or paranoid ideas of reference in which he felt he was being victimized into behaving in anti-social ways.

His description of his life history, the anti-social acts he committed, and his current mood and thoughts reveal a man of above average intelligence. He is oriented to time, place, persons and circumstances in uniformly appropriate ways. Mr. Van Handel makes good eye contact and speaks softly in measured, deliberate tones, both when speaking spontaneously and when responding to inquiries. His verbal and non-verbal communications about himself and his role indicate an awareness that he is responsible for his past compulsive actions. The client questioned whether or not he was engaging in selective perception and recall when describing interactions with minors from 1987 until 1992. He displayed good remote memory in recalling his early childhood, adult life from 1965 to 1983, and good immediate memory describing events from 1992 to the present.

Mr. Van Handel made it clear that he wanted full disclosure of his acting-out history as a step in controlling his pedophilic tendencies. He said he fully recognized that his full and candid disclosures increased the risk of additional or maximum sentencing versus the possibility of parole and outpatient treatment. However, he feels full disclosures to the best of his ability to

recall has a therapeutic effect which outweighs the risk factor associated with the actual sentencing.

Accordingly, he furnished the following personal history. The client states he was born to an American father stationed in the military and a British colonial mother in Georgetown, Guyana, on April 2, 1947. His parents had met in Guyana during World War II, when the territory was known as British Guiana. The couple married and moved to Wisconsin where Mr. Van Handel's mother gave birth to his older sister, Sandra. His mother became depressed to the point the family returned to what is now known as Guyana. His sister, Christine, was born there April 14, 1945, and two years later he arrived on the scene. In 1949 the entire family returned to Wisconsin and began a series of moves to various military bases. By the time he was seven years old, he had lived in Kimberly, Wisconsin, Fort Wayne, Indiana, Buffalo, New York, and Atlanta, Georgia. Mr. Van Handel's father was an Air Force officer working in various Air Force finance offices.

The family moved from Van Nuys to Inglewood--then to Buena Park. When he was 6 or 7 years old (1953-54), the client states, he got in trouble for pulling down the pants of another boy. His family lived comfortably since the father worked both as a real estate appraiser and as a savings and loan officer. In 1956 the family settled in Buena Park where Mr. Van Handel attended St. Pious V Catholic Elementary School from 5th through 8th grades. Significant childhood memories during grade school years, which proved to be anxiety provoking, centered around authority figures. He recalls feeling confused and upset by having his genitals examined by a physician.

Interactions with his father were difficult and often frightening. Describing his father as having "a terrible temper due to his alcoholism," the client recalls resenting the rigid, authoritarian parenting the family was subjected to. He said his father "ruined" the good times most families took for granted. Robert was forced, as a child, to pick weeds on Saturdays, not allowed to watch TV on school nights. Father was described as "arrogant, self-centered, cheap, melancholy and concerned with religious show." Mr. Van Handel stated he was prone to being guarded around his father who would not tolerate any look of dissatisfaction on the faces of any of his children. There was to be no disagreement with any of his decrees, no back-talk, and no spontaneous dissent. His younger brother, Peter, was born in 1956. The youngest sibling, David, was born in 1958, as the family continued its traditional and routine rituals of obedience to father and mandatory church attendance.

During his four years at Pious V Elementary School, Robert states he was a B student who was fearful of his parents. He described his mother as critical and emotionally distant. She would wring her hands when upset and say things like, "You lazy boy," "I'm going to wring your ears," or "I'm going to knock your block off." When his father was upset, the sound of his raised voice made Robert try to get out of his way as quickly as possible or to literally hide. When he was in the 8th grade, his father read him a Catholic sex education book. This proved to be a traumatic experience for him, because his sisters witnessed this happening and laughed at him during and after each forced reading.

Upon his graduation from Pious V at age 14, the family sent him to St. Anthony's Seminary in Santa Barbara to continue his education. The client stated that he wanted and welcomed the experience of getting away from his family. His father urged him by stating, "You really ought to try it." Robert declared he liked the seminary high school experience but found languages and math difficult. It was a very structured program. A lot of his friends in the high school left prematurely because of the rigidity of the academic program. He experienced anxiety when four of his friends were expelled for talking to girls. At age 15 his anxiety and confusion escalated when he was molested by an alcoholic priest at the seminary. The allegedly offending priest was unnamed but was identified as the vice-principal of the school.

According to Mr. Van Handel, the priest entered his room, pulled down his pajamas, rubbed his chest until he got an erection, then played with Robert's genitals for about 10 minutes. Robert states he was embarrassed and ashamed but didn't know who to talk to about the trauma. The priest reportedly told him "the rubbing exercise" was designed to make him perspire and thereby rid him of his "fever." The client states he was confused by the experience which did not affect his academic or social performance at the seminary. Throughout his high school years he was perceived and treated by peers and faculty as "boyishly naive."

During these years (1961-1965), his temperamental, alcoholic father visited him once a month, usually alone, because his mother suffered from car sickness. While he welcomed the infrequent visits by both parents, he was apprehensive when his father came alone. Every summer the family rented a cabin near Big Bear. Robert spent the summers from 1961 to 1965 struggling with nighttime wet dreams and guilt stemming from the foreboding warnings, "Try not to enjoy it" he read in a book written by a conservative Catholic. Upon his graduation from the high school at the seminary in 1965, he took a neighborhood girl, to a movie theater. It was memorable because it was his first and

last date, ending with a kissless "goodnight."

That fall he entered San Luis Rey College, a Franciscan ary near Oceanside, California. He, like other seminarians. seminary near Oceanside, California. whose parents couldn't subsidize them, was required to pay his own tuition. After his father was laid off, Robert began to work fulltime during the summer in order to pay for his college tuition for his final two years. In his second year at San Luis Rey, fellow seminarians began to confide in one another about the frequency of their masturbation. Robert states he was "amazed" by the revelation and began to fantasize interchangeably about having sex with boys and women. He realized in 1966 for the first time that the sexual attraction to children was real after he saw a picture of a young boy swimming while in an inner tube. The client states he was aroused and startled by the experience of being aroused. When he questioned a fellow seminarian regarding his classmates' reaction to the same picture and got a neutral response, he felt uneasy at his own reaction of arousal.

From 1966 through 1969, he developed and cultivated an intense interest in music. In retrospect, he realizes he was sublimating his sexual interest into the world of music. After graduation in 1969 from the college at San Luis Rey with a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy, Mr. Van Handel spent the summer of 1969 in Oregon. In Corvalis he worked at the Children's Farm Home as a child care worker. The client states he shared a caseload of older teenagers with whom he shared a non-sexual with relationship for three months. According to him, there were no acting-out episodes on his part during this period. From there, he was transferred to the Franciscan Novitiate in Sacramento where he worked at St. Patrick's Children's Home as a child care worker during the period of August 15, 1969 to August 16, 1970. offenses were perpetrated, he declares, in this time period. No

In September 1970 he enrolled in the Franciscan School of Theology in Berkeley, California and pursued theological studies there until October 1973. During this time he started a boys' choir and found himself attracted to the young boys in the choir. During October 1973 he was sent to Oxford University in England, University of Freiburg in Germany, and then to Cambridge University to continue his graduate studies in theology. Mr. Van Handel states he was shocked and aroused by the open display of pictures of nude children and sex between children and adults in many magazines for sale in European cities.

He returned from Europe during the summer of 1974 and went to Phoenix, Arizona at the direction of his Provincial in order to enter an internship as a church deacon. Robert worked in a

parochial school teaching singing for six months. He states he was attracted to a young boy at the school but did not act-out because of the attraction. This child, approximately 9 years old, fit the profile of so many of Mr. Van Handel's subsequent victims, he declared. He was slight, slender and appeared helpless. When encouraged to describe his own attitudes, behavior and appearance at a similar stage of psychosexual development, Mr. Van Handel wept and stated he recalls feeling frightened and needing reassurance but not knowing how to ask for it. There was a lack of comforting touching from parents.

In the spring of 1975, he completed his graduate work in Theology in Berkeley where he resumed working with the Boys' Choir which he started. On May 17, 1975, he was ordained a Franciscan priest at St. Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco. His plan and goal was to enter the graduate program in Education at U.C. Berkeley where he had applied and was accepted for admission. Robert stated he was bitterly disappointed and upset when the Provincial would not let him attend. Instead, he was sent--over his protest--to St. Anthony's Seminary in Santa Barbara. His dislike for the assignment was immediate and pervasive, and he cited several reasons for his reaction to St. Anthony's.

First, the staff had been depleted with the departure of teachers for financial and personal reasons. Mr. Van Handel was given the work of two former instructors in his first year as a teacher. Secondly, the academic climate, as well as the social milieu, had changed since he was a student at the school in the early 1960's. The stress was severe, because the student body had changed from predominantly well-mannered Caucasian children willing to pursue rigorous academic studies to a mixture of lower income minorities who refused to study Latin and Greek, and generally behaved in an unruly manner, according to him. The curriculum had changed from classical to modern, and he was not really equipped to provide first-class teaching in math and science.

Mr. Van Handel remained a teacher at St. Anthony's from 1975 until 1985. He says that the combination of his attraction to children and his frustration with work led him in 1976 to succumb to the temptation to photograph children in the nude and to tickle them. He stated this activity was self-reinforcing, because no one resisted or complained. Further, he assumed their parents knew but didn't care about what he viewed as harmless fun at the time. Mr. Van Handel appeared eager to stress that he was never naked with any of the boys, never masturbated in front of them, and never had oral sex with any of them. At the same time, he did acknowledge that he did derive sexual gratification from these activities which took place from 1975 until 1983. He named

as the six youngsters who were recipients of his molest activities during that eight-year period.

These activities ceased, the client states, when he saw a 1983 article in the L.A. Times documenting the arrest of the director of the California Boys' Choir on charges of molestation. Mr. Van Handel consulted Jerry White, Ph.D., Clinical Psychologist, for about six months in 1983 and in 1987 to cope with his suicidal depression over the realization that he could be facing similar charges one day. He says he did not reveal to Dr. White the etiplogy of his depression, because he was aware of reporting requirements therapists are bound by in all cases of child abuse. After terminating his therapy with Dr. White, he began to take an eight-year-old choir member, under his wing. The client states he did so because mother was "unreliable and

client states he did so because mother was "unreliable and unpredictable." Robert took into his apartment on those occasions from 1984 through 1989 when his mother was unavailable or did not show up after choir. She was a single, working mother.

According to Mr. Van Handel, request was accommodated from 1987 before going to bed, and this request was accommodated from 1987 through 1989. Over a three-year period, was given help with homework and meals. This was culminated with nightly massages which included "inappropriate touching." In describing this aspect of his history, Robert stated that he has "a lot of terrible fears about the potential damage done." He wept as he described the personal history was outlined in a journal written specifically for his therapist, Mary Simoni, at Pacific Treatment Center in Santa Cruz. He was at the Center from August 1993 until March 1994 when he was arrested and brought to Santa Barbara County to face child sex abuse charges. The arrest interrupted a painful but effective therapeutic program which can document significant gains in controlling his latent pedophilia, he states.

The client reviewed his prior in-patient and out-patient treatment at St. Luke's Institute in Maryland. He received inpatient care from June 3, 1992 until January 15, 1993, and outpatient care from January 16, 1993 until July 15, 1993 at St. Luke's. This resulted after the family of the second (no relation to the second of the second second second second improprieties took place between their son and Father Van Handel at the priest's initiative. Mr. Van Handel states that when he switched to the out-patient program which features art therapy as well as individual and group therapy, he got in touch with his anger at his father. In art therapy sessions, he experienced fears of monsters he was drawing as he visualized his father's face on

the completed drawings. In August 1993, his Provincial made him return to California to enter the Pacific Treatment Program for sex offenders in Santa Cruz. This client states agency records will substantiate that his sexual urges and interests were eradicated as a result of intramuscular injections of Depo Provera used in conjunction with traditional therapies, and that he no longer poses a threat to children.

The following responses to questions posed provide clues to his current state of mind.

- (1) WHAT IS YOUR BIGGEST CONCERN OR FEAR AT THIS TIME? The actual and potential damage I've done to the young men, the Friars, and the Catholic Church. I'm also afraid I won't overcome my feeling of failure and that I'll never be able to function as a priest.
- (2) IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE BOTHERING YOU? I feel that I have nothing to live for--that everything will be horrible from here on in. I feel I'm a big embarrassment to the Friars, the Church, and to my family. I feel an anguish over the people I've harmed. I'm bothered by the fact there's nothing I can do or say to make amends that would make a difference in their lives. I don't understand how the Friars, my family, and so many other people can be so extraordinarily supportive of me.
- (3) WHAT DO YOU VISUALIZE AS THE WORST CASE SCENARIO FACING YOU? Having the District Attorney's office copy and circulate the sexual history I produced for my therapist, Mary Simoni, at the Pacific Treatment Center. It's a confidential medical document for use in therapy. The journal contains the names of three women I've had sex with--and their identities need to be protected. I'm just waiting for the News-Press to get a copy of the journal and identify me as just another of society's monsters, while naming those female partners who are adults. I couldn't handle that.
- (4) WHY SHOULD YOU BE TREATED DIFFERENTLY FROM ANY OTHER SEX OFFENDER? I don't expect to be treated differently. I do know that I am different from others labelled pedophile, because I've had sex with adults of the opposite sex. I also know that the treatment was working. The Depo Provera eliminated my drive and interests. I'm depressed at having lost the benefits of the group therapy program at Santa Cruz. The court has all those records, but I'm prepared for the social price of my actions and fully expect a jail sentence, regardless of the

psychiatrist's report or any recommendation made by you.

WHAT GAINS DID YOU MAKE DURING INTENSIVE TREATMENT AT ST. LUKE'S AND PACIFIC TREATMENT CENTER WHICH LEAD YOU TO BELIEVE YOU COULD BE CONSIDERED FOR IMMEDIATE PAROLE AND RETURN TO OUT-PATIENT TREATMENT?

The main things are the awareness of my anger, the ability to express my feelings including anger, and the fact I'm not aroused physically by an erotic stimulus--like a picture or a recording--as long as I'm on Depo Provera. I was putting the pieces together at the time of my arrest by learning not to lie in order to cover up my fears. I feel very badly that I lied to the staff at St. Lukes's.

(6) WHAT IS THE BEST CASE SCENARIO YOU VISUALIZE IN THE SENTENCING PROCESS?

A full year in jail with lengthy probation and parole, along with a return to mandatory, intensive treatment. I'm fearful of losing contact with my therapist, Mary Simoni, at Pacific Treatment Center if sent to State prison. I'd certainly welcome sessions with you if I'm sentenced to County Jail. The contact does help.

WHAT IS THE HARDEST PART OF BEING BEHIND BARS? $\{7\}$ The painful realization I'm a convicted felon. I wake up numb to my feelings until I start talking to you. I'm in hideous pain here and expect it to get worse. My energy is focused on fighting self-pity, because it's counter-productive. I'm acknowledging real feelings of despair, but I can't let those feelings push me into a state of total helplessness. Whatever happens, happens, and I'll have to learn to develop the strength to deal with it. (Long silence and tears) ...The alternative is suicide.

- (8) WHY SUICIDE? The most difficult part of incarceration is the recurrent, intrusive feelings of remorse and guilt over the actual molestations. When you're not in the therapy situation on a day-to-day basis, it's hard to digest those feelings. (Tears) ...I recognize I've done wrong and harmed people in the past, but there's been nothing since 1989. I understand why people are angry with me, and I accept their right to be angry. What I don't understand is why people are so unforgiving and vindictive.
- (9) ASSUMING YOUR BEST CASE SCENARIO DOES MATERIALIZE, WHAT PLANS, HOPES OR GOALS DO YOU HOPE TO PURSUE AFTER ONE YEAR IN JAIL? All of my work in studying for the priesthood turned out to be

in vain. There is nothing that I aspire to. I would like to return to San Juan Baptista Retreat House and function as a bookkeeper. That way I can resume my therapy at Pacific Treatment Center in Santa Cruz. Their program is more confrontational than the program at St. Luke's. One thing is certain. With the insights I've gained and my status as a convicted felon, I will not put myself in a situation where a temptation to re-offend can occur.

