Father Garry plans to step down as pastor of the church sometime this fall, after 13 years leading the local flock. Unlike most retiring

priests, however, he intends to remain in an active resident of his former parish, as he will take up a new resi-dence in Peter Cooper Village, the borough's senior citizens housing complex.
"I'm not getting away from
the priesthood," Garry said,
adding, "once a priest, a
priest forever."

His most distinctive fea-tures are his pronounced Irish brogue and his great friendliness. What is most impressive about Garry, however, is how he assembled a league of devoted parishioners during a period when American Catholics are questioning their leaders more than ever before.

Garry said he has in-formed the Most Rev. John C. Reiss, Bishop of the Diocese of Trenton, that he did not feel healthy enough to do all that is required of him as pastor, or all that he had been able to do in the past. Garry expects to step down this fall, when he plans to have cataract