(10) DO YOU FEEL YOU HAVE OTHER ALTERNATIVES IN THE EVENT YOU ARE GRANTED IMMEDIATE PAROLE WITHOUT SERVING ADDITIONAL TIME IN JAIL?

My other option is to stay with the Franciscans and work at the Archive Library in the American Academy of Franciscan History in Berkeley, California. But really, 1'd like to hide in the retreat at San Juan Baptista. (Silence and tears. Client began to tremble.) ... I don't think I can make it outside of the Franciscan order.

(11) WHAT MAKES YOU BELIEVE THAT?

It doesn't take much for me to think about suicide. The idea seems so attractive to the cowardly side of me. I think the thoughts of suicide are attractive because it gives me the feeling of control. I don't do well when I'm not in control; I get really depressed. In jail you're under the control of people doing the job they're paid to do. They're not paid to have concern for or awareness of individual prisoners.

(12) WHY SHOULD ANYONE GIVE CONSIDERATION TO A RECOMMENDATION FOR PAROLE WITH NO ADDITIONAL JAIL TIME? As I said, I haven't committed any offenses since 1989 and have been very committed to the treatment programs at St. Luke's and Santa Cruz. While I appreciate such a recommendation because I know I'm no risk to children now, I have no realistic expectation that the judge would act on such a recommendation. As much as I'm terrified of it, I'm prepared for a State prison sentence.

(13) WHY?

I have real enemies in Santa Barbara--the people I've molested and their families. (Tears)....I felt like an animal when

I would expect the judge to make his decision based on all of the statements made by everyone affected by my actions, and not just by the many statements of support I've received.

As you can see from the foregoing responses, Mr. Van Handel, despite his vulnerability and desperation in the jail setting, maintains his stance of accepting responsibility for his acts. He has an exaggerated negative self-image, stating he cannot accept compliments or positive statements about himself from any source. This client exhibits many of the distinctive characteristics seen in sex offenders. His self-reports and personal history reveal a basic inadequate personality. He is easily discouraged and displays a propensity for wanting to give up or guit because he feels he has nothing to live for. There is evidence of selective perception in his descriptions of recent history, although he gives his accusers the benefit of the doubt and states they "must be right" because they can remember things he cannot. His exaggerated control needs, when thwarted, reinforce his pre-existing feelings of helplessness and depression.

Mr. Van Handel is non-assertive and exhibits pervasive guilt along with his subjective judgment that his life would be unmanageable outside of the Franciscan order. He acknowledges that his peer interactions and interpersonal relations with adults outside of the Franciscan Order have been poor. From childhood, where he lived in a repressive environment, this client displaced his suppressed emotions through fantasy and, eventually, inappropriate sexual acting-out. Deviant arousal patterns and distorted sexual values propelled him obsessively-compulsively to engage in sexual activities with minors under his control from 1975 through 1989. The fourteen year history of acting-out suggests cleverness in concealing his pedophilia while dealing with the community relating to St. Anthony's Seminary and the Santa Barbara Boy's Choir. Thus, Mr. Van Handel's capacity for manipulative behavior should not be underestimated.

Despite these well documented traits, he has abstained from sexual contacts with children during the past five years. Additionally, this client has a very high level of motivation to resume his intensive and effective therapy for the treatment of pedophilia at Pacific Treatment Center in Santa Cruz. This suggests that Robert Van Handel is a better than average candidate for immediate release and parole, despite his anticipation of a lengthy state prison term. If he is released, I believe latent pedophilic tendencies can be controlled on an out-patient basis outlined in the attached treatment protocol.



These is a kind of "absent-mindedness" that shows itself occasionally, as well as a kind of lack of "organization" and planning that will have to be worked on. On the other hand, Bob does show initiative. He is intelligent, and seems to be maturing.

His principal interest has been in the area of working with children. One of his projects has been to organize and direct a boys' choir for the Newman Center. He remains faithful to this project, despite the normal difficulties involved in which work and the built-in disappointments.

His work with the Boys Choir at the Newman Center, demanding as it is, is well worked into his schedule and he shows good sense in making necessary choices.

At present, we feel that there are several areas where Bob is not clear in his own mind as to where he stands; he needs some room and some time to think.

Bates Numbers 655-656 were ordered removed by the trial court.

On March 1, 1994, (the victim), age eighteen, presented himself at the Santa Barbara Police Department to report a 288 PC, CHILD MOLEST, which occurred between the years of 1983 through 1989. He reported that the acts occurred when he was a member of the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir at St. Anthony's Seminary located in the 2300 block of Garden Street. The victim informed officers that the molest acts started occurring when he was eight or nine years of age and ended when he was fourteen, spanning the years 1983 through 1989. He reported that the suspect in the case was the choir director, Robert Van Handel, the defendant in this matter.

The victim indicated he was a 15 member of the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir which was comprised of 16 approximately thirty boys. He noted his father had left the 17 family when he was approximately four years of age and that he 38 viewed the defendant as a father figure and trusted him 19 completely. The victim went on to state that at the time of most 20 of the molest acts, the defendant lived on the St. Anthony's 21 Seminary grounds. The victim also stated that he could not be 22 specific with regard to the dates and times of the acts, but did 23 note that they occurred on a regular basis. For the most part, 24 the molest incidents took place in the defendant's apartment at 25 26 the seminary. In addition to this, there were also some trips 27 that he and other choir members went on at which times molest 28 acts occurred; as well. **OFM VANH 1**

officers that he would stay in the defendant's apartment, in a dwelling known as "the Casa." He informed officers that he would always spend the night on Tuesdays and Sundays. In fact, he noted that there were times on Thursdays, and once in a while on Fridays and Saturdays, that he would also spend the night in the defendant's apartment. The victim reported that on Tuesdays, he attended the Boys' Choir practice in the afternoon at approximately 2:30 p.m. until 4:00 or 4:30 p.m. After that, he had dinner at the seminary and then attended the Men's Choir group at approximately 7:00 or 7:30 p.m., which ended at approximately 9:00 p.m. He then would stay in the defendant's 13 apartment.

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The victim went on to inform

Officers noted that the victim's mother was a chef, working many odd shifts, and hardly ever got 16 to see her son. The victim informed officers that there were 17 times his mother was leaving for work very early in the morning, 18 and there were times she worked extremely late. Consequently, the victim spent an immense amount of time at the seminary, 20 staying with the defendant.

21 When specifically questioned 22 regarding the molest acts, the victim stated that when he did 23 stay at the defendant's apartment, he wore pajamas, and just 24 before bedtime, as he was lying almost asleep on a bed, the 25 defendant would come and start massaging his back or stomach 26 area, depending on which way he (victim) was lying at the time. 27 The defendant would start massaging him on top of his clothing 28 and then eventually would start massaging him underneath his

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pajamas. The defendant then subsequently would start massaging his genital area. The victim indicated he would simply try to go to sleep and ignore what the defendant was doing.

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The victim believed the defendant had his clothes on while he was giving the massages, but did not know if the defendant tried to masturbate while giving the massages. The victim also noted there were no words ever spoken between them during the molestations. The molestations always occurred just before the victim went to sleep at night or during trips or when the victim took a daytime or afternoon nap.

The victim told officers he would get an erection when the defendant would massage his testicles and penis area. He stressed that at no time was there any oral sex involved, and at no time did he (victim) reciprocate in masturbating the defendant. These acts of massaging his genital area occurred until the victim fell asleep, and this would be at times a half hour in duration.

The victim went on to report that although he could not specifically remember dates or times, he did remember the defendant massaging his penis and testicles approximately three nights a week during the timespan from September, 1986, through June, 1987. In the summer of 1987, when he went to England with the Boys' Choir for approximately three weeks, the victim could not recall any acts occurring while he was there. He noted things began to slow down during that time, and the defendant would only massage his testicles and penis approximately one to two nights a week. In September of 1987, when the victim was twelve years old, he started the seventh OFM VANH 1

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grade and recalled usually spending Sunday nights in the defendant's apartment at "the Casa." In the evening, just prior to falling asleep, the defendant would then massage his back, stomach, thighs, penis, and testicles. The victim recalled getting an erection when the defendant massaged his penis and stated it was obvious to the defendant that an erection had taken place.

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During the period of October, 1987,

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through June, 1988, when the victim was twelve years old, the defendant molested him approximately one to two times a week. In the summer of 1988, the molestations tapered off to approximately once a month. When the victim was thirteen years old, he was not seeing much of the defendant and would only spend the night at his residence approximately once per month. However, each time he did spend the night, the defendant would molest him by rubbing his penis and testicles. In December of 1989, when he (victim) was placed in a drug rehabilitation program, the incidents stopped. The victim could not recall any incidents occurring after December, 1989, nor did he spend the night at the defendant's apartment after that.

The victim stated when the 21 molestations first started, he did not know that what the 22 defendant was doing to him was wrong. He looked up to the 23 defendant because he was a priest and also a father figure for 24 him. The victim noted that when the acts occurred, the defendant 25 would not give him alcohol. There was no pornography shown to 26 him during the molestations, and he was never threatened to keep 27 28 silent about the incidents. **OFM VANH 1**

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Additionally, the defendant never took photographs of him in the nude.

During the timespan of the molestations, the defendant rubbed his (victim's) penis and testicles both with his clothes on, on top of his clothes, and under his clothes with skin-to-skin contact.

The victim stated that he was emotionally bothered by the molestations and did not want to see the defendant, who was still a priest, molest any other children. He noted he had not had any contact with the defendant since he 10 (the defendant) was given a going-away party in 1991.

A warrant for the defendant's arrest was subsequently issued by the Santa Barbara Municipal Court. The defendant was thereafter arrested pursuant to this warrant on March 22, 1994, while residing at the St. Francis Retreat Center in San Juan Bautista, in San Benito County, California. The Defendant did not submit a statement to 18 arresting officers. He was then transported to Santa Barbara 19 County Jail where he was booked on a charge of 288(a) PC, LEWD OR 20 LASCIVIOUS ACTS INVOLVING CHILDREN.

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The defendant was interviewed in DEFENDANT'S STATEMENT: person while in custody at the Santa Barbara County Jail on July 20, 1994, and via the closed-circuit CourtVision system on July 22, 1994. The defendant submitted information regarding his social background and noted he has no prior record of arrests. Upon being informed that a copy of his sexual history profile he had produced for a therapist of his at the Pacific Treatment Center had been obtained and reviewed by this officer, the defendant became quite concerned in that it contained very 10 sensitive and embarrassing information about members of the community in Santa Barbara. However, after being informed that 11 12 the document was, in fact, going to be made part of the Probation 13 Report in that it had been submitted as part of the statement made by Detective McGrew of the Santa Barbara Police Department, 15 the defendant agreed to discuss it.

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16 With regard to the time he was at 17 St. Anthony's as a high school student, the defendant was asked 18 about the molestation (1962) noted in his autobiography. He 19 recalled falling ill and reporting to the infirmary where he was 20 allowed to rest. At that time, a seminary priest (Father Martin 21 McKeon) came into the room, put a towel on his (the defendant's) 22 chest, and then started to rub his stomach and chest area. The 23 defendant stated he subsequently obtained an erection when Father 24 McKeon rubbed against his (the defendant's) penis. The defendant 25 remembered being alarmed as to what was happening to him and also 26 recalled being very concerned that he would ejaculate in that he 27 felt it was a wrong thing to do. The defendant was very confused 28 and embarrassed about the situation and decided to put it out of

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his mind. The defendant added, "I have trouble dealing with the idea that I, myself, was molested, but I don't want to switch the blame for what I did to him (Father McKeon)." The defendant added that being molested by a father did not help or contribute to his confusion about sexuality. He noted that it was not until college that he was sexually stimulated by someone other than himself. The defendant admits that, now at the age of fortyseven, the molestation still affects him.

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When questioned regarding his 9 molesting young boys, the defendant stated in his autobiography 10 that his first victim was either a seven- or eight-year-old boy that was in a boys' choir the defendant conducted while attending 12 Graduate Theological Union College in Berkeley, California (1972) 13 or his five-year-old nephew while he was visiting his sister in Oregon. However, the defendant admits that the person he feels 15 he molested the worst was a boy named who was a member of 16 17 the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir. As noted in the defendant's autobiography, he acknowledged doing some "kinky" things to 18 who was approximately nine years of age at the time. For 19 the Probation Report, the defendant stated he realized .20 21 the person he molested the most and that he was much more 22 "obvious and blatant" with what he did to this boy as compared to 23 his other victims. The defendant felt he was "really out of 24 control with and would basically do whatever his 25 imagination would come up with. As noted in the defendant's 26 autobiography, he took numerous photographs of in the nude. 27 He also would photograph him in ragged clothes, making him look 28 like an impoverished boy, and also while in the tower at St.

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Anthony's, which has stark concrete and steel-barred windows, while he posed as a prisoner with few clothes on. The defendant tied up with rope, yet at the same time, also photographed would photograph him in choir robes against a stained glass window.

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With regard to the molestations of the victim in the matter before the Court at this time, the defendant noted that none of the boys in the Santa Barbara Boys' 8 Choir were students at St. Anthony's, but some of the Boys' Choir members subsequently enrolled as students. The defendant could (not recall when he actually met the victim, but did remember him being an "eight-year-old, bright-eyed, spiritual boy with a nice voice." The defendant indicated that the victim's father was 14 never present and that his mother was working two jobs. The victim appeared to him as a very needy boy, which he admits made him "particularly attractive." He then started taking care of 16 the victim, such as helping him with his homework, washing some 18 of his clothes, providing him with food, and letting him stay 19 overnight in his apartment.

The defendant indicated he tried to play the "father substitute" and basically believes that, at the time of the molestations, he felt there were no molestations occurring. The defendant elaborated by noting he had heard of another choir director being charged with child molestation, which very much affected him, and also convinced him not to touch boys in the way he had been doing. However, the defendant acknowledged giving the victim back rubs as a way of comforting him and also tried to be tender. The defendant claims he OFM VANH 1

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sincerely tried to avoid touching the victim's genitals, and to 1 date, does not recall actually doing this. Yet, he believes the 2 victim is telling the truth and that the back rubs were sexually 3 stimulating to him (the defendant). The defendant indicated 4 that, after the massages, he would leave the victim, go to his 5 room, and masturbate to the memories of what he had just done. 6 He added, "I could not say I guarantee I did not touch his 7 genitals. I don't really see it makes a difference; I still did 8 9 abuse him, but I felt at the time if I were not touching his genitals, I wasn't abusing him." 10

11 The defendant went on to state that he never provided any of the boys he molested with alcohol or 12 cigarettes. The defendant noted that 13 subsequently 14 grew out of the choir, and as he started to get older, stopped 15 coming to visit. After the victim was entered into a drug 16 rehabilitation program, the defendant tried to visit him, but was told he was not available. During the time he was involved with 17

18 he was not touching other boys. He also wished to 19 note that there were a lot of boys he never molested and that he 20 never considered what he was doing to all of his victims as 21 harming. However, the defendant wished to point that is how he 22 felt at that time, but now acknowledges that what he did to them 23 was certainly wrong and has impacted their lives greatly.

The defendant described his

25 involvement with women as a way of "feeling or being normal, a 26 way to try to be sexually normal." He noted that he really had no adolescence and was trying to discover things about himself 28 and that he could, in fact, have a relationship with a woman.

However, he spent a considerable amount of time there after his mother signed him up to join the Boys' Choir. He noted she was always working, and his father was no longer in the family. Due to this, he then started spending a considerable amount of time with the defendant, who was the choir director. went on to state that he would usually stay in the defendant's apartment in a dwelling known as "the Casa," which is located on seminary grounds. He pointed out the defendant would always be busy doing work for the seminary or the choir while he was in the apartment with him. Because of this, would then usually play darts or play with the rest of the boys of the seminary. In retrospect, believes that, although he spent a considerable amount of time in the defendant's apartment, the defendant would not actually spend very much time with him in that he was always doing something involving the seminary or the Boys' Choir.

18 With regard to the molestations, indicated the defendant at first started giving him 20 what he viewed as a "regular" back rub so he could fall asleep easier. However, the defendant then started touching his 22 stomach, thighs, legs, and eventually worked up to the point of 23 fondling his genitals. He noted the defendant would usually not 24 say anything to him, and the defendant never undressed or exposed himself. The defendant never masturbated while he was doing the 26 back rubs or fondling.

He pointed out that the defendant would provide him with food, clothing, and even purchased a bike for In addition to this, he would take him out to eat at places him. indicated he enjoyed this very such as Taco Bell. much in that he did not have a father figure in his life, and the defendant seemed to fit this role.

indicated that he would obtain an erection. Although he tried to hide this from the defendant, he noted that the defendant would have to be blind not to see what was going on. He noted that the molestations happened so often that it was like 'taking a shower or putting on my shoes." He stated that it actually got to the point that it seemed like the "normal type of thing to do."

During the molestations;

did not actually feel that anything wrong was going on in that he completely trusted the defendant. He pointed out the defendant would even give him communion during masses, at times when they were camping, or during small gatherings.

1987 22 alcoholic beverages at the age of twelve. He then started 1988 23 smoking marijuana at the age of thirteen. By this time, the 24 defendant was only molesting him three to four times per month. 25 He noted he never went to visit the defendant while under the influence of alcohol or drugs, and the defendant never actually offered him any alcohol other than a sip of his drink once in a 28 while. I guess when I popped into my drugs and alcohol, it would make me think of it 7 (the molestations) as being something else." 8 9 Eventually, on or about January started seeing a therapist. He noted that he 10 1994, first started seeing the therapist two times per week and is now 11 12 attending once per week (since May of 1994). He feels that he is 13 benefitting much from his therapy, but feels that he will most 14 likely need a therapist for the rest of his life. He noted that 15 his entire social life is non-existent, but that he is trying to 16 find new friends. He acknowledges that his trust level has been 17 extremely low and that he has basically destroyed all prior 18 relationships. 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Ability to Pay Fine, Restitution and Probation Fees:

Based on the above, it would seem appropriate to assess the defendant minimum probation report and supervision fees. With regard to restitution, it is notable that the victim has been undergoing therapy and is expected to continue therapy into the foreseeable future. However, it appears that all therapy costs are being paid by the Catholic Church.

Other Relevant Information:

As noted in the defendant's statement, during the past two years, he has spent approximately 21 months in treatment programs as a resident patient of St. Luke's Institute in Maryland and then at the Pacific Treatment Associates in Santa Cruz, California, as part of their behavioral and group therapy for child sex offenders.

As indicated earlier, Detective McGrew submitted a document the defendant prepared for a therapy session, which is 27 pages in length, single-spaced, typewritten. In this document, the defendant mentions several boys he molested throughout his lifetime. The following are excerpts from this document, which is attached in its entirety for the Court's review.

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
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"When first joined the Boys' Choir he was young, seven or eight years old, and very vulnerable because his parents were going through a divorce. He had light brown or blond hair and blue eyes. He also sang quite well. Before long, he was singing solos and coming for extra practices. I knew his mother well, also his sisters and grandmother. The family was comfortable with me and with the care and interest I took in

Once, I was with 1 alone at a borrowed I had decided we were going to do a onebeach cabin. day look at a boy's life in pictures. I had a photo journal from which I got the idea. So, we did a sequence from rising to going to bed, complete with bath and a trip to the beach. I don't remember how Michael reacted to all of this, but he was cooperative. He trusted me. I'm sure for me the exercise was sexually stimulating. I eventually had the film developed in Germany and small prints made, which I would look at from time to time. Finally, I destroyed negatives and prints. But there is more to the story of and me. We used to wrestle, I would tickle him while paying special attention to touching his genitals. One summer he came and spent a month with me in Oregon, where the same type of activity was repeated many times. Always this was done under the cover of some 'legitimate' touching. never seemed to mind, and I wasn't about to stop on my own. He sang some solog -* 1 mass

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I don't remember ever actually touching his above. penis, but the game was still sexually exciting. He seemed to enjoy himself, also. Somehow, I coerced him into posing for nude photographs. We would go into the music room, which locked from the inside in a way that no one could get in. Using a black stage curtain as background, I took various shots of him, either dressed or undressed. The poses were formal and not in themselves erotic, but photographing a naked boy was stimulating for me. I developed the photos myself in the school lab, with varying degrees of success. ĩ remember one picture in particular. In it, ' was naked and standing sideways to the camera with his hands clasped behind his back. He was partially erect, and the contrast of him against the black background was soft with an elusive quality. It was a very good picture that I could show to no one. It was very hard for me to destroy this photo, and I tried to discover a way that I could keep the negative, but I was afraid of getting caught with it, so after some time, I burned both. As grew older, he lost interest in the choir, and I saw him less and less. I am quite sure he is one of those who responded to the call to report me, because my provincial knew about these photos even though I never told him that I photographed don't know if he has accepted the offer of counseling which has been extended to all my victims. I hope he is recovering from the damage I did."

first came to choir when he was too young to join, but his two brothers were in choir, and his mother usually helped in practices with passing out music or bringing cookies. I abused both of his brothers with tickling games where I rubbed against their penises, and I did take a few nude photos of but I was really out of control with I took nude photos of him when he was quite young, perhaps seven years old. Some of these I gave to his mother as I thought they were quite artistic. Over perhaps a four-year period, I took dozens of photos of some nude, many clothed, but I never again gave nude pictures to his mother.

was a very fair boy, with blond hair. Sometimes he was not anxious to come to St. Anthony's to see me, but with some pushing or promise of ice cream, he would usually agree. Once there, he never balked at the photo sessions. I would get him to undress gradually, by taking a picture of him first fully clothed, then without shirt, then without pants, and so on until he was nude. Sometimes we would take these pictures outside, in the foothills of Santa Barbara, but more often somewhere around the seminary. There were many private spots available. We would do other activities together, like go rowing in Santa Barbara harbor, or go

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for a hike, but my main interest was in seeing nude or in tickling, touching, or rubbing him. One game I would play with him, which allowed me to touch him, as well, as to see how long he could lie quietly acting as . though he were asleep. Sometimes we would do this with a 'Walkman' radio over his ears. I would already have made sure he was dressed in loose-fitting shorts with no underwear. With him lying across my lap on a couch, I would pretend I was playing the piano on him, all up and down his body, or I would just lightly tickle him all over, including his genitals. This game could go on for twenty minutes or longer. Once, I rubbed his penis so intensely that he actually reached a form of orgasm, as his penis jerked by itself. This excited me a great deal, and I remember being very sexually excited by was still pretending to be asleep. I never this. again tried to bring him to orgasm, but the memory gave me many re-run experiences while masturbating by myself. I also did some 'kinky' things to Once I rubbed . his whole body with oil so that the photo lights made him look shiny. This was also, of course, an excuse to rub his penis. I took some photos of him as though he were an impoverished Appalachian boy in the depression, he wore a ragged tee shirt. Once, or perhaps more than that, I took him up into our tower which was stark concrete with steel-barred windows, and he posed as a prisoner with few clothes on. I took some photos of him tied up with a big rope. It was as though I felt I could do anything to him that I wanted. In marked contrast, I also photographed him in choir robes against stained glass windows. When was about eleven, one day I was playing the dart game with him. I told him he had to wear these special shorts with no underwear. He said he did not want to. I insisted. He started to cry, and that snapped something in my head. For the first time, I was seeing signs that he really did not Just about then, his father drove up on a like this. motorcycle, and I told him he could get dressed and go That marked the end of my molestations of home. He remained in choir, and afterwards followed his brothers to becoming a boarding student at St. Anthony's, but I did not approach him again."

"There were several other boys with whom I played these sexual games, like darts with sexual tickling, or massage including either directly rubbing their penis or rubbing near it. This was the case with and perhaps brothers, and with who wrote the intervention letter. Once at night, I also gave a 'rubdown,' which included some touching of his penis. He did not really want me to do this, but I kept asking (begging) until he consented. Sometimes, I would take some boys on a special outing, or on vacation

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REDACTED Usually, I took four boys, but perhaps only with me. 1 two. These would include back rubs (read sexual touching) with some of the boys. I gave the same type 2 of treatment, that is, 'back rubs,' which included some rubbing of the genitals to a few boys who were students 3 at St. Anthony's. I clearly remember this with two boys, both of whom had been in the Boys' Choir. At 4 least one more young man has accused me of molesting him in this way, but I don't remember doing this, although I 5 don't think he is lying, and clearly I am capable of doing it. I don't think I continued this activity in Ġ the dormitories for a long time. The official report on this behavior calls it 'assaults in the dormitory.'" 7 8 "I arranged for one of the choir boys from Santa Barbara 9 to spend the month of December with me while attending school in England. No one ever said that they thought 10 this an odd thing to do, but in hindsight, Sister Monica said she was surprised by my request. I knew I would 11 enjoy my stay much more if I had one of the boys to share the experience with. came over, and 12 we did have a great time. I like to have a child to got along well with the take care of, and 13 English boys and with the convent sisters. He became the darling of the older girls who often invited him to 14 their common room for hot cocoa in the evening. I did not molest that is, I never touched his 15 genitals. He was a bright boy with a sweet singing voice who needed help. I put together a fund to 22 pay for a better school for him, and often helped him with his homework, took him to his therapist, etc. He 23 had his own room in my apartment and often stayed the 24 night. Many times I gave him back rubs and body rubs, but I avoided his genital area. I was determined not to

molest him. Now, I realize that I put myself in some very dangerous circumstances, but I never touched his genitals. After I went on sabbatical, he spent less time with me, but we remained friends (almost a fatherson relationship actually) until he grew out of choir.

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Contact was made with Deputy ٦ COLLATERAL INFORMATION: 2 He noted that by the defendant's own District Attorney Ron Zonen. 3 admission, he has been molesting children for years, and his ·4 actions are a very serious breach of trust. He also noted that the offense involved planning and sophistication; he abused his 5 position of trust; and his victim was particularly vulnerable. 6 7 Additionally, Mr. Zonen pointed out that the defendant has multiple victims to his name. Despite the fact that the defendant 8 g acknowledges culpability and has no prior record, Mr. Zonen 10 believes that it would be unconscionable to sentence the defendant 11 for anything less than eight years. He believes that this matter 12 is the worst breach of trust and confidence in that it involves a 13 priest and a penitent. He believes the defendant should be 14 sentenced to state prison for the maximum time, and if this 15 happens, he will be out in four years, which Mr. Zonen equates to 16 approximately four to six months for each child he molested. 17 Contact was made with defense 18 attorney Robert Sanger. It would be reasonable to grant probation."

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In addition to the above, Mr. Sanger provided this officer with a copy of a "defendant's sentencing statement" he filed with the Court.

was interviewed while in the offices of the Santa Barbara County

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Probation Department. In addition to providing background 1 2 information on the defendant, as well as details of the offense, Detective McGrew indicated he would be submitting a written 3 statement for this report. Said statement was subsequently 4 received, along with several documents that were recovered when a 5 search warrant was executed at the defendant's residence, which 61 includes a diary prepared by the defendant (January, 1993, to 7 8 March, 1994), and an autobiography of the defendant's sexual life. Detective McGrew also supplied this officer with a copy of the 9 10 Independent Board of Inquiry report regarding St. Anthony's ·]] Seminary, dated November, 1993: All these documents have been 12 read and considered in their entirety and are attached for the Court's review and consideration. 13 14 On June 25, 1994, Dr. Michael 15 Stulberg conducted a psychiatric evaluation of the defendant 16 relative to the question of the advisability of a grant of

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"I am writing this letter as psychotherapist to and and victims and parents of victims of Robert Van Handel's sexual predation. All have signed releases allowing me to disclose confidential information.

started seeing me twice a week in December 1993. He was in the process of giving up drugs and alcohol after six years of addiction (since age 12). He revealed that he realized he had been abused by Robert when he began to stop drinking and using. He had lived on the streets, spent time in juvenile detention and rehabilitation. He was shaken, non-trusting and terrified. As therapy progressed and more feelings surfaced (combined with stress of hearings, etc.), has had difficulty staying clean and sober. So far, the use has been fairly intermittent. He completed a semester at SBCC to make up for high school he never finished. He was emotionally unable to continue this summer and dropped out. is on a roller coaster of feelings and confusions resulting in the drug use, inability to stay in school and having unprotected sex with female drug users. In addition, he is blindly trusting of others and has little trust in his ability to judge people. This makes him potential prey to any male authority figure which I believe is a direct result of his abuse. His rage is turned inward and gets acted out in dangerous activities. We continue to address these issues in therapy as well as the other ordinary and expected symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder.

"The full scope of damage to is yet to be revealed. Although very bright and loving, he has not been able to finish high school, hold down a job, stay straight and sober or maintain even marginally healthy friendships. He has a long, painful struggle ahead of him.

arrived enraged for his therapy session one day having just seen Van Handel on TV apologizing to his victim He screamed, 'What about 1. apologizing to me?' / 's abuse did not fall within the criminal statute.) Van Handel took countless nude photos of as well as acting out the usual father' Robert sexual abuse. agonized that he may have traded or sold them. He continues to have nightmares about Van Handel.

"In his first session with me, who is gay, speculated in a short undefended moment that if this (the abuse) had not happened, perhaps he would have a wife and family now. He quickly recovered his composure and strongly stated his beliefs in the genetics of homosexuality.

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Although factors in aggravation do

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not greatly outnumber those in mitigation, it is believed the aggravating factors deal directly with the type of perpetual crime committed against the victim and the social and moral conscience of the community. The selected mitigating factors either basically reflect the defendant's behavior prior to or after the molestations. Therefore, it is believed the upper term would be most appropriate.

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Selected Term: 8 years

11 EVALUATION: Before the Court stands a defendant 12 who has submitted a plea to the charge of COMMITTING LEWD ACTS 13 UPON A CHILD who, when first molested, was but nine years of age. 14 The defendant continuously molested the victim for approximately 15 three years and only stopped after the victim was committed to a 16 drug rehabilitation program.

17 In an attempt to at least begin 18 understanding how a person could involve himself in such an 19 incredibly adulterated life of child sexual molestations, one may 20 take into consideration that the defendant, himself, was a victim 21 of same. As noted earlier, in 1962, when the defendant was a 22 student at St. Anthony's, and during a time he was sick in bed, a 23 priest molested him by rubbing his stomach, chest, and penis. It 24 appears this event in the defendant's young life had a 25 significant impact on him and, to this very day, still affects 26 It is not known if this molestation, combined with the him. 27 defendant's rather emotionally deprived childhood, channelled him 28 toward the deviant sexual acts he committed on the victim;

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however, the similarities are remarkable.

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It is of important significance to note the defendant started molesting young boys as early as 1972. In fact, his first victim may have been when he orally copulated his five-year-old nephew. Since 1975, it would seem safe to speculate that not a year, or for that matter a month, went by that the defendant did not involve himself in some form of sexual gratification by molesting members of the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir. As the defendant noted in his sexual autobiography,

"Early in the choir's history, I began involving parents in planning, fund raising, etc., but it was clearly my choir, and the fulfillment of one my fondest dreams. Now I understand that it was also a constant supply of attractive little boys."

It is very clear the defendant desecrated his position of trust as not only the choir director, but as a priest and Rector of St. Anthony's Seminary in order to fulfill his predatory desires. As noted in the numerous letters submitted by concerned members of the community, the defendant was very much loved and respected by all. Yet, as pointed out by his therapist, the defendant's fourteen-year history of child molestation "suggests cleverness in concealing his pedophilia while dealing with the community relating to St. Anthony's Seminary and the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir." It certainly seems the defendant manipulated the victim's mother into believing her son would be in good hands, yet he seemed to be only interested in continuing with his usual pattern of luring unsuspecting victims into his world of sexual perversion.

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However, it is important to note that it should in no means be 1 interpreted as a voluntary realization of wrongdoing on the 2 3 defendant's part. As it turns out, it seems the defendant was 4 directed by his provincial to enter a psychiatric program in 5 Maryland that has been specifically established by the Catholic Church for priests exhibiting behavior such as the defendant's. 6 7 It is to his credit that he successfully completed that program 8 and attended yet a second program after his return to California. .9 It must also be remembered, however, that although he may have been able to recognize the wrongfulness and illegality of his 10 11 actions, it took an arrest warrant and police officers to physically place the defendant into custody and oblige him to 12 13 appear before the Court and admit his violations of state law. 14 Upon considering the defendant's

eligibility for probation, and as indicated in defense counsel's sentencing statement filed with the Court, there is little doubt he statutorily qualifies for such a consideration. It is notable that in the 288.1 PC report, the evaluating psychiatrist supports a recommendation for probation; the defendant states a willingness to comply with all probation terms and conditions; and he has also indicated remorse for his victim.

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However, simply because the defendant is statutorily eligible for probation, this is not viewed as sufficient grounds to grant it. As illustrated within the preceding pages of this report, the defendant has not only emotionally and psychologically traumatized the victim and his mother, but also literally devastated numerous other children and their families, for which he will not have to face any charges.

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In essence, one could basically state he "got away with it." Additionally, the question of deterrence of others is perhaps the focal point of this entire criminal matter. For these reasons, it is believed the defendant should, indeed, be punished with the maximum time allowed by law.

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The selection of the upper term of 6 eight years for a single Count of 288(a) PC is not only 7 8 justified, but could arguably be viewed as lenient and a stroke 9 of luck for the defendant. It seems that had the victim not completely fallen to his drug addiction and been subsequently 10 institutionalized, the defendant would most likely have continued 11 molesting him through at least the latter part of 1989. Had this 12 occurred, he would clearly be in violation of the then-newly 13 14 instated 288.5 Penal Code Section, CONTINUOUS SEXUAL ABUSE OF A 15 CHILD, which carries a maximum term of sixteen years.

In light of what has been presented -

17 within the contents of this report, it is not believed the defendant should be afforded the privilege of probation 18 supervision and should, instead, be sentenced to state prison 19 20 with the hope that such a disposition will not only serve to 21 significantly punish the defendant, but also send a clear message 22 to others involved in similar criminal acts that their behavior 23 will not be tolerated. It can only be hoped that upon his 24 release from state prison, the Catholic Church will not alienate 25 itself from the defendant and will continue to provide him with 26 the same therapy and support that it so vigorously pursued prior 27 to his arrest and conviction. To this end, the following 28 recommendation is respectfully submitted.

I was born in April of 1947 in Georgetown, British Guiana (now called Guyana), on the north east coast of South America. My father was an American of Dutch descent whose home was in Wisconsin. He was an officer in the army air corps, later the Air Force. He was the eldest of a large family, and had sad memories of his childhood in the depression. He could be charming and smooth, and I think may have been a bit of a womanizer.

My mother was born in British Guiana. Her family was colonial British. I think one of my great uncles had been governor of the colony. Her family was also large but she was not the eldest. She seems to have had a very happy childhood, as she often would entertain my two sisters and me with tales of long holidays in Tobago and Trinidad, as well as stories of formal parties at their home in Georgetown. She grew up near the sea in a nearly perfect climate. Servants did the cleaning and cooking, mirses took care of the children. My mother did not know her way around a kitchen until she was forced to produce meals after becoming married. My father used to say he taught mom to cook.

My parents met under bizarre conditions, my father having been pulled off a military transport bound for the war in North Africa. At a dance they met and my dad, splendid in military uniform, announced that first night that he would marry my mother. She found him to be a very forward, American. In fact they were married in Wisconsin in 1943 and my mother became pregnant almost immediately. My sister Sandra was born in April 1944, and Christine a year and a day later. I have been told that my mother adapted very poorly to life in Wisconsin with its fierce winters. They did not have much money and my mother would have periods of depression. When she was pregnant with me her doctor told my dad, "If you want your wife to live long enough to raise the children, take her back to her home." So I was the third child born in April. I had a normal birth and was taken care of by the family mirse. Before I was two years old we moved back to Wisconsin.

My earliest memory, and I am not sure this ever really happened, is of a doctor and my father examining my penis to see if I should be circumcised, as this was not "automatic" in British hospitals. My sisters were near the door and later told me that people walking by could see me. Did this ever happen? I don't know. Anyway the decision was not to circumcise which made me feel and look different from American boys. As I grow up I would avoid situations where I would have to change in front of others. Early in life my genitals were a source of shame to me.

We lived in many different places when I was small, and consequently my closest friends were my sisters. Before I was seven we lived in British Guiana, Wisconsin, Buffalo New York, Atlanta Georgia, and Van Nuys, California. Part of this time my father was away in Germany, and I think, Japan. I have very few memories of these years. I don't know what effect my father's absence had on me, but I was much closer to my mother and sisters.

I have two important memories from when I was six or seven years old. One was quite traumatic. We were living in the San Fernando Valley, and my dad was working at Edward's Air Force Base in the desert. He would come home to the apartment on weekends. On one of these occasions my mother and he must have had a fight. Our family was one in which there was a minimum of demonstrable emotion. We did not hug, or say endearing things to each other. Never were voices raised. We children were expected to be well behaved and quiet. No one ever yelled. At times we were spanked, but there was never a big scene. I think my mother has always been rather passive toward my dad, and she was conscious in those early years of her complete dependence on him. At any rate, there must have been some scene, and my dad came to me and announced that he no longer loved my mother, and instead was going to live in Germany with a woman he loved there. (I think he had an affair while he was overseas.) I came completely unglued. I became frantic and begged him not to leave us. I think all my fears of abandonment focussed on this moment. Years later my mother said she never understood why he had said that to me, such a small boy. She knew I would never forget it. As it turned out my dad stayed, but 1 am sure in the back of my mind I always feared abandonment.

The other memories I have are childhood sexuality memories of playing doctor with a girl named Marsha, of teasing my sisters about their boyfriends, and such. I have a vivid memory of getting in trouble for pulling down the pants of a smaller boy who lived in our apartment complex. I was with two other boys when we did this, and it may have been my idea. We did get caught by the small boy's mother and I remember being terrified that I was going to be punished. As it turned out my mother just told me not to do it again.

After living two more places in the los Angeles area, and going to two more schools, we moved to a nice house in Orange County near Knott's Berry Farm and Disneyland. There used to be oranges there in those days. I was ten years old. My brother Peter had been born the previous year, and another brother, David, was born when I was eleven. So we almost had two families: the one in which I grew up with my two sisters, and a decade later one with two small boys. We all went to Catholic schools...my father is a great believer in quality education and he felt the muns were the best available. We were told that if we got in trouble at school we could expect double that when we got home. I had a few friends, and I became an alter boy. I remember one frantic night when I was in training and the priest in charge told :-+

that I could not be an altar boy because my Latin promunciation was so bad. I went home sobbing and quite sure my father would be angry and disappointed. I have a memory of him sitting at my bedside and comforting me. He said he would get me a tutor. I remember being surprised that I was not in trouble, and I feel that my father empathized with his frightened son. I don't have many memories like that.

We were a proud Catholic family, and my father would put us on parade whenever possible. We would march down the front aisle on Sundays and sit conspicuously in a front pew. My dad became president of the Holy Name Society. We prayed the rosary as a family. We never watched television during the week, and on weekends we could only watch what my dad marked in the TV Guide. All homework had to be checked by him before being handed in to the nuns. During the summer we were required to bring home schoolbooks and dad would assign work daily. There was no doubt who ruled our lives. None of us could envision reballion. My dad drank at the time, and eventually developed into an alcoholic; but I don't remember abuse of liquor. I do remember my dad's unpredictable and awful temper. Once my sister Christine went to a skating rink with a friend. Christine wore a skating skirt which my father had forbidden as being prurient. The other girls parent was to have picked them up, but my father did instead. He said nothing to Christine on the way home, but once in the house he exploded as he had never before. He ripped the skirt from my sister and tore it to shreds. He was in a rage. My mother tried to stop him and then he turned on her. She locked herself in the bathroom but my dad kicked a hole in the door. All of us children were terrified and crying. It was one of the worst nights of my life. I don't remember how it ended, but the next day it was as if nothing had happened. A full-length mirror was bought and placed over the wrecked door. Everyone tip-toed around, but I don't think the incident was ever mentioned. We still lived in terror of another explosion. I described it as always having to walk on eggs so as not to upset my father. My mother claims it was like living next to a live volcano.

When I was thirteen I was emptying the garbage when I discovered a used Kotex. I hadn't a clue what it was so I carried it back into the house and showed it to one of my sisters. I said, "Look, some one's been bleeding!" My sister about died of embarrassment and I was rushed out of the room without explanation. What great secret had I uncovered? A few days later my father sat me down and together we began to read through a sex education book which had been recommended by the priests. They could not have chosen a worse source, because it was very anti-sex, and I believed every word. The pope would not have laid out a morconservative approach had he personally given the instruction. I remember verbatim one section when the book dealt with wet dreams. These were events that were

unavoidable but nevertheless to be resisted. Consider the pleasure one might realize to be poison to the scul. Wet dreams were like poison candy, it tasted sweet, but would kill the immortal scul. Any slip in a stalwart resolve to fight against the pleasure should be confessed immediately. Masturbation was unspeakably evil. I swallowed the instruction hook, line, and sinker. I would resist sexual pleasure forever. Every night I prayed that I would be spared a wet dream for fear I would fail to resist. I wanted to remain pre-pubescent. I didn't want to grow up into the confusing world of adolescence. When I began to grow pubic hair I secretly used an electric shaver to remove it. I was terribly ashamed. I prayed that my penis would remain small like a boy's. I thought men's genitals were ugly. I did whatever I could to resist the inevitable arrival of puberty.

Fitting well into this fear of sex, women, men, and my father, was the idea of going off to the seminary to be a priest. I had started to think about this years before, and I don't remember if the idea was mine or my father's. He certainly encouraged it, and probably would not have accepted any other profession from me. I was glad to be going away from home, and some of my friends from eighth grade ware going to St. Anthony's in Santa Barbara also. I remember being disappointed when my father would not let me go to my graduation dance with my school friends. He said he didn't think the fathers at the seminary would approve of dancing with girls and such. I never protested, but did as I was told. At the age of fourteen I was off to boarding school.

St. Anthony's was a small school of 230 students housed in large stone buildings behind Mission Santa Barbara. Most of the students were from middle class families and all arrived with hope of becoming priests and Franciscans. The dormitories were really barracks. There was very little privacy, which was difficult for me at first. This minor seminary functioned as both a pre-training program for priests and as a filter mechanism for straining out those who were not suitable. Or at least that's how it worked on paper. As a result the semior class had about thirty members, while there were one hundred minth graders.

I was not terribly homesick, and I adapted quickly to life at the seminary The routine drove some out. I thrived. I loved the comraderie, the instant allegiance to a group, the encouraged competition between classes. I was bullied by some of the older boys. but not to any serious degree. I was 5' 1" tall and weighed -102 pounds. I had never won a fight. The school prided itself on its monastic order and discipline. The chapel was beautiful with high vaulted ceiling, deeply shaded stained glass, and magnificent pipe organ. I came to love the services and mourned over the fact that I was not chosen for the choir. For three years I tried to join, and was only accepted as a senior. This experience affected the way I constructed choirs many years later. We played sports daily, and the school was divided into teams with varying divisions so that one was playing those of equal ability, or shall I say, inability. I learned to play football and baseball well, and I played handball at any available moment. Basketball was more difficult for me. St. Anthony's was very demanding academically. Languages were emphasized Latin, Spanish, and Greek were required Italian and German were electives, but one had to take an elective. Social studies. the arts, English, natural science, religion, were considered important: Mathematics were not well taught. Discipling yas enforced through the ranks, and many older students abused their privilege. but basically the school ran smoothly. It was a MICROCOSM. and the outside world had little to do with our lives. thrived was never happen.

Sex had very little to do with anything else in my life at that time. I knew of no liaisons among the students; or between the all male faculty and students. I never masturbated, and I often wondered what other boys confessed so often -- there was always a line at the confessional box before the 6:15 am Mass. I had reached puberty by the time I was a sophomore, and I suppose I had some wet dreams, but I was still afraid of any sexual thought or act. I remember lying in my bed and tickling myself -- not touching my genitals -- because the stimulation felt good. Actually I remember my first wet dream, during the summer after my freshman year. I recall fighting against any enjoyment and compulsively trying to mutter some holy words so I would not to 50. It was a real ordeal

I wished I could fantasize about girls but I was arraid to do so. Ι lived a very pure life. When I was a junior we had a sex education course, which included basic facts and much morality. I was arraid to ask questions and admired those who were courageous enough to raise their hands Once someone asked what exactly did "fuck" mean? Their was dead silence in the room. That word was never heard at the school. The priest explained that it was a crude way of denoting sexual intercourse. I was grateful for the knowledge, as I hadn't a clue what it meant.

Bradually many of my friends left the school. They either failed the academic course, did not seem to have the correct attitudes, were disobedient in various small ways, or were simply judged "not to have a vocation". Some left on their own. At Christmas of my sophomore year, five boys were summarily expelled after the school's annual Christmas concert. Their crime: talking with some girls after the concert. No contact with the opposite sex was allowed.

In 1965 I graduated from the high school and went directly into the major seminary college in San Luis Rey, forty miles above San Diego. Again the school was a closed system, capable of functioning quite independently of the rest of the world. Academics were stressed, sports were not as important as in high school. Some men joined our class who had not been with us at the minor seminary. These were considered "delayed vocations" and were somewhat suspect from the start. For those of us who had been together before these new 🐇 students arrived with a refreshing attitude that things could be done differently. This was the day of Peter, Paul and Mary, The Mamas and the Papas, and Bob Dylan We would sit out near the orchard after supper and sing protest songs. It was at one of these sessions that some quys started talking about masturbation. I don't remember why the topic arose or what was said. What I did realize vas that none of my classmates considered it wrong, and that I was the only one in the group who did not do it. We had been educated in a fairly liberal spirit, and not only did my classmates reject the categorization of sin into venial and mortal, but many of them questioned the church's entire approach to sin, guilt, sexual ethics, and many other questions. Further, the faculty had recently been on "retreat" with Carl Rogers who had introduced them to a whole new way of relating. There were encounter groups started and talk of "getting out our feelings". Sometimes days of recollection would end with the groups holding hands and swaying to Indian chants by candle-light. I was frightened of much of this, and tried to avoid "touchy-feely" sessions. But the atmosphere was away from judgment and toward embracing, accepting, and sharing I accepted most of the new theology in the church, and was considered a radical by my family, but I was never confortable with some of the physical byproducts of this new renalesance

Autobiography: an insert

There is one event which I forgot to include from my high school years. I have never been able to assess its significance but I have downplayed its importance in my development. I don't remember thinking it too important at the time, and I am reluctant to give it too much power now. In fact, I don't feel particularly comfortable bringing it up at all.

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One night when I was in boarding school I was sleeping alone in the school infirmary because I was running a fever. I must have been a sophomore or a junior. I woke up in the night to find a priest sitting on my bed and ready to take my temperature, which he did. Then he took off the covers, lifted my pajama tops and lowered the bottoms. I tried to stop this, but he gently moved my hand out of the way. Then he placed a folded towel on my chest and began to rub my stomach and chest. I became erect from the stimulation and his hand did rub against my penis several times. I remember feeling some distress at this because I did not know how much of this it might take to cause ejaculation. Before this did happen he stopped, covered me up, and left. The whole thing losted, I suppose, about ten minutes. The next morning he asked me if I had been awake when he came in. When I said "yes" he said that he was trying to lower my temperature by making me perspire. I thought all this was a bit odd, but I never told onyone about it and pretty soon it faded from my memory while I don't think it is of crucial importance in my life, it is curious that this is nearly the exact activity ! would perform len to fifteen years later.

I decided I would masturbate (I think we said "jack off"), but I wasn't sure what to do. I knew I was supposed to rub my penis, but how and for how long? I went to my room. locked the door, spread a towel on the bed, and lay on my stomach rocking back and forth. I suppose I fantasized about a naked woman, and after what I thought was a very long time, suddenly it worked! I was very impressed and decided I had a lot of time to make up. I did not feel guilty at all. I don't remember how often I masturbated after that, but probably several times a week. I don't think I ever confessed it as a sin, or ever told anyone about it. It was the beginning of a secret life

San Luis Rey was adjacent to Camp Pendleton Marine Base, and the local town had a number of sex shops. I remember the first time I looked into the door of one. and saw row after row of magazines of naked women. I couldn't believe it. I walked out dazzled. Later I actually bought one and kept it between the mattresses in my room. That helped masturbation fantasies. I also read some "dirty nevels". Probably it was here that I read my first story involving women and small boys. That image was very erotic for me, and eventually I read a lot of these books about women having sex with minors. I also bought some porno magazines of naked children. I asked my best friend once if he saw anything "special" in pictures of children. He said. "No. not at all." I began to realize that I was different. Sometimes I worried about this, but I thought that as long as it was just fantasy, there was no reason to panic. I knew that most people could dream about things they would never actually do.

A few times during the summers of my college years I associated with some young women who were family friends. Once I took a girl to dinner and a movie. We were definitely not lovers or anything like that, but had been friends for years. When I graduated from college and petitioned to continue in the Pranciscan program, one of the examiners asked if I had ever dated. They didn't want me to go on if I had no experience of any alternatives. I told them I had dated a few times, and that I was fully aware of what I was doing I was passed on to the next step.

That summer I worked at Children's Farm Home in Corvallis. Oregon. I had some experience teaching children religion in classes at Camp Pendleton, and I found I was very successful and happy doing this. In the back of my mind I wanted to be a child psychologist, or social worker, or teacher. I Oregon I was on a team taking care of older adolescents. This was difficult both because I didn't really like these boys, and because I was only a few years older than they I petitioned to work with the 12 and 13 year olds, but it was denied. I did enjoy something of a friendship with a college Millyroman named hora Saleen from Sweethoke, Bregon We Would go

Novitiate proved rather boring, so I booked for something else to do. I applied for a job at a local Catholic children's hose which had once been an orphanage and now was a boatding and day school for "dependent children", many of thom had been assigned there for various reasons by the dourts. 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After one year of this I took leave of Sacramento and moved to Berkeley There I was enrolled in the Franciscan School of Theology and became a member of the Graduate Theological Union. While the Union had existed for some years, it was only recently that Catholic students and faculty had begin to participate. This was truly an ecumenical educational experience. For the first time I really became interested in academics. I began working for an N.A. degree in English church history. There was a lot of freedom given us students and I thoroughly enjoyed designing my own program, both in studies and in life For the first time I was not carefully monitored. I flourished. A colleague of mine, another franciscan, was in charge of mutic at the Catholic college Newman Center. This also functioned as an area parish. Knowing that I was interested in boys choirs and music, he asked me to think about starting a boys

choir at Newman. I did so, I recruited and trained the choir while making many friends with the boys' parents and siblings. I worked very hard and the choir met with a measure or success. I was quite happy. I was invited out often by people connected to the choir. As slways, people seemed to trust me implicitly.

What was going on sexually at this time? I was still masturbating, and from time to time I would purchase some pornographic novel or magazine. This was a very free time in Berkeley -- the early 70's. It would not be uncommon to see children take off their clothes and paddle around one of the campus fountains. This was of great interest to me, and sometimes I would photograph them with my telephoto lens. I also found in one of the full service book stores on Telegraph, some photography essays which centered on boys. Some of these were very acceptable, some less so, but from these books that I purchased the idea grew of taking my own photos of boys. In fact I did so on two occasions. once with · and once with My relationship with is the more significant of the two.

first joined boys choir he was young, seven or eight When years old, and very vulnerable because his parents were going through a divorce. He had light brown or blonde hair and blue eyes. He also sang quite well. Before long he was singing solos and. coming for extra practices. I knew his mother well, also his sisters and grandmother. The family was comfortable with me and with the care and interest I took in 1. Once I was with

alone at a borrowed beach cabin. I had decided we were going to do a one day look at a boys life in pictures. I had a photo journal from which I got the idea. So we did a sequence from rising to going to bed complete with bath and a trip to the beach. I don't remember how reacted to all or this, but he was cooperative. He trusted me. I'm sure for me the exercise was sexually stimulating. I eventually had the film developed in Germany and small prints made. which I would look at from time to time. Finally I destroyed negatives and prints. But there is more to the story of and me. We used to wrestle, and I would tickle him, while paying special attention to touching his genitals One summer he came and spent a month with me in Oregon, where the same type of activity was repeated many times. Always this was done under the cover of some "legitimate" touching. never seemed to mind, and I wasn't about to stop on my own. He sang some solos at a Mass following my ordination. and I have been in touch with bis mother for years. When my provincial requested names of those I have abused, I gave him along with a recent address. Today is in therapy trying to recover from my molesting him.

About this same time. or possibly before, I molested my little. in Oregon: I was staying at my 's home, and while she CTE

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was at work I would babysit I also took some nude photographs of him when he was very small, as he wandered about half naked. I also posed some photos of him pretending to be changed by his sister. But this was not the worst. One night after Christmas I was visiting my . I think it wight have been New Tear's Eve. Certainly we had been drinking, although I was not drunk. The children were still awake and we were watching television when I realized my had gone to bed in her room which was at a distance from the children's rooms. At any rate, I to go to bed and I took told to his room, helped him with pajamas, and put him in bed. I was rubbing his back and then his chest, while touching his penis: It became crect, but I was sure he was asleep Wondering what it would feel like, I put his penis in my mouth for perhaps five seconds. I remember thinking it was similar to sucking my thumb. A little shaken by this . impulsive act I went to bed. The next morning and I vere watching cartoons. He asked he what I was doing to him last night. A wave of panic came over me as I realized he had not been asleep and knew exactly what had happened. I told him I was just playing a game, and not to worry about it, it was nothing. For the next several years. I was worried he would bring it up some night at the dinner table. I don't know if he ever told my about that night. Ho one has ever spoken to me about it.

During these years, the early 70's, I made one attempt to deal with my disturbing thoughts and actions. I tried to tell a Franciscan counsellor about it on two occasions. I always used such a roundabout presentation that at neither time did he discover what I was talking about. I would hint, he would stab, and we missed each other entirely. Once I said that I was worried about the attraction boys were to me. He said he knew what I meant, that he would like to spend more of his time visiting the elderly, but he still had to leave enough time for his academic work. How was my master's thesis coming, etc.?

In 1972 I completed a master's degree in theology, and the next year I was ordained a deacon. Soon after I received permission to spend a year in England and Germany working as a research assistant to a lay professor from Cal Berkeley. I was very good friends with his family, and I would also help take care of the four boys and a girl so that the parents could escape on occasion and travel without the family. I never abused any of the children, and I don't remember being tempted to do so. although there would have been ample opportunity. I loved the time in Europe, and specialized in learning the intricacies of the English school system. For a time I inved in Orford, and then in Cambridge where I soaked up the culture of the English cathedral and collegiate choir. I resolved to return whenever I got the chance. I do camember spending some time in a sorno shop in Ansterdan, which had examples of every kind of sex you ten imagine, but I bought nothing there. I did buy the German edition of a large sex education book which later appeared in this country under the name Snow Mei It sold here in Dalton Book Stores and featured naked children. I also bought a French sex education book with several photos of a family au natural. I kept these hidden from the family with which I was staving. I also investigated the possibility of studying English history at one of the universities, but that never worked out:

When I returned to California I served as a deacon in our church in Phoenix, and then in May of 1975 I was ordained a priest in the new St. Mary's Cathedral in San Prancisco. Here was the focal point of fourteen years of study and training. My family proudly posed with me for photographs. My parents were beaming. My mother's parish priest use to say to her, "You are very blessed -- the mother of a priset." My sisters had always doubted that I was doing the right thing with my life, but on that day and the following when I said Mass for the first time at the parish church everyone joined in the celebration. As usual I was having trouble "staying in the moment, is I was planning the next step. I had been accepted in the elementary teacher education program at Cal Berkeley, and I was hoping to teach children. The provincial met with me and I explained what my plans were His were different St. Anthony's Seminary in Santa Barbara was desperate for a teacher, and he wanted as to go there. The school had changed radically after I had graduated ten years before, and I did not like its new policies. teld the provincial I didn't want to go there, and after an emploratory visit, I was convinced that I was right. I argued with the provincial, who remanded me of my wow of obedience. A few weeks later, during the summer vacation. I moved down to Santa Barbara, sagry, resentful and hurt.

I used to help out on Sundays by saying Mass at the Old Mission. The ushars and lectors referred to me as "the rookie". At times I was the only one resident at the school, a large four-story stone

building connected with dormitories, classrooms, cavernous halls, and dark passages. The grounds cover sixteen acres. One night a crazy man climbed in my third-story bedroom window and said he was the son of god. I was lonely, confused, inexperienced, and angry

The real mightmary becan when the faculty and students arrived in late August. Gone was the clean-cut, middle class student body of wy schoolboy years. True to the Franciscan ideal, the school had begun to cater to the poor, the disadvantaged, those who badly needed a good education to survive. It was a noble cause, and among these students were some very fine young men, some of whom became Franciscene, but the experience was very different from the early sixties Sirifriends were tolerated, and after some time were even encouraged. In many ways the curriculum was now up to date and more practical, but the classics had been dropped. Latin and Greek were no Longer offered, and so on. I was "supposed to replace two people who had left, and no experienced faculty member wanted to increase his teaching load, so as new man on the team I was given the courses that had been taught by two men. I had never been in a classroom before as a teacher, but I was given a heavy work load. That first year I taught Frosh social studies, Sophomore history (1 sem.), and religion. upper division art/ausic appreciation, and Senior psychology (1 sex.). Then the choir director guit just before the school's annual concert. so I took over that also. I was dean and chaplain for the sophomore class, and also took my turn at supervising students in the dining room, study hall, dormitory, and Soon I came to hate most teenagers. They were weekend free times loud, ill-mannered, and always in trouble. In the first few months of fall I decided to do something I yould enjoy and that I could control. I founded the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, and recruited boys from area churches and schools. More and more I spent my free time (such as it was) working on the choir and separating myself from my feliow Franciscans. The school administration was suspicious and jealous of the boys choir from the start. I became more secretive and isolated. I had lost my place at Cal, but I was teaching small boys anyway, and I had complete control of the organization. Early in the choir's history I began involving parents in planning, fundraising, etc., but it was clearly my choir, and the fulfillment of one of my fondest dreams. Now I understand that it was also a constant supply of attractive little boys.

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I don't remember who was the first boy with whom I acted inappropriately in Santa Barbara, but I do remember several different boys all of whom I associated with in the first or second year. The choir only rehearsed once a week in those early days, so if a special song was to be worked on, it had to be outside of the normal oractice time. As a result there were any number of times when I would have arranged to be alone with a boy Often I would plan not only to rehearse music with a particular boy, but also would want to play certain games with him, which were sexually charged experiences for me. I was in my late twenties: and these boys were eight to eleven years old. Parents always seemed supportive and generally delivered their sons, and collected them several hours later. Almost slupys I would start with a music practice for perhaps an hour. Eventually we would end up playing darts in my office. If the boys lost the game. he would have to submit to being tickled for a tertain length of time. Usually I would suggest or insist that he vear a sair of athletic shorts without underwear "so that I could. tickle him better." Because these shorts had large leg openings. I could not only see the boy's genitals, but also rub against them while tickling him on the stomach or legs. I used this same pattern with several boys, and this is what my intervention letter described. I would find this kind of play very stimulating and would have an erection. I don't know if any of the boys ever noticed this. as I was always fully clothed, but I was conscious of it. After this game, which might last twenty minutes or an hour, I yould tell the boy to change back into his clothes and we might do something else; like hike along the creek behind the seminary. Then he would be picked up or I would take him home. Later I would masturnate while imagining rubbing a boy's penis. All of these fantasies would involve a contextual story, that is, I would imagine arranging a meeting, what clothes the boy would be vearing, what dialogue would take place. etc., Even if I used an image of a boy I did not know in a fantasy, I would have to make up a story which yould place the boy in some sort of relationship with me. I don't know why it was so important for me to do this, but a large part of the excitement would be imagining this "grooming" behavior. The same is true with my fantasies of women, that is, I would have to create some type of relationship on which to base the sexual encounter. Perhaps this is why prostitution or enonymous sex always seems so repulsive to me. or at least I have trouble imagining sem with someone I don't know. I have been speaking of a general pattern of behavior, now I suppose I should tell of some specific happenings

When a very attractive little boy, perhaps nine years old when he first joined choir. He was very well tanned, and now that I think back on it, he was probably the most beautiful child that I molested. He also had rather effeminate mannerisms, although I did not find these particularly attractive. His mother was divorced,

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and he had three older sisters, so his non was very happy at the attention I was giving him. used to come over some days after school, and often came over on weekends. He was only an average singer, so we did not do a lot of music together.' I think we talked B lot. Bs he was fairly sophisticated. I used to play darts with him, which would end with the tickling I described above. I don't remember ever actually touching his penis, but the game was still sexually exciting. He seemed to enjoy himself also. Somehow I coerced him into posing for hude photographs. We would go into the music room. which locked from the inside in a way that no one could get in. Using a black stage curtain as a background I took various shots of him either dressed or undressed. The poses were formal and not in themselves erotic, but photographing a maked boy was stimulating for me. I developed the photos myself in the school lab, with varying degrees of success. I remember one picture in was naked and standing sideways to the particular. In it camera with his hands classed behind his back. He was partially erect and the contrast of him against the black background was soft with an elusive quality. It was a very good picture that I could show to no one. It was very hard for me to destroy this photo, and I tried to discover a way that I could keep the negative, but I was afraid of getting caught with it, so after some time I burned both. grew older he lost interest in the choir, and I saw him ££ less and less. I an quite sure he is one of those who responded to the call to report me, because my provincial knew about these photos even though I never told him that I had photographed I don't know if he has accepted the offer of counseling which has been extended to all my victims. I hope he is recovering from the damage I did

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first came to choir when he was too young to join, but his two brothers were in choir, and his mother usually helped at practices with passing out music, or by bringing cookies. I abused both of his brothers with tickling games where I rubbed against their Senises, and I did take a few nude pictures of . but I was really out of control with I took aude photos of him when he was quite young, perhaps seven years old Some of these I gave to has worther, as I thought they were quite artistic. Over perhaps a four year period I took dozens of photos of some nude, many clothed, but I never again gave nude pictures to his mother. was very fair boy, with blond hair Scmetimes he was not anyious to some to St. Anthony's to see me, but with some pushing, or promise of ice cream, he would usually agree Once there, he never balked at the photo sessions. I would get him to undress gradually, by taking a sicture of him first fully clothed, then without shirt, then without pents, and so on until he was nude. Sometimes we would take these pictures outside, in the foothills of Santa Barbara, but more often somewhere around the seminary. There were many private spore available . We would do other activates together. like go coving in S.B. harbor, or go for a hike, but my main interest was in 5662.0**4** nuce, or in tickling, touching, or rubbing him

One "game" I would play with him, which allowed me to touch him at will, was to see how long he could lie quietly acting as though he wasa aslaap. Sometimes he would do this with a "walkman" radio over h13 2313 I would already have made sure he was dressed in loose-. fitting shorts with no underwear. With him lying across my lap on 3 couch I would pretend I was playing the piono on him, all up and down his body, or I would just lightly tickle him all over, including on his genitals. This game could go on for twenty minutes or longer. Once I rubbed his penis so intensely that he actually reached a form of organ, as his penis jerked by itself. This excited me a great deal, and I remember being very sexually excited by this. was still pretending to be asleep. I never again tried to do bring him to orgasm, but the memory gave me many re-run experiences while masturbating by myself.

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I also did some "kinky" things to Once I rubbed his whole body with oil so that the photo lights made him look shiny. This was also, of course, and excuse to rub his pents. I took some photos of him as though he were an impoverished Appalachian boy in the depression: he wore only a ragged t-shirt. Once, or perhaps more than that, I took him up into our tower which was stark concrete with steel barred windows, and he posed as a prisoner with first clothes on I took some photos of him tied up with a big rope It was as though I felt I could do anything to him that I wanted. In Marked contrast, I also photographed him in choir robes against stained glass window. When was about eleven, one day I was playing the dart game with him. I told him he had to wear the special shorts with no underwear. He said he did not want to: I insisted. He started to cry, and that snapped something in my head. For the first time I was seeing signs that he really did not like this. Just about then his father drove up on a motorcycle, and I told him he could get dressed and go home. That marked the end of my molestations of

He remained in the choir, and afterwards followed his brothers to become a boarding student at St. Anthony's, but I did not approach him again.

I think is the boy whom I molested most seriously. I did so note often and to a greater intensity than with any other. When my Provincial asked me if there were anyone he should specifically tentact regarding my behavior. I gave him is name fater it came out that I had also been involved with his older brothers. The three boys (young men) have begun proceedings to sue the Franciscans.

There were several other boys with whom I played these sexual games, like darts with sexual tickling, or massage including either directly rubbing their penis or rubbing near it. This was the case with and perhaps brothers, and with who wrote the intervention letter. Once at night I also gave a "rub down" which included some touching of his penis. He did not really want me to do this, but I kept asking (begging) until he consented.

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Sometimes I would take some boys on a special outing, or on vacation with me. Usually I took four boys, but sometimes only two. These would include back rubs (read sexual touching) with some of the boys. I gave the same type of treatment, that is, "back rubs" which included some rubbing of the genitals to a few boys who were students at St. Anthony's: I clearly remember this with two boys, both of whom had been in the boys choir. At least one more young man has accused me of molesting him in this way, but I don't remember doing this, although I don't think he is lying, and clearly I am capable of doing it. I don't think I continued this activity in the dormitories for a very long time. The official report on this behavior calls it "assaults in the dormitory."

In 1963 we took the boys and men's choir to England for the second time. After the choir returned, another adult and I and two boys continued to tour. Each night I would give one or both of the boys a "back rub" which included touches in the area of their genitals.

Upon returning to California, I read in the L.A. Times that a boys choir director in southern Calif. was being charged with child

molesting for touching some of the boys' genitals. I was terrified .end shocked. For the first time it was before me that what I had been doing could be classified as criminal behavior. I became paranoid. I imagined that every boys' parents read that article and decided to carefully question their sons about me. This brought on - 3 crisis. I was sure I would be found out. Of course I could tell I tried to think clearly but couldn't. I barely slept at ano one - night. I avoided boys and their families. I told myself my life was over, I had no options, the damage had been done and could not be repealed. The only good thing I could do was to commit suicide before the truth came out. I was bothered by the fact that I did not seem to be able to plan clearly. I also wished I knew more of That moralists were saying about suicide. Actually I was frozen into doing nothing. Finally sobeone suggested I see the school psychologist. With really no hope I went to see him and eventually was able to tall him of my fantasies. I never gave him enough information to report me. Exactly what I said I don't remember, but the sessions helped as enough that I started to get better. By now school had started and with it the choir was back on its practice schedule Everyone seemed to treat me just as always. I resolved never again to touch a boy in a way that could get me into trouble. I was still constantly around boys, still occasionally had one stay the night (sleeping in a separate room), still supervised showers, still took some on trips. But I stoided rubbing their genitals, and never again did I take a ohoto of a boy nude. Now, with the tacit approval of my psychologist. I started paying attention to adult Woman Why I had never before been sexually involved with a woman is somewhat difficult to answer. From an early age I had been -Tought that women were a dangerous temptation for priests. I knew and enjoyed many women, most of whom were connected to the choir, but I never was conscious of any sexual energy between us. If these had ever been invitations in the past. I had cotally missed them. also never thought a woman would be interested in me in a physical way. I felt that I was unattractive to women, or certainly at least I was unavailable. At any rate, never before had it been an opportunity or issue. Once I decided to be more open to the cossibility of sexual involvement. within a couple years I had relationships with three very different women, all of whom I enjoyed.

and I had been fairly good friends for several years. Her son had been in choir since he was eight, and she and her husband had been helpful with projects a number of times. Their marriage broke up, but occapionally I would still visit for a glass of wine or for immer We began to take evening walks together once or twice a week. She was artistic and with and she seemed to enjoy our walk as much as I did. Afterwards we would stop at her home and talk over a glass of wine. Once on a rather thilly evening we were taking a walk. I had my hands in my evercoat pockets. All at once FEMALE

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she put a hand in my pocket as well and so we continued holding hands. This was a new sensation for me that I liked. I felt warm and flushed and happy. When we returned to her house she asked if she could give me a good-night kiss. I said "sure" but I didn't knew what to do . I did eatch on fast and kissing became part of our "goodbye" intual, which gradually became more intense. On one accession she took my hand and placed it on her breast. giving me permission to explore. Before long I was feeling her breasts under her blouse and having bartles with those dawn by a clasps. All this was a bit dangerous because she did have three children in the house. Not I found it wonderfully exciting and sexually stimulating I did to through some periods when I workred about where all this wes joing and schetimes I would would her street for fear of culting into her but bradually I overcase these doubts. I felt a whole new world was openning up for me, and for the most part I felt really good about the experience. I felt that I was normal, and reacting in a perfectly normal sexual way. Once or twice I tried to touch her below the warst, but she stopped me and said she did not want to be touched there. Never were we naked together, nor did we have intercourse or oral sex. Throughout the autumn, winter and spring we say each other regularly This was the same time I was trying to overcome my depression. During the summer of '83 I lived in Berkeley and went to school at USF. came to San Francisco and we spent several days together touring around, holding hands, and kissing. I was my usual paraneld self and was frightened that we would be seen by someone I knew. This next part of the story is very embarrassing for me to tell. One evening she took me to her notel room and asked me if she could give me a special gift. After I laid back on the bed she undid my belt and levered my pants and underwear. She took a hold of my penis and was going to do "I don't know what, " when all of a sudden I began to ejaculate. I was horribly exbarrassed and dressed as quickly as possible and left. don't think I saw her again for six months because I went on sabbatical in England. When I returned she told me that she had mer someone and they were to be married. I was terribly disappointed, but of course I was not going to marry her. I just liked our games and sexual play My first serious temance was over.

In the fall of 1984 I vent to England on subbatical to work as a chaplain at an all-girls school. (A mixed lower school was attached.) I was still trying to deal with depression, and some time away seemed like a good idea. I acted as chaplain and also taught an introduction to psychology course to the 5th and 6th form girls. The Sisters were more than kind to me, and I made life-long friends with the Headmistress, Sr. Monica Significantly, I arranged for one of the choirboys from Samta Barbara to spend the month of December with me while attending school in England. No one ever said that they thought this an odd thing to do. but in hindsight Sr. Monica said she was surprised by my request. I knew I

would enjoy my stay much more if I had one of the boys to share the experience with. came over and we did have a great time. I liked to have a child to take care of. and got along well with the English boys and with the Convent Sisters. He became the darling of the older girls who often invited him to their common four hot cocca in the evening. I did not molest

. that is, I never touched his genitals, but I did give him "back rubs" (body rubs) and prepare his bath, etc. There is something about we that is happier when accompanied by a small boy I think it is probably a combination of sexual feelings, exclient strachment, and permission to play on a child's level. Perhaps hearder the sexual element, the child in me wants a playmate.

Also furney these years I proctically raised a boy named de was without a fither, and his nother worked two jobs. He was a bright boy with a sweet singing voice who needed help. I put tagether a fund to pay for a better school for him, and often helped min with his homework, took nim to his therapist, etc. He had his own room in my apartment and often stayed the night. Many times I gave him back rube and body rube but I avoided his genital area. I was determined not to molest him. Now I realize that I put myself in some very dangerous circumstances but I never touched his genitals. After I went on sabbatical he spent less time with me, but we remained friends (almost a father-son relationship actually) until he grew out of choir.

about this some time, the mid-1980's. I had a short affair with a single woman who was on our faculty. It started one evening when she told me she was afraid she was falling in love with me. I was astounded because, although I found her attractive and considered her a friend. I had no idea how one just "fell in love". She was leaving the school at the end of term, so we both knew this would not be a long-term relationship. We did kiss, and touch each other intimately, and have oral sex. But never intercourse. At the end of the year she moved away, but we did see each other on occasion and for a while we were sexual at these times. Eventually we saw each other very little, she found other friends and later mairied.

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I receive Rector of St. Anthony's in the fall of 1984, and struggled to keep the school open, but the decision was made to close it in the spring of 1987. This was a very difficult time of transition, and I worked way hard to keep sticent body and faculty in reasonably good spirits until graduation. Then I industriously set our to levee the buildings, put the library in storage, etc. I was highly graised by our Board of Directors for the work I did at this difficult time. The next year I stafted work on a history MA at DISE. Then by next crisis hat. A Franciscan priest and former faculty member was accused of molesting two young han while they were students at St. Anthony's. Not only was I the best of friends with this family, but unknown to then at the time, I had molested the same two boys when they were in their, by tickling them and touching their genitals I was expected to console the family, deal with the anger of the parents, handle towaunity relations because the offender had been on the faculty. and deal with my own feelings of horror at what I had done avself. I take those to an exotional breakdown. Again I felt that I could not to on living, I could not tell anyone why, and soon I would be found out enveloy I canceled some of my classes at the university. locked myself in the office, and once again felt like committing suicide As a last resort I made another appointment with my therapist and explained in general terms the state of my life. He once again helped me to pull out of my depression, but I don't think I ever really completely recovered.

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around this same time I began to be sexual with a woman, slightly folder than ayself, whom I had known as a friend for years. She had been involved in cherr before, and three of her boys had earlier teen in it She was separated from her husband and working toward a diverce. We began by jogging together, then went on some pionics. I don't remember how the relationship turned sexual, but it did. Ι was feeling very alone. she was starved for affection, and the opportunity to be together was there. For a number of years we carried on this "affair." I loved the mutual touching, the kissing less, and I never was confortable performing oral sex on her. But we did masturbate each other, and in this way I believe she reached organa Sometimes I would not exaculate the entire time although I would have a strong erection. Perhaps I could not relax enough, or I was afraid to be out of control, or I was just unable to reach sexual release. Twice I think we had intercourse. After each time I was a nervous wreck, because even though one of the times I was rearing a condom, I was still afraid she might become pregnant. She used to ask me if I loved her, and although I could express care and close friendship, I was afraid to say I was in love. Not only do I not know exactly what that means, but I was afraid of the committment which saying it might involve. Even when I moved to Berkeley in 1991, she used to come to the Monterey Bay area and we yould secretly meet to spend time together and to be sexual. I never did spend an entire night with her.

Backing up a bit, in June of 1991 I finished my degree at the university, and I was asked to move to Berkeley to work in the Provincial office. I had been histless and unhappy, could not describe any job that would interest me, and was generally depressed. The boys choir hired a new director, I was replaced by another administrator in Santa Barbara, and with somewhat heavy heart moved to Berkeley.

While living in Berkeley I worked in Oakland at our provincial office, mainly doing secretarial work. As I had nothing else I wanted to do I was not dissatisfied, but clearly this would be a transition job. I got along well with the office staff and I was reasonably happy, but had no ambition. Sexually I was continuing to masturbate to images both of women and boys. and as I said before. Occasionally I would see Interest of course.

The year sort of bumped along taking me with it. In December I visited the choir in Santa Barbara, but already there were boys in it whom I had never met. I falt velocmed but estranged. There was a dispute going on about the new director, and I was drawn into the controversy That was not pleasant. In April I joined some of my family for a 10K race in the Redwoods. Then in May the letter of intervention arrived. This was addressed to as with copies sent to several church officials. including my Provincial. confronting me with a molestation of perhaps ten years earlier. The people who had sent it had been my best friends. The tone of the letter was stern, but the writters tried to point out that by forcing me to get help they were not only protecting other boys, but helping me as well. (Since this time they have become very hostile) I sat down with my provincial and a couple of good friends that sake night and told them the accusations were true. and that there were many other instances of similar behavior. I was somewhat in shock, but I was not overly surprised that the secret was finally out. My confreres promised support and action, and a few days later I left for St. Luke's Institute in Suitland. Maryland, near Washington DC. for a week of evaluation. There I was interviewed and tested in every wer possible, including medical examinations and a brain scan. It was 🗧 fairly disturbing procedure, but the 32 clergy patients at the hospital (St. Luke's is a psychiatric hospital) kept assuring me that I would make it. At the end of the week my provincial flew out and together we listened to the psychological and medical evaluation. At this point I felt devastated. The psychiatrist emphasized the seriousness of the problem, which he diagnosed as pedophilia, same sex, non-exclusive, and recommended that I begin treatment as soon as possible. I remember one of the interviewing therapists reading a summary of my life history. I was asked if I wanted to say anything. In an emotional outburst I said, "I don't know how you can say those things about my father, he's a very got: Man!" Trying to calm me, she stated that she was only repeating information that I had given her. It was decided that in ten days I would setum as a patient. I falt convicted and sentenced. My depression becaue more acute. I just wanted to die. On the six himr flight back to San Francisco I stared out the window and was 21lant

I visited my parents in Portland, Dregon, and told them I was being sent away to treat depression. It was some months later I told them about the sex addiction by telephone. More on that later.

St Luke Institute was originally founded by a priest-psychiatrist to treat alcoholic clergy. When it became clear that there was a need for treating tex addiction, the SLI adapted its program. It uses the medical model combined with Twelve-step therapy. It is well staffed and expensive. Normally the program lasts seven months, but I was there for thirteen months. I had individual therapy twice a week, small group therapy (3 men and 2 therapists) three times a week, large groups twice a week, and then psychodrama, and other plume thrown in at various times. There were also educational bectures and vorkshops on eating disorders, rational thinking, family dynamics, etc. Every night we went to a 12-step meeting. On weekends one could get permission to ge into Washington for the day. I became an expert tourguide of the Smithsonian museums.

I started the program feeling very miserable and quite sure that if anyone should find out what I had done I would be ostracized. So I tried to say as little as possible. I spent a lot of time reading novels. My sister Christine was a great support and phoned every night. She also visited several times. I wrote a sexual history and gave it to my therapist to read. I minimized everything. I often thought how much better it would be for everyone if I were dead. I couldn't watch the news of read the Washington Post for fear my story would be there. The fact that nearly every other person at the Institute had similar problems did not seem to matter to he Every might I had to write one page for my therapist about what was significant that day. Thus he kept a watch on my moods and on how I was understanding myself. I sat in the back of the chapel during Mass and at prayers, half hidden behind a pillar. After seven weeks I had to present an hour-long "behavior Log" to a group of patients, basically describing why I was at St. Luke's. I did this with great trepidation and, to my surprise, many tears. I fel desperate. Afterwards the other patients greeted me with hugs and assurances that I waan't the most horrible person they had ever met Two days later they read their written comments to me -- in what areas they saw denial, things they felt I minimized or left out, etc. It was a good lesson in tough love Then my therapist had each person there (16 in all) say hav they would feel if I committe: suicide. That caught me completely by surprise. It was one of the most difficult sessions I have ever endured. It brought all of the shit into the open and exposed it to daylight. I just sobbed. I was upset and angry at my therapist for joing this, but in many ways the technique worked, and much less erten did I slip into this extreme self-oity.



After these experiences I started to improve and became more active in the program. I started enjoying myself more. I felt a little bit safe because of the support of the others in the Institute. Ι became very attached to my therapist who seemed so often to know how to help me. I started taking depo-provera injections, and after a short time on Procade (which seemed to make me worse). I switched to the anti-depreseant I take now . I had many crises as my conduct in Senta Barbara became more public, but from each I recovered. The repor criers was when I was told that I had been in the frint page of the Santa Barbara paper, and that one of my victima had been on television saying what I had done to him. I fell a past. Actually I went into a kind of trance I fust stared at a black wall and . didn't hear anything in the cook. Wy friend became alarmed and Talled the duty nurse. She phined my therapist who called me. but I couldn't tall him what had hereened. so he called the psychistrist whiteld the ourse to give all something. I suppose it was like a Chinese fire drill. Later my therapist asked me to please try not to have a crisis at 10:30pm on a Saturday night. Connected with ay public notoclety was what the church calls "public scandal". As a result my Provincial told me that I could not again function as a Catholic priest nor hold any ocsition of authority in the church Although I knew this was coming, I was. and still am. devastated. He said I need to look at the "vocation issue," but so far I have not been able to do so.

when I realized that my case was becoming public, I decided that I needed to tell my parents about my sexual soting out: about the molestations and also about the women. My sister Christine flew to Portland to be with them when I phoned. I had each parent get on an extension line and a clearly as I could I told them what had been going on in my life. My Dad responded immediately that he was sure God would take care of everything and I was not to worry -- they would keep me in their prayers. My nother was in stammed silence. That happened next says a lot about my family. Christine sar with. my mother who kept muttering that she couldn't understand how I could do such things. Weren't priests given special graces so that they had no sexual feelings? What had gone wrong? My dad marched into the room and said. "I'm going to the store. Does anyone need anything from Safeway?" My alster asked if he had understood what I had said on the phone. Dad said. "Dan't do anything about that, it's all in God's hands." Out to Safeway he went. Telling my therapist this story. I said that I had no idea what my Bad's Teelings were. "No," my therapist said, "And the apples don't fall far from the tree."

After seven months I graduated from the main program, but all concerned agreed that in many ways I had only just scratched the surface of my search for self-understanding. Things in Sta Barbars were still hot, and I was in no rush to jump into the caldron. I have already spoken about my friend s visit to St. Luke's so that we might come to some resolution of the relationship. This was done with the help of my therapist. She agreed that she would not wait for me any longer because I was not available. We also spread to 2 Writing schedule, but that has since fallen spart. Once she told by therapist that she sometimes saw me as almost one of her children. perhaps a seven year old. I was very surprised at this, but also curlous and hurt. It has given me something to ruminate over 2.6

In early January I graduated from the in-patient program and moved into a "three-quarter way house". This involved far less supervision on the part of the institute, more freedom for me, a change in therapists, and generally gave me auch more time for myself. I had therapy twice a week, and small group twice. I tried to find a job, and when I couldn t. I volunteered to help at a soup hitchen and also at two cinvalescent homes. I still went to 12-step meetings every night. To my isys mere filled.

My therapier's speciality was environment of therapy, so I began to draw a produce with brayens at avery session . While my drawing skill remained that of a child, by ability to communicate with the picture grew I delved into some family issues which I had avoided previously I made pictures of monsters who threatened me and we spoke thrut what these ghould meant and why they were fearful. At times I even drew bright sunny scenes which reflected a less depiessive state _ Overall I was relatively happy Yet on the holizin was the release of a report out of Santa Barbara on the sexual molestations which had occured at St. Anthony's Seminary over e thirty year period. Letters were sent to every child I ever had in boys' choir, to every high school student I had taught, as well is to men who had been my classmates in high school. Clearly the net was set to catch others besides syself, but virtually everyone I had known in the time period recreved a letter which included my name as an already known entity, and asked for any additional information. The investigation dragged on much longer than had been planned at first. This loomed as a dark cloud as we entered sprint. and summer of 1993. I was slated to return to California in July.

Sefore leaving St. Luke's I updated my artercare contract and arranged to neet with a therapist in San Jose. I left St. Luke's frightened of what lay before me but pleased with the work I had jone there

Upon striving at my old room in Berkeley, I was told that I should nove with all hasts to my new assignment at San Juan Bautista. Further. Tam West, a francisten perchologist who would be on my supplit team told me that the Provincial had cancelled my appointment with the therapist and I was to begin a group therapy

program for child molesters instead. I stared in disbelief. Then I flipped out. I told Tom that without a therapist I would self destruct I wouldn't make it. In my distress I felt I was being set up to fail -- a feeling that has arisen in various situations since as I found out more about PTA. I developed reasons why I should not the involved. A compromise was made that I could have an individual interapist as long as she was blog in my small group. Instead to try PTA for three months after which we would re-evaluate the experience. Shit would be that I would be shriked and angry if I were not alloved to continue. 21

A Pastoral Response to Allegations and Instances of Sexual Abuse of Minors at St. Anthony's Seminary

Ι. Sexual abuse of minors involves an egregious violation of personal integrity and the breaking of one of society's most basic bonds of human loyalty and trust. It is an invasion of both the personal and familial life of the victim. When this abuse if perpetrated by a priest or religious the offensiveness is compounded by the high regard, faith, and power which is given to those in positions of pastoral example and leadership in the Catholic Christian community. Knowledge of the action provokes confusion about faith, anger at the personal violation, and sows distrust in all directions, creating in many respects a "solidarity in victimhood" between the minor, his family, and the community to which they belong. Unfortunately, as we have seen in many instances, the violation is so basic that it is met with denial and total incomprehension; it is often very difficult to break the barriers of defensiveness; those once victimized can become twice victimized, and the cycle of violence increases in all directions.

As friars minor with the profession of witnessing to the Gospel, we believe that this abuse in no way can be tolerated, countenanced, or accepted; because sexual abuse of a minor is such a unique example of offense against those essentially "powerless" and "voiceless," the religious fraternity must take decisive steps to speak for those who have no voice, heal the wounds of the body Christ which has been socially violated, and restore the basic elements of trust and fidelity which have marked the close relationships between the friars and the community of which they are a part, As painful as it is, we are committed to facing the truth about ourselves and our individual brothers; we want to take personal and systemic steps to remedy the situation. Within our Gospel way of life, knowledge that this has occurred in one of our own institutions and beyond it can only be seen as an opportunity, with the help of all, to "turn our face like flint" and proceed both as "penitents from Assisi" and peacemakers within the Church and society,

We believe that our pastoral response should be dictated by this Gospel covenant with the people of God and the religious integrity of the Gospel. We want "truth with a pastoral face." We recognize very well that we need help and sometimes a shove in doing this.

II. Most of you are familiar with the basic facts which occathe meetings taking place the last five weeks. In sioned March charges of sexual abuse of minors were filed by 1989. against Philip Mark Wolfe, who was a Franciscan and teacher at St. Anthony's Seminary from September 1981 friar to June 1984. The molestation occurred between 1983 and 1987, because of the statute of limitations only the charges of but could be treated with criminal seriousness. In September 1989, Philip Wolfe pleaded "no contest" to one count of oral copulation with a person under eighteen and was sentenced to a term in county jail followed by six months in a treatment

center. In May 1992, the family again approached the provincial minister of the Franciscans to inform him that while a member of the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, also had been inappropriately sexually touched by Father Robert Van Handel. Robert was founder of the choir and teacher at St. Anthony's Seminary from May 1975 to its closure in June 1987. While the activity with the Boys Choir was pursued through the means of a public letter to its members and family in October 1992. information emerged at a meeting at St. Anthony's on October 28 that Van Handel's sexual abuse of minors extended well into the seminary itself. Since that time, several other victims, some both members of the Boys Choir and seminarians, have come forward; rumors and indirect allegations have also been made. In addition, past cases, dating back many years, have surfaced.

III. The Province policies involving friar misconduct and the sexual abuse of minors have evolved gradually from their first formulation in April 1988. I think we are much indebted to the persistence and honest challenging by the for our own growth in this area. After meeting with them in January 1990, in the dreadful wake of the first victimization, the definitorium worked on the achievable goals presented to us by the family; they overlapped with our own desires to address any situation like this actively and with the strongest pastoral responsibility. The whole fraternity grew tremendously through this experience: admissions procedures were reevaluated; continuing education programs by people trained in psycho-sexual development and sexual deviancy were conducted for the benefit of those in formation and those in the fraternity at large; after an interim policy, a clear and precise statement on sexual misconduct was adopted by the province in January 1992. The programs and policy were seen as developmental; we believe these most recent experiences open up a new chapter in our own growth, especially since our own policy now in place was not designed to with historic cases but with current issues. We have comdeal mitted ourselves to dealing with this in a comprehensive way. Let me make some comments first about our general approach and then about the pastoral application to St. Anthony's.

1. At the present time aspirants to our way of life Α. undergo a lengthy process of discernment which involves a behavioral assessment interview covering family history, academic and work experience, spiritual journey, socialization and psychosexual development; the discernment process includes a psychologevaluation by a professional using the instruments of a ical personal interview. Object Relations Test. Rorcharch Test, and numerous questionnaires covering socialization patterns, hostility quotients, and word association testing. The admissions procedures themselves are formally conducted by friars independent of the vocations office through a review of the candidates entire file and personal interview. This entire review process involves three distinctive and independent stages; it is considered to be state of the art. However, in the light of these recent experiences, the entire procedures will be reevaluated, assessed, and, if necessary, augmented through recommendations

received from an independent review board which will be established.

2. Currently in place in the formation program, lasting from six to nine years, are extensive programs of continuing education in the areas of sexual maturation, pastoral responsibility, and sexual deviancy. After solemn profession and admission to pastoral responsibilities as a priest or laic friar, the programs of education continue, sometimes through the diocese and more often through the province itself. All of these programs conducted by the province will be reviewed by an independent board and strengthened.

•Э. The province does not operate any educational establishments involving minors; parish programs fall under diocesan policies. It is incumbent upon us, however, to see that an independent review is made of all those involved in ministry to minors in CCD programs and other such activities. In addition. we will be making a review of past personnel decisions made in this area and ask for recommendations from an independent board, so that current policies, where inadequate, may be corrected. We will insist on cooperation with diocesan programs and requirements in this area.

4. The current policies governing the sexual abuse of minors will be upheld with all rigor, especially those governing the placement and ministry of offenders. One of the tasks of the review board will be the evaluation of these current policies as to their effectiveness and application; if necessary, recommendations for changes should be made to the provincial definitorium. The policies adopted will be public documents.

5. In the course of the next six months the province will establish an independent review board designed to address the above areas of concern (items 1-3) and to make further recommendations to the provincial administration to insure the integrity the friars life and ministry as it relates to minors. \mathbf{of} The board will also deal in an continuing fashion with cases of misconduct which arise. Directly under the provincial minister, the review board will be composed of five members, two of whom will be friars and three who will be lay specialists. Articles \mathbf{of} procedure will be drawn up based on the best current models available, reviewed by the board itself, and finally approved by the provincial definitorium. The definitorium commits itself to the establishment of this board as an on-going project.

B.1. With respect to the allegations which have arisen involving the conduct of friars at St. Anthony's Seminary, the following steps will be taken:

2. The friars will continue to be proactive in responding to known victims and their families through the offering of counselling, the identification of contacts in the local community, personal visits, and remuneration for therapy. 3. It is clearly necessary that more information be gathered so that possible victims can be identified and helped in an appropriately confidential and sensitive way; so that offenders can be identified and appropriately dealt with in accordance with the established procedures; so that the truth of all allegations can be established. To accomplish these goals and to investigate the instances and allegations of the sexual misconduct of minors at St. Anthony's Seminary, the province will send a letter in December 1992 to past pupils of St. Anthony's Seminary from 1965-66 to its closure in 1986-87.

A Board of Inquiry will be established in January 3,2 1993 to process the results of the past pupil contacts and to investigate the allegations of sexual misconduct of minors at the The Board of Inquiry will be directly responsible to seminary. the provincial minister; it will be composed of five members, one to be a friar from outside the province skilled in counselling and informed on issues of sexual abuse; one a professional layman with expertise in the area of sexual abuse; and three other members, one of whom will be a victim and/or parent of a victim. The information generated by this process will be maintained in a confidential manner under the authority of the provincial minisfollowing the guidelines outlined in the "Chicago Policy ter Regarding Clerical Sexual Misconduct with Minors" (4,6) A draft set of procedures will be drawn up as soon as possible, submitted the board for review and further amendment, and finally apto proved by the provincial definitorium. Final recommendations of the board, respecting confidentiality, will be made public. After sufficient review, no friar who has been established to be an offender against minors will return to active public ministry without thorough and enforceable guidelines as those are recommended by the board.

4. In the course of the next five months, the friars will sponsor a series of fora which will have as their purpose the education of the Franciscans and local faith community on issues of child abuse and its implications, the spiritual dimensions of the situation and its meaning for the church, and the identification of local resources in the area. These goals may be accomplished by a day of recollection or weekend retreat, workshops, study groups, and the dissemination of information.

5. The province will work with the diocese in sponsoring a workshop for the broader Catholic community in Santa Barbara for the purposes of education and community information. Dear







THE PROBLEM:

Because of some specific problems of pedophilia in the past connected with St. Anthony's Seminary, some of the parents concerned think that the provincial minister should write a letter to all former students of the seminary, asking if they know of any cases in which a student was molested by a friar teacher. Some, apparently, think that all teachers of the seminary in the past twenty-five years (?) should be investigated, or should be questioned about their past.

(Part of this reaction comes, naturally, from a desire to remedy, df possible, the harm that has been done and prevent its from happening to others; part, the perhaps; from a desire to help the offenders; part, too, seems to come from a certain panic; and from not knowing how to handle the fact of molestation emotionally or spiritually.)

1. A BOARD OF INQUIRY, composed of some friars and some lay people, chosen for professional qualifications, for their concern for victimizers; and for their concern for the good name of the church and the friars.

This board would be at the service of the provincial minister OR the general visitor. They would suggest ways of investigating alledged misconduct of former seminary professors.

2. a SPECIAL VISITOR GENERAL who comes in the name of the Minister General: his duties and rights would be specified by the Minister General, but we could and should ask for what we want: such a description might include:

- he is to assist the provincial minister with his definitorium;

- he is to refer all his findings to the general minister OR
- he is to have full authority to make all necessary decisions, except those which the general minister wishes to reserve to himself;
- he is to have a qualified secretary, chosen or at least approved by himself;

A statement of Saint John's Abbey concerning sexual abuse and exploitation

Saint John's Abbey is saddened that some members of this monastic community have been cited in allegations of sexual abuse and sexual exploitation which are currently being processed by legal and church officials. Our primary concern must be for the victim's safety and well-being.

Several years ago when similar allegations were made against the clergy elsewhere, we began a process to deal responsibly with incidents or patterns of sexual impropriety within this monastic community if and when they are brought to our attention. The monastic community feels a deep revulsion for breaches of trust and responsibility, and we are committed to the following course of action:

> • to respond immediately as a monastic community to achieve the spiritual and psychological healing of any person who may have been a victim of sexual abuse or exploitation inflicted by a member of our community;

• to deal quickly, firmly and appropriately with abusers;

to strengthen the ongoing dialogue within this community on issues of human sexuality, basic spirituality and responsibility;

 to continue our rigorous scrutiny of all who seek membership in our community;

to reaffirm and continue to implement procedures for dealing with cases of sexual abuse and exploitation which were adopted by Saint John's Abbey on February 7, 1989.

We have discussed these charges scriously as a community. We view sexual abuse and exploitation as unquestionably deplorable. Mindful of our generations of faithful service to the local and universal church and the academic community, we are determined that this community will not tolerate sexual abuse or sexual exploitation by any of its members.

ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY FOR ALLEGED CASES OF SEXUAL ABUSE AND CHILD ABUSE

The policy of the Diocese of Spokane in alleged cases of Sexual Abuse or Child Abuse by church employees, including priests and deacons, encompasses the overriding concern of the pastoral care of the victim and his/her family, as well as the immediate evaluation and just treatment for the alleged offender, and reconciliation of all involved as part of the ministry of the Church.

When an allegation is brought to the attention of the Diocese, without an assumption of guilt, we will take the following steps.

- 1. Allegations of Sexual Abuse or Child abuse must be reported to the Office of the Bishop by those who know or have reasonable cause to believe that abuse has taken place. The Diocese will respond promptly to the pastoral needs of the victim, the family, and the accused. The Moderator of the Curia will be the lead agent in this response.
 - The Diocese will verify notification of the appropriate governmental agency. The legally mandated "reporting channel" for abuse of children is the Child Protective Services of the Department of Social and Health Services. The Diocese will further direct all church employees, lay and clergy, to cooperate in the investigation. If the accused is an employee of the Diocese and he/she fails to cooperate, he/she will be suspended from duties without pay. A priest or deacon is liable to the canonical penalty of suspension for failure to cooperate with the investigation.

The Diocese will inform the accused individual that an allegation has been made, that an investigation and evaluation by proper authorities will begin immediately, and that in cases of alleged sexual abuse, without assumption of guilt the accused individual will be relieved of his/her duties with pay during the investigation. A priest or deacon will be removed from sacred ministry during the course of the investigation in accord with c. 1722.

REGARDING CASES OF SEXUAL ABUSE

In all cases of confirmed sexual abuse, the Diocese will terminate the employment of the individual. A priest or deacon will be subject to canonical penalties or other prohibition to ministry.

Every effort will be made to see that the individual receives treatment for the disorder.

DRAFT LETTER

Dear Alumni,

I am writing this letter to you on behalf of the friars of the St. Barbara Province to inform you about two instances of sexual misconduct with students by former faculty members of the seminary. I also want you to know how the friars are responding to this most difficult situation. With this letter we also want to reach out to any who may be in need of help.

The Province has a sexual abuse policy. We have always followed it and responded to any report of inappropriate sexual behavior. After Fr. Philip Wolfe, who had been at the seminary from 19- to 1984, admitted to having engaged in sexual behavior with two seminarians, he was convicted of sexual child molestation in 1987. We had no reason to believe that Fr. Wolfe had been sexually involved with any other seminarians.

This past spring a former seminarian and Santa Barbara Boys' Choir member, informed the Choir and the friars that he had been touched in sexually inappropriate ways by Fr. Robert Van Handel. Fr. Robert was a faculty member at the seminary from 19-- to 19--

In an effort to discover if there were other boys who might have felt harmed by similar behavior, the friars together with the Choir sent a letter describing Fr. Roberts actions, to all those who were members of the choir during Fr. Robert's tenure. In conjunction with this an announcement was made to the Greater Community at the 9:30 Sunday Mass. In a subsequent open meeting, called to discuss these matters, further allegations of sexual misconduct by Fr. Robert were made by two former seminarians.

As Friars Minor and religious men in the Catholic Church, we deplore all forms of sexual exploitation and abuse. And we feel deep concern for anyone who has been harmed in this manner. As friars we have a particular concern for all the alumni of St. Anthony's Seminary. We want to be able to offer spiritual and psychological assistance to those who may be in need of it because a faculty member acted in a sexually inappropriate way. We realize such individuals may need encouragement to seek help.

The Province, in cooperation with the Greater Community, is establishing a board of professional and concerned lay people, to investigate allogations of sexual abuse, and to offer assistance to those whe have been harmed in these ways. This board will been discussional and an arrival.





A Pastoral Response to Allegations and Instances of Sexual Abuse of Minors at St. Anthony's Seminary

Ι. Sexual abuse of minors involves an egregious violation of personal integrity and the breaking of one of society's most basic bonds of human loyalty and trust. It is an invasion of both the personal and familial life of the victim. When this abuse is perpetrated by a priest or religious the offensiveness is compounded by the high regard, faith, and power which is given to those in positions of pastoral example and leadership in the Catholic Christian community. Knowledge of the action provokes confusion about faith, anger at the personal violation, and sows distrust in all directions, creating in many respects a "solidarity in victimhood" between the minor, his family, and the community to which they belong. This abuse can in no way be tolerated, countenanced, or accepted by the religious fraternity in which the accused friar has made profession.

Becuase sexual abuse of a minor is such a unique example of offense against those essentially "voiceless" and "powerless," the religious fraternity, itself a victim, must take decisive steps to speak for those who have no voice, heal the wounds of the body of Christ which has been socially violated, and restore the basic elements of trust and fidelity which have marked the close relationships between the friars and the comunity of which they are a part. The experience of the depth of the wound on all sides necessitates a stronger witness to the Gospel; the event itself, within the context of our way of life, is an opportunity to follow Christ both as "peacemakers" and "penitents from Assisi."

This pastoral response is dictated by our covenant with the people of God and the religious integrity of the Gospel. Our concern must be truth with a pastoral face.

II. Presenting History

In March 1989, charges of sexual abuse of minors were filed by 🖁 against Pjhilip Mark Wolfe, who was a franciscan friar and teacher at St. Anthony's seminary from September 1981 to June 1984. The molestation occured between 1983 and 1987, but because of the statute of limitations only the charges of could be treated with criminal In September 1989, Philip Wolfe pleaded "no seriousness. contest" to one count of oral copulation with a person under eighteen. In May 1992, the <u>approached</u> the minister to inform him that provincial while a the Santa Barbara Boys Choir, also member of had been inappropriately sexually touched by Father Robert VanHandel, O.F.M. Robert VanHandel was founder of the choir and teacher at St. Anthony's Seminary from May 1975 to its closure in June 1986. Robert has admited to the activity with members of the Boys Choir but has given no indication that this acitivyt extended to seminarians at St. Anthony's. While the activity with the Boys Choir was pursued through the means of a public letter to members and family, at a meeting at St. Anthony's on October 28, 1992,

other allegations were made agaist Robert Van Handel, one involving a member of the Boys Choir to which Robert had previously admitted, and another involving a seminarian at St. Anthony's Seminary. Since that time, another boy who was both a member of the Boys Choir and a student at St. Anthony's has come forward. Other instances involving Robert continue to surface indirectly, at this time the victims choosing to remain anonymous; it is certainly expected that further revelations will occur, the extent of the abuse being unknown. The Franciscans are trying to pursue all available leads.

Recently, we also have known of three cases pursued from an earlier period which are being dealt with privately. The friars involved were at St. Anthony's in the late 1960's, 1971-1973, and 1977-1980, 1982-1983. Currently, we have indications that one of these cases may have been multiple; we have no indications about the others. Lastly, although we have no evidence of wrongdoing at St. Anthony's, we do have evidence that a sixth friar who had some problems elsewhere, resided at St. Anthony's from Ocober 1980 to 1986.

Given this presenting history and the current deep concern in the local communikty, some further action is both important and appropriate; we must act with all integrity to deal with this situation.

III. Evolution of a Pastoral Response

In April 1988 the Province first formalized its pastoral response for dealing with accusations of misconduct against This poicy was in effect when the case of Father Philip friars. Wolfe first surfaced; the policy in effect did not specifically and instances of child abuse. Since that address accusations time we have made great strides in understanding the depth of the issue involved, the victimization of the families, and the necessity of a more sensitive and appropriate response to instances of child abuse. After an intermediate policy statement was formulated for this offense, a more comprehensive policy was adopted by the provincial definitorium in January 1992. A copy of that policy, the current one, is attached.

In terms of our response to the first accusations against Wolfe, I must honestly say in retrospect that my own Philip approach was overly legalistic and I am genuinely sorry for my failure to deal adequately with the family, either myself or through a designated intermediary. As a result, the isolation of the family increased and the response of the Church was hopelessly inadequate. This continues to be a source of hurt to the family, and I have nothing to offer accept apologies and a firm purpose of amendment. This isolation continued from March to August of 1989, when I met with the **see if there was** anything that could be done to help. After September 20, when Philip Wolfe was sentenced, the family was more clearly able to articulate its goals, and these were written to me in November 1989 with great truthfulness and charity. A meeting was set up between the family and the definitorium in January 1990, and although very painful for all parties involved, I am grateful that the truthfulenss of the family moved us to more adequately

understand the terrible havoc wrought by child abuse. Four achievable goals were presented to the friars by the family and they overlapped with our own desires to address any situation and pastoral like this actively with the strongest responsibility. I mention this brief history both to thank the for helping us at that time, to take responsibility and apologize myself for my own failures to address the initial abuse, and to indicate that the friars themselves are continuing to learn. The whole fraternity grew tremendously through this experience, from a reevaluation of its admissions procedures, through workshops by professionals to province members, to the formulation of a clear and precise policy, to my own speaking to other religious and church groups on the importance of dealing directly with this problem in our society and Church.

Given this background, I think we are in a much better postion both to understand the extreme hurt of the present situation and how it might be approched in a "victim-centered" way. We are trying our best.

IV. Specific Steps

I would like to suggest the following steps, victim and family centered, to approach the current situation:

1. The friars will continue to be proactive in responding to known victims and their families through the offering of counselling, the identification of contacts in the local community, personal visits, and remuneration of therapy.

2. It is clearly necessary that more information be gathered so that possible victims can be identified and helped in an appropriately confidential and sensitive way. In addition, the friars must be and appear to be witnessing to their own religious integrity; this involves self-monitoring and pastoral responsiveness to the needs of the community. To meet these goals, I suggest a two-stage approach:

A. In early January 1993, a letter will be sent to past pupils of St. Athony's Seminary from 1966 to 1986. A sample of a possible letter, written by Alberic Smith, is attached. Any victim who wishes to come forward will be promised confidentiality and asked to contact a named psychologist or a member of the board of inquiry, Dr. Eugene Merlin. Information will then be processed in accordance with the province policy.

B. Also in January 1993, a special board of inquiry will be established directly accountable to the provincial minister. This board of inquiry will be chaired by Fr. Dismas Bonner, O.F.M. and be composed of Dr. Eugene Merlin, a local family counsellor, and a member of the local community. The Board will be asked to seek out information involving instances of the abuse of minors at St. Anthony's Seminary from 1966 to 1986, by interviewing friar faculty staff, receiving responses from the letter previously sent out, and making themselves available to any other members of the SAS staff or community for a personal interview, should these people so desire. While respecting absolutely the confidentiality and privacy of anyone who comes foward and the accused, the Board will be asked to make a specific recommendations for further action to the provincial minister and the definitorium. These recommendations, within the bounds of confidentiality, will be made public. The Board will set its onw norms of conduct beyond these guidelines.

3. In the course of the next four months (December through March 1993) and longer, if necessary, the friars will sponsor a series of fora which will have as their purpose the education of the franciscans and local faith community on issues of child abuse and its implications, the spiritual dimensions of the situation and its meaning for the church, and the naming of local resources in the area. These goals may be accomplished by a day of recollection or weekend retreat, workshops, study groups, and the dessimination of information at the Sunday gatherings.

4. The province will work with the diocese in sponsoring a workshop for the broader Catholic community in Santa Barbara for the purposes of education and community information.

5. The province will make available to the local Santa Barbara community rooms for holding support groups for victims and their families.

6. With respect to any friars accused of sexual abuse, the province will hold with all rigor to its previously established policies (especially number 9).

This is a suggested letter to the alumni of St. Anthony's about sexual abuse. It would be sent to those who were here from the 70's to the time the school closed. I put the letter in the first person because one approach to such a letter is that it comes from me, the Alumni Association director. All of these are just ideas, and I realize you may have quite a different approach, and that is fine.

Dear....

I am writing you this letter with a heavy heart. You and I know how much good has come to so many young men who spent time here at St. Anthony's Seminary. Every year so many come back or write to tell me how much this place means to them because of the good things they experienced here. On rare occasions, however, we have come to find out that a few students received evil when they were here. This evil came in the form of sexual abuse by a very few faculty members.

I am speaking in particular of Fr. Phil Wolf who sexually abused two seminarians in the time before he left here in 1984. Fr. Robert Van Handel was sexually inappropriate with several members of the Santa Barbara Boys' Choir about twelve years ago. I mention this because he was also a faculty member at the Seminary. We have sent letters to all the Boys' Choir members and have read a letter to the Greater Community here at the Sunday Mass at 9:30. The purpose of these letters was to bring the facts of sexual abuse to the attention of all who might have been potential victims. It seems that the victims are few. But it is important that anyone who was hurt receive encouragement to seek help and know that the Franciscans deeply deplore the abuse and want to help any victims with psychological and spiritual assistance.

Since you were a student here at St. Anthony's I send you this letter. If you were hurt by any faculty member through inappropriate sexual conduct, please let Fr. Tom West, O.F.M. know. His number is 415-863-0111. He is a clinical psychologist and is in charge of arranging help for any persons who have been hurt. While the number of those hurt that we know of is very small, this letter helps assure that there are no others who are carrying this type of pain and do not know where they can go for help and healing. Please feel free to pass this information to other classmates who for whatever reason did not receive this letter. Our alumni list is limited, and if someone moves without letting us know, we have to remove them from the list.

This is, indeed, a most difficult topic to pursue. Let us keep those who have been hurt and their families in our prayers. If there is anything I can do personally to help you in your understanding of this difficult area, please let me know. It is my deep and earnest prayer that in the case of all of you who read this letter, that it was not needed-that that you were never hurt in this way at St. Anthony's.

ACCUSATIONS OF SEXUAL ABUSE OF CHILDREN: POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Policies

Our society has grown acutely aware of the tragedy of child sexual abuse. The pain and confusion which such abuse causes child victims, their families, and the community are compounded when the abuser is a religious or other trusted member of society. While the number of priests and religious involved in such incidents is quite small, the St. Barbara Province is deeply concerned to prevent any such abuse by its friar members. Should such a tragedy occur despite our best efforts at prevention, the Province is committed to take steps to mitigate the destructive impact of the abuse on the victim, the victim's family, and the Church community. In such cases, the Province seeks to move quickly and with compassion to attend to the temporal and spiritual needs of victims and their families.

The Province is likewise committed to treating justly any religious who is accused of such misconduct. A team appointed by the Province investigates each such accusation thoroughly to determine whether there is reliable evidence to support it. Where there is credible evidence to support the accusations, the Province will take whatever steps are required to eliminate any risk to the public of further incidents. Because seeking sexual gratification from children is frequently the manifestation of a complex psychiatric disorder, the Province also seeks to treat any priest or religious against whom such an accusation is substantiated with compassion and Christian concern.

The procedures which the St. Barbara Province has developed for dealing with accusations of sexual abuse by its religious members are set forth below. These procedures are intended as a guide to assist the Provincial leadership in addressing such accusations. All of the procedures may not apply to a given situation; likewise, they may require modification or supplementation to meet the needs of a particular case. The Province regularly reviews these policies and procedures with a view towards improving them. It reserves the right to modify or replace them at its discretion.

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the second of the second second second second second second second second second second second second second s All accusations of child sexual abuse against members of the Province should be referred immediately to the Provincial Minister or, in his absence, to the Vicar Provincial. When such an accusation has been made, the following procedures will be implemented: 1.557 18.2

If any fnar reasonably suspects a case of child abuse, he should report the incident to the Child Protective Services or other appropriate civil authority (please confer with the policy on reporting child abuse, I F in the Friary Administrative Handbook). All friars should familiarize themselves with the laws of the particular state in which they live. The friar should also report suspicion of child abuse to the Provincial Minister if the case involves another fnar. Please note that any civil responsibility for reporting child abuse belongs to the thar on the local level and not to the Provincial Minister. The Province will cooperate fully with all public, official investigating agencies.

The Provincial or the Vicar Provincial will contact the child's family both to obtain additional information concerning the basis for the accusation and to provide pastoral support and whatever other assistance may be appropriate under the circumstances. In instances where the victim is no longer a minor, the Provincial may contact the victim directly.

The Provincial or the Vicar Provincial will contact and question the accused religious concerning the accusations.

If, after consultation with the alleged victim's family and the accused friar, the Provincial determines that there is some substance to the accusation, he will appoint a team to attend to the pastoral needs of the alleged victim/family as well as the accused Irjar. The team could include the Provincial of his delegate, a friar of the Province, and a lay person knowledgeable of the Issues involved. The team is encouraged to consult with professionals (courselors and attorneys) with expertise in the area of child abuse.

The Provincial, in consultation with the Provincial Team, will determine whether the accused

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
